## Carroll's Bank Sold To David Garwood

### Cashier Buys Out Scribner

W. R. Scribner, president of Carroll's Farmers State Bank since its origin in 1913, this week announced his resignation and sale of his bank interests to Cashier David V. Garwood. The sale also included Scribner's insurance agency.

Garwood, a graduate of Wayne State and the American Institute of Banking, has been cashier since 1951. He previously has spent 10 years with the Bank of America in California and nearly three years with the First National Bank, Wayne. He is a native of Carroll, is married and has one daughter.

Scribner has not announced any plans for the future but will make a visit with relatives on the West Coast during the late winter months.

Scribner announced his resignation at the annual meeting of bank shareholders Jan. 2.

Present directors of the bank are Garwood, Perry Johnson, J. M. Peterson and G. E. Jones. Johnson has been named president and chairman of the board with Peterson as vice president.

## R. Jeffrey Awarded \$677 In Pay Suit Against REA

Judge Lyle E. Jackson, Neligh, Thursday awarded Robert Jeffrey, Wayne, \$677.60 plus interest in his suit against the Wayne County Rural Public Power district for recovery of overtime and vacation pay.

The suit in which Jeffrey originally asked nearly \$2,300, was tried Nov. 23 and Judge Jackson took 11 days' adjournment. The interest accrued dates back to Apr. 6, 1953.

Monday morning a motion for a rehearing in the condemnation actions brought by the Leup River Public Power district was asked by Joseph Rogers, attorney for the defendants. Judge Jackson Thursday had affirmed the county court ruling which found for the power district.

The actions resulted when the defendants sought larger amounts for power line right-of-way. The defendants are Harold Sherwood, Curtis M. Viergutz, George Schmidt, Herbert Hilkeman and Mark Lyndal.

Judge Jackson also ruled on the custody of William F. Wehler, 7, and Robert E. Wehler, 5, allowing them to be visited once each week by their divorced parents. The children are living with their uncle and aunt, Harry and Wilma Wehler near Concord.

Jackson left the custody with the father, William Wehler, but specified the children were to live with the mother, Mrs. Ted Reed during the summer months and Christmas vacation.

Wehler and Mrs. Reed were divorced in July, 1952. A property settlement made at that time gave Mrs. Reed the Wayne residence and Wehler custody of the children. Mrs. Reed was seeking to regain custody of the boys.

Son of Mr. and Mrs. Robert T. Blair, he was born Sept. 6, 1877 at Hannibal, Ia. He worked two years in a clothing store at Dingley, Ia., before moving to Fremont in 1896. He was in the clothing business there for 15 years. He married Mabelle Dickson at Elmwood Jan. 7, 1908.

Mr. Blair is survived by his wife; two daughters, Mrs. Harlan Ralston, Rock Island, Ill., and Mrs. Lloyd Soberhagen, Tulsa, Okla.; a brother, Murray E. Blair, Pasadena, Calif., and one grandson.

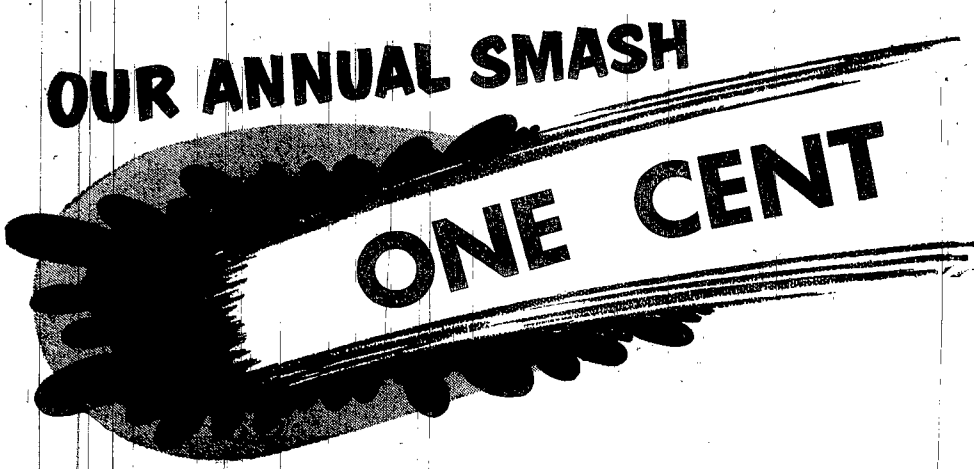

### Defense of the Teen-ager

"This younger generation is going to the dogs." The above statement, or one very similar, is a stock phrase used by most of us after we pass our third decade, and, from the pinnacle of our "vast experience," we feel that it is certainly true. As proof we cite every teen-ager escapade we can think of that has happened in the past few months.

