### 60 Students Will Attend

High school students from Wayne county towns will participate in annual County Government day at the county courthouse here Wednesday. It was announced today by County Service Officer, Dudd Barnhart.

The event is sponsored by Legion posts and their Auxiliaries throughout the county. It is designed to make students more familiar with the workings of their local government.

Twelve students will be chosen at Carroll, Hoskins, Winslow, Wayne Prep and Wayne High schools to represent their schools.

A student from each school will observe practices in his respective county office.

Schedule for the day calls for registration and filing of certificates of election at 9:30 a. m. A general assembly will be held in the courtroom at 10:30. Dr. J. R. Johnson, Wayne State instructor, will speak at the morning session.

A noon luncheon is planned at the Lions club rooms. Dr. John Rice, Wayne State president, will give the main address following this luncheon.

During the afternoon, students will report to their respective county and observe the workings of the county government.

## 4-H Sale, Dinner Boost Building Fund to \$2,900

Wayne county's 4-H building fund netted \$1,457 from the benefit dinner and auction held Saturday at the city auditorium. It was announced this week by John Motz, head of the county 4-H council.

This brings the building fund total to \$2,935. Estimates on materials needed for the new 4-H building on the fairgrounds were about \$600.

Saturday's auction brought in \$1,019 while cash donations added another \$22. The bake sale receipts totaled \$31 and proceeds from the dinners and lunches amounted to \$140.

The building fund has contained \$150 in equal grants of \$500 each from A. S. Ben, the county board and equal funds of the 4-H organizations.

Plans call for construction on the building to start in late spring. It is hoped it will be ready for activities at the county fair in August.

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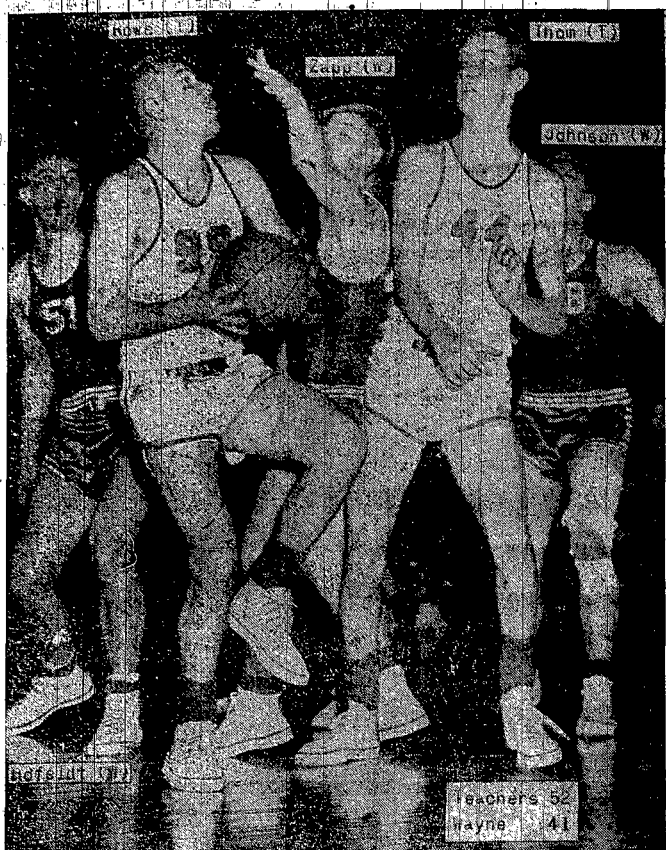
