VARIETY WAS OUR KEYWORD AROUND THE library during the past week. Our activities centered on board meetings to the Heel and the study dancing club. We were asked questions which covered such things as the care and breeding of gold fish, what is soil conservation and why does a state patrolman's car have white sides? Even our new books were varied in subject matter, as well as unusual. I have selected four of them to tell you about in this column to show you what I mean.

"HOMES OF THE BRAVE" BY ROBSJOHN AND Gibbins is a very funny book and is fundamentally a serious book too. It is a serious criticism of American (and imported) interior decoration and exterior architecture for the past 60 years. The pictures are hilarious and one critic has described it as a "wittily savage little book." Now that description should arouse your curiosity.

"JOBS AFTER RETIREMENT" IS A BOOK written by Lehman and Yarnon, recognized authorities in vocational guidance. If you are over 50 and dread retirement, or over 65 and feel out of things, need additional income or would like to make use of your ability and experience, this is the book to give you ideas.

"THE DESPERATE HOURS," A NOVEL OF suspense by Joseph Hayes, is that different thriller you have been looking for. Suppose a trio of desperate escaped convicts... vicious and frightened... simply took over your home? How would you have reacted in the face of such inexorable pressure, knowing that every single minute death for you and your family was creeping closer and closer? See how these people in the story reacted. The author is the creator of the Mister Peepers of television fame.

"BUT WE WERE BORN FREE" BY ELMER DAVIS is current history and personal reporting written in his vigorous, ironic and witty style. His attack is hot, his dander is up, but always his reasoning is clear and cold. It is true, he says, that now animates the investigating committee of McCarthy and others. We must have the courage to think for ourselves instead of being taken in by this cult of Doublethink. This book will help you to understand the news you read and hear every day.

Generous Use of Bedding

Generous use of bedding keeps cattle clean, conserves more liquid manure, and results in larger amounts of plant food being returned to the soil. A ton of straw consents about three tons of liquid manure or nearly \$12.00 worth of plant nutrients. When cattle are kept in a loafing shed, spreading three pounds of super phosphate per animal each week helps make the manure pack firm and provides warm and comfortable resting conditions. Where straw is scarce, farmers can use ground corn cobs and chopped corn fodder to increase their supply of bedding.

Nitrogen Helps Corn

The protein content of corn can be increased through extra nitrogen applied during the growing period. The total crude protein in corn has been raised as much as 1% from 8.8% to 9.8% by added nitrogen, producing around 133 extra pounds of this important feed nutrient per acre according to research results at the Missouri station. This is a double dividend for good management because extra nitrogen will not only increase yields of corn but will make it worth more for feeding. Research in pasture fertilization has shown that nitrogen will lift yields and lengthen grazing periods. In many instances, the addition of nitrogen to growing pastures has increased yields from 50 to 100%. In addition, nitrogen butts more protein in the forage. Fertilized grass grows off to early start in the spring and grows further into the fall, thus lengthening the grazing season.

Market Hog Show

The second annual Midwest Market Hog Show will be held at Mar-

ion on Saturday, Mar. 20. Entries will consist of a pen of three exhibitor (barrow or gilt) and each must weigh between 190 and 240 pounds. The hogs will be sold following the show at a price based on the top Chicago market and slaughtered in the Hormel plant.

Cardasses will be graded by a committee from the Nebraska and Iowa Colleges of Agriculture and prizes awarded to the owners of the top twenty.

A demonstration of market classes of swine and a judging contest will be held in the morning. Entries are available in the county agent's office and must be postmarked not later than Mar. 13.

4-H Building Fund

Wayne county 4-H members, lodgers and parents are going all out during the first two weeks in March to raise their portion of funds necessary to construct a new 4-H building on the fair grounds. Their efforts will culminate in a noon luncheon to be served in the Wayne auditorium on Saturday, Mar. 13 to be followed by a sale of solicited articles.

Tentative plans are that the new building will be constructed on the present slab south of the grandstand, the dimensions of which are approximately 45 x 100 ft. Some of the features to be incorporated in the new building, in addition to exhibit space, are facilities for demonstrations, judging and the style review and a kitchen. It is anticipated that the building will be used year round as a meeting place.

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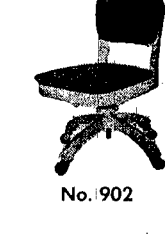