We feel righteously indignant that our young folks don't work hard from dawn to past dark, stay home all the time they are not working or in school and respect their elders the way we did "when we were young'uns."

But the teen-ager of today is vastly superior to the youth of only a generation ago. Young folks are bigger, stronger, better informed and work just as hard.

As for his escapades, the only difference in today's ruckuses and those of his father are the tools he uses.

Where his dad used to ride his saddle horse or drive his buggy up and down the streets of town, the son now uses a car; where his dad used to walk five miles to a dance, today a youth drives 40 or 50.

And his dad occasionally got into trouble with local authorities, just as his son does today.

Today's youth is bigger and stronger because he has the advantages of better preventive medicines, better diets, better housing and clothing.

He is better informed because he has better newspapers, radio and television and classes in current events.

He accomplishes more work in a given length of time than his father before him, because modern living has brought him better, more efficient tools than Pop had. And he has earned enough to buy himself a car at the age when his dad was still getting a 25-cent allowance each week.

Just as many—perhaps more—students are working their way through college now as before, and they are getting more for their time and money than did the student of 20 or 25 years ago.

Perhaps he doesn't work the long hours that his father and grandfather did, but he gets more work done.

As for hours worked—well, Pop doesn't put in the hours he used to, either. But it's not because he is slowing down so much as it is that the trend is toward more leisure time, that better machines are available to help him get the work done faster.

As for respecting the older generation, today's youth probably gives more than is due.

Our youth is living in dangerous times. The boys must look forward to military service shortly after they finish high school. The girls marry, then wait a couple of years—or more—for their husbands to return from the armed services. The world is in a constant turmoil with wars and rumors of wars, threats of the A-bomb and the H-bomb. Certainly the future presented by the older generation can't look so rosy to a teen-ager.

The younger generation has been "going to the dogs" for thousands of years. Probably Adam, noting the actions of his grandchildren, remarked to Eve that the modern youngster had it better than he did. And the grandmother of today is that "terrible flapper" of the 1920's.

Pshaw, after thinking it over, it looks like the world will be in better hands by 1970 than it was 30 years ago.

There's more hard work than luck in most success stories.

### HERE AND THERE With Your County Agent

**Expense or Investment?**  
Modern farming requires about 80 per cent more cash outlay than was needed 40 years ago. Some of the items of farm expense added over the years are feeds purchased, gasoline and oil, machinery, tractor and auto upkeep, electric and telephone service, commercial fertilizers, licenses, taxes, insurance and agricultural chemicals. This annual cost may run as high as \$50 per crop acre.

If you, like most farmers, are looking for ways to cut costs it may pay to weigh carefully which items need paying. Some are easily eliminated while others are comparatively fixed. However, don't put yours in the position of the cook who wanted to cut down on the cost of a cake by leaving out the sugar.

The one item on which our farmers exercise the widest option today is the use of commercial fertilizer. It is certainly a penny wise and dollar foolish to forego the judicious use of fertilizer when soil tests show the need. What is needed can be determined at a small cost through the soil testing service available at the College of Agriculture.

Will fertilizer always make money for you? No, fertilizer will not always make money for you. Neither will your crop of oats, corn or hay always make money. There are no guarantees against drought, hail or pests. But, remember, you already have a considerable investment to lose in case of adverse conditions. The additional investment in fertilizer has frequently increased yields from 20 to 30 per cent.

The use of commercial fertilizer should never be considered a substitute for good farm management practices. Short rotations including legumes and grasses plus utilizing forage with livestock are sound practices. Some of the elements necessary for crop growth, particularly phosphate and calcium, are depleted in our soils and can be restored only through application of these materials. Balanced manure helps to maintain the level but it is almost impossible to apply in amounts necessary to gain an increase. The value of humus added is extremely important. Growing legumes will store ni-

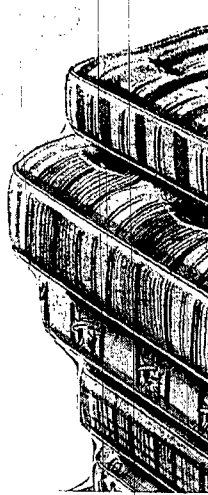

He explained how such crops can be grown because of the long summer days. "The sun hardly ever is gone long in the summer," he said. However, the winters are extremely long and dark. The weather at the Air Force base at Anchorage is extremely mild because of the warm ocean current which touches Alaska.

He told how the Eskimos live and how their way of life has changed because of the American influence. He told us too that tuberculosis is very prevalent among the Eskimos. He also pointed out to the pupils why it is so important for the U.S. to keep a large number of soldiers and planes in Alaska.

We had only a short program at Christmas time and we invited the mothers to come and share a party with us. Games were played and the usual treats enjoyed. Gifts were also exchanged.
