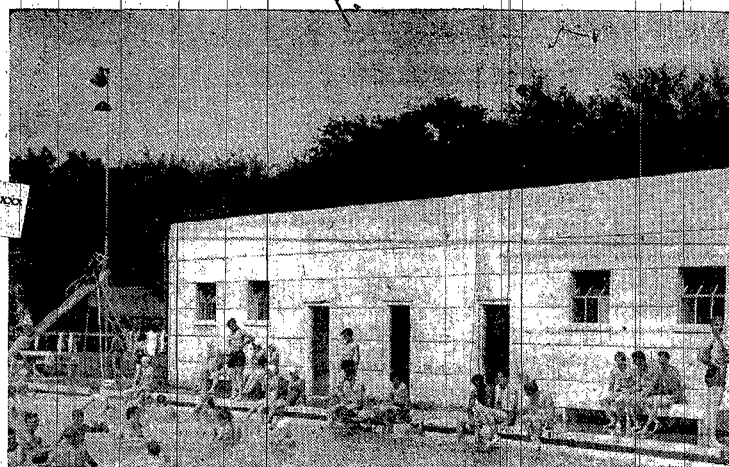

Which shall it be, pool or puddle? The choice is up to the voters of Wayne.

Tuesday Wayne voters go to the polls to make the final decision on whether Wayne shall have a swimming pool and continue our trend of civic betterment or whether we stagnate and rest on our oars.

These voters need not be real estate owners. Many have the mistaken impression that only real estate owners are eligible to vote on this issue. This is not true.

To meet voting qualifications you must be over 21, and have six months residence in the state, 40 days in the county and 10 days in the ward.

Benefits of a swimming pool might well be briefed here, though they have been hashed and re-hashed many times since the issue arose.

First, a pool will provide wholesome, healthful recreation for our youth here in Wayne, eliminating dangerous drives on dusty summer roads to pools in other towns. Less chance for accidents, more chance to swim.

Both boys and girls can enjoy the advantages of a pool, while only boys can use most other recreational facilities available in Wayne.

Local Red Cross officials have said that Red Cross funds would be available to help pay swimming instructors if Wayne gets a swimming pool.

Learning to swim is important. It may save the life of a swimmer, fisherman or someone boating.

A pool will provide a properly supervised place for our youngsters to learn to swim, eliminating the danger of swimming in creeks, rivers and ponds.

This pool must be located WITHIN THE CORPORATE LIMITS OF WAYNE. The question is so worded on the ballot.

If YOU want a pool, you must vote for it! Don't hold back, thinking there will be enough other votes to carry it through. If the issue fails, you have only yourself to blame if you do not vote.

**Drought Insurance**  
Holding every drop of the early spring rains where they fall is more important than most farmers think. It has been established that almost 60 percent of our annual precipitation is lost to evaporation during the warm summer months. This, coupled with runoff loss, makes us appear pretty inefficient in use of available moisture. The average corn crop in eastern Nebraska makes use of less than one-third of our annual precipitation.

**New Hog Housing and Equipment Plan**  
Latest plans for new hog houses and equipment are available from the college of agriculture. The 33 plans consist of a variety of portable and central hog houses for the raising of hogs. These include feeders, loading shuttles and farrowing stalls. This is the latest in a series of new farm building plans prepared cooperatively by the agricultural colleges through the Midwest Plan Service. Agricultural engineers and livestock specialists have cooperated to develop these plans for the housing of hogs. Individual plans available for a small charge, can be ordered from the Extension Service, College of Agriculture, at Lincoln. Extension Circular 733, describing all of these plans, is available in the County Extension Office.
