

Prospects Good for '54 Crops

Crop prospects for 1954 in Wayne county are good. Farmers in the Wayne area are going into the planting season with an above-average supply of moisture in the ground despite the dry spell last year.

This information comes from rainfall records supplied by Weather Observer Archie Wert.

Wet, snows and gentle rains so far this year have soaked the earth with 2.45 inches of water, as compared with a 40-year average of only 1.51 inches for the same period.

Do you think last year was dry? Strange as it may seem, total moisture for 1953 was two inches above the average yearly rainfall over the last 40 years, despite a five-month period from June through October when rain lagged behind. The area received 24.50 inches in 1953 as compared to 22.30 inches average.

Farms have been blessed with above average annual rainfall every year but three since 1940. Only in 1912, 1943 and 1947 did our annual moisture lag behind.

Wettest year in the 40 years covered by the record was in 1951 when the area was soaked with 32.87 inches. However, 1946 was close behind with 32.73 inches.

The driest year was in 1939, when only 12.23 inches of moisture fell. But 1936 ran close with a record of 12.28 inches.

Driest months of the year are December, January and February. Average moisture for those three months is only 1.18 inches. Wettest month is June with an average rainfall of 4.05 inches.
