### Annual Meet Held Feb. 16

Plans for 1954 soil conservation work in Wayne county were announced last week by Albert Watson, chairman of the local soil conservation district.

### 75 miles; farm drainage, 500 acres; grassed waterways, 150 acres; conservation crop rotation, 3,500 acres; and drop spillways, six.

Supervisors are encouraging use of a short term grass-legumes crop rotation in the district to fit with the restriction on corn acreage. Since the county is largely rolling upland, the main problem is control of erosion to increase fertility.

### Recommended Vegetable Varieties

Each year new varieties of vegetables appear in the seed catalogues, many are all American selections, chosen as the best all-around varieties for home gardens. Dr. Shilcock Hoopes, working at the Nebraska Experiment station, has made a list of those which did best in 1953 trials of all kinds of vegetables at Lincoln. No doubt you will want to plant some of these for comparison with the varieties you have been growing.

### Bloat Control?

Not yet, but an important discovery by U.S.D.A. scientists that a substance called saponin found in alfalfa may be the culprit. Several pounds of this saponin recovered from dry alfalfa hay, when fed to sheep and cattle, produced bloat in eight of ten trials.

### Economical Beef

Iowa State college, at their annual feeders' day program last week, announced amazing results. One lot of steers showed gains one-third higher than average at one-sixth (approximately) figures less feed cost per pound. The feed cost doesn't seem to produce similar results when fed to beefsteers? Again, only time will tell, but such unusual response shows the possibilities and importance of experimental research.

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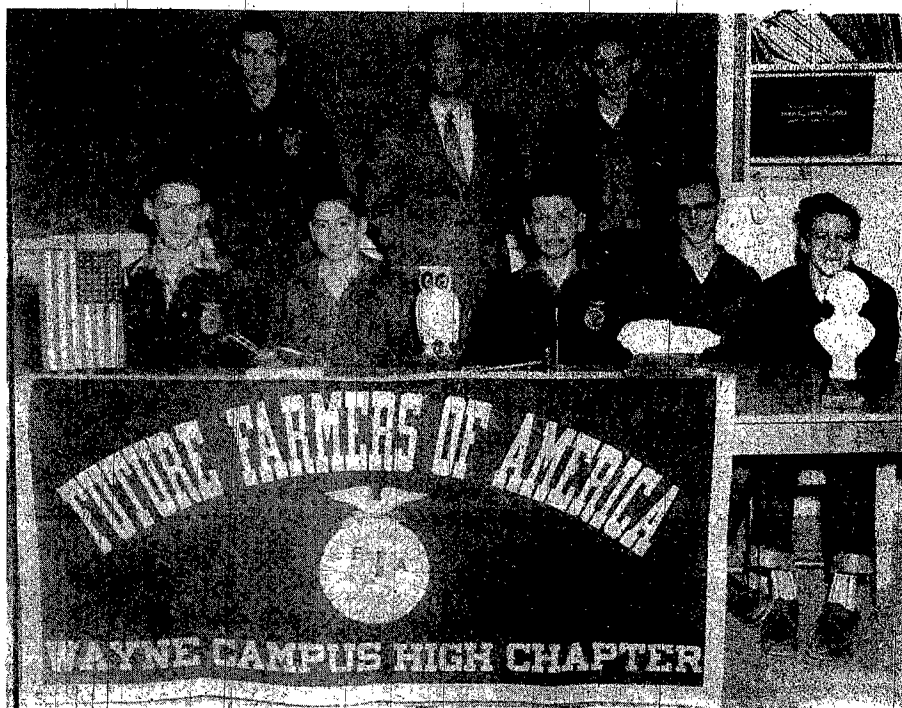
