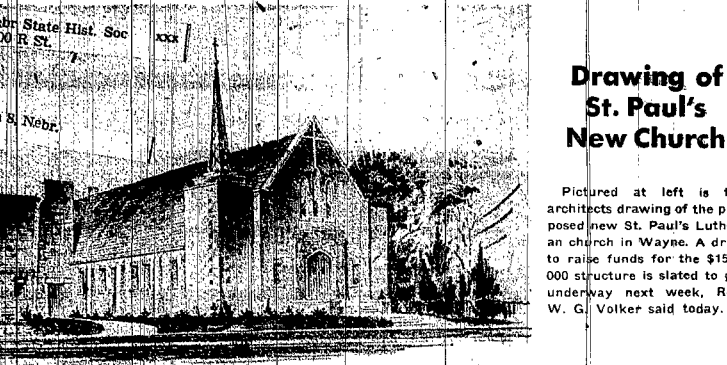

George Says State Lags In Program

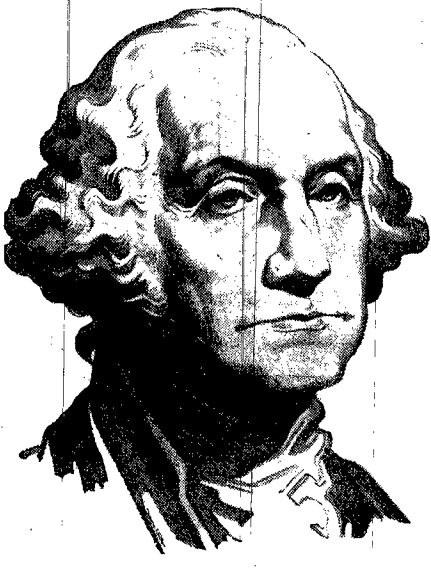

Custer's First Stand
Barley might be a good alternative crop for some land taken out of corn by acreage controls. Barley is a good livestock feed and is quite comparable to corn in feed value. In general two bushels of barley is considered equal to three bushels of oats.

Custer is a recently developed variety which showed the best yields in eastern Nebraska the past year. It is a Velvet and Wisconsin 38 cross with an alkalinity to Velvet. The new crop is similar to Velvet but yields higher. It is two to four days earlier, has a stiffer straw and breaks off more readily in threshing. Custer produced the highest average yield of all varieties tested at Lincoln and North Platte. The certified seed directory available at the Extension office lists several growers in this area.

Soybean Conference
Farmers who have been considering soybeans as a possible replacement for corn acreage can obtain the latest information on growing and marketing of soybeans at a meeting in March. Arrangements have been completed for the holding of a soybean conference at the Fremont city auditorium Mar. 2. The meeting will begin at 9:30 a.m. and close by 1:00 p.m.

An outstanding program has been arranged to present the latest information available on the various aspects of growing and marketing soybeans. Speakers at the program will include George M. Strayer, secretary of the American Soybean Association, Hudson, Ia., Ward Call, managing director of the National Soybean Crop Improvement Council, Decatur, Ind., Prof. A. L. Lang, University of Illinois; Fred H. Hafner, chemical division; General Mills, Inc., Minneapolis; and Donald C. Hanway, assistant professor of agronomy at the University of Nebraska.

Topics to be discussed include acreage and price aspects for soybeans in 1954, recommended varieties and cultural methods for soybean production, fertility requirements of soybeans, report on the soybean oil meal industry and the processors' interest in soybeans and outlook for the soybean industry. Information on the topics of seed treatment and inoculation, weed control and defoliation, row spacing will be presented. An address will be presented by an expert on the subject of soybean insect control. Participants will include local farmers who have had considerable experience in the growing of soybeans. A farm question box session will be held so that any opportunity will be presented to ask questions.

Everyone interested is invited to attend.

Phosphorus in Hay
Boef cattle fed alfalfa hay high in phosphorus gained 2.19 pounds daily, compared with .53 pound for similar cattle receiving hay low in this mineral. This observation was made last summer in preliminary tests conducted by the University of California. Experiment station. The higher gaining lot of cattle in the 91-day trial received alfalfa hay harvested from a field well supplied with phosphorus. The other lot was fed alfalfa hay from a field low in this mineral. The two hays contained 1.4 and 1.10 percent phosphorus respectively. This may be something for us to think about since our soils are uniformly low in phosphorus.

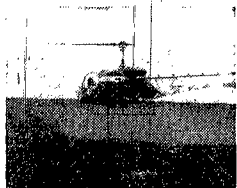
