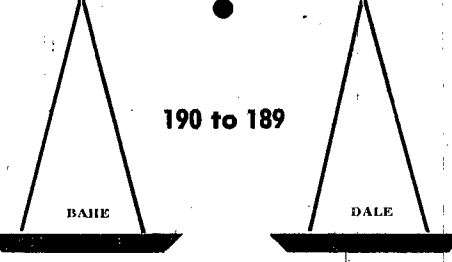

Elections— Randolph ...

Randolph has a new mayor but he's an old hand at the post. Harold Shewell defeated L. A. Strathman, 261-199, to regain the position he had held several years ago. Only one vote was the difference in the race between J. F. Atwood and Vernon Wisnitzer for clerk. The count was 232 to 231. Two new councilmen were also named. They are A. W. Sausser, first ward, and Ellis Barker, second ward. Sausser defeated Stanley Norris, 182-81. Barker beat Lee Sellen, 140-35. J. O. Black defeated incumbent Ben Meyer, 251-202, in the race for police magistrate while A. B. Helms was reelected treasurer. A referendum issue on the city taking over ownership of a cemetery formerly owned by an association carried. Elected to the school board for three-year terms were Roy Gihson and Harold Bush. They received 307 and 242 votes, respectively. The other candidate, D. V. Phillips, received 210.

Laurel ...

One new member was elected to the Laurel town board. He is Harold Carlson, who received 83 votes to top a field of four candidates. Harold August was reelected with 75 votes. Peter Christensen and Ben Edmeier received 71 and 43 votes, respectively. Carl-

son and August will serve two years. A total of 137 votes were cast. V. E. McNabb and George Borjund were both reelected to the school board for three-year terms. They received 135 and 120 votes.

Hoskins ...

Theodore Heberer is a new member of Hoskins' board of trustees. He received 37 of 63 votes cast. Incumbent A. J. Krause was reelected, receiving 44 votes. Lloyd Larson, the other candidate, received 27 votes. Incumbents were reelected to the school board. They were Mercey Bohmer and Mrs. Irene Winter. They received 52 and 31 votes, respectively. Other candidates and their votes were: Jim Friend, 23, and Mrs. Bessie Meichner, 17.

Carroll ...

Two village board members and two school board members were reelected at Carroll. Percy Johnson and J. M. Peterson were re-elected to the village board with 51 and 49 votes, respectively. Lyle Cunningham and Tom Roberts each received one vote in village. Otto Wagner and Lloyd Tesley were successful in their bids for reelection to the school board. They defeated Reuben Voecks and Alvin Tietgen. The count was: Wagner, 42; Tietgen, 39; Voecks, 27 and Tesley, 14.

Dixon ...

Three trustees were reelected at Dixon. They were Frank Tomason, J. C. McCaw and Merrill Jewell. They received 39, 39 and 26 votes, respectively. Tomason and McCaw will serve for two years and Jewell one. Elected to the school board were Donald Petros and Paul Borg. They were tops in the race which also included Gene Jackson and Oscar Borg.

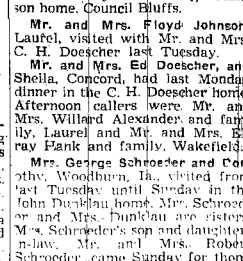

Famous Apple Gourmet Pancakes



OLD-TIME German restaurants in New York serve this apple pancake day after day, but especially in the months when the apple harvest is at its best. With fresh-tasting new crop apples pouring into the markets everywhere these days, the apple pancakes are favorites with chefs and their customers. Here's the recipe, home-tested for you.

Apple Pancakes
(12-14 servings)
1 lb. tart apples, pared and cored
1/2 cup melted butter or margarine
1/2 cup sugar
1/2 teaspoon salt
1/2 teaspoon nutmeg
1/2 teaspoon cinnamon
1/2 cup sugar
1/2 cup butter
1/2 cup milk
1/2 cup sifted flour
1/2 cup sifted baking powder
1/2 cup sifted salt
1/2 cup sifted sugar
1/2 cup sifted butter
1/2 cup sifted margarine

Pare and core apples; cut in thin slices; cook in 1/2 cup butter or margarine 6 minutes. Combine 1/2 cup sugar, nutmeg and cinnamon; add to apples; cover; cook over low heat 10 minutes longer, or until apples are crisply tender. Remove from heat; cool to lukewarm. Combine eggs, milk, flour and salt; beat with rotary egg beater or electric mixer 2 to 3 minutes (batter will be very thin). Heat 1 tablespoon of

remaining butter or margarine in 10-inch frying pan. When hot, pour batter into pan.
Bake in hot oven, 450° F., 15 minutes. As soon as batter puffs up in center (about 3 minutes) puncture with skewer or fork, repeating as often as necessary. Lower heat to moderate, 350° F.; bake 10 minutes longer or until golden brown and crisp. Batter will creep up on sides of pan, forming a shell. Remove from oven; pour half the remaining butter over surface, sprinkle with half the remaining sugar. Spread apple mixture over half the surface; fold as for omelet; remove to hot platter. Pour remaining butter on top; sprinkle with remaining sugar. Makes 6 servings.

Apple Ambrosia
3 large red apples
2 cups grapefruit sections
1 cup moist-pack shredded coconut
1 cup moist-pack shredded coconut

Core apples; do not pare; cut into thin slices. Slice bananas. Combine apples, banana and grapefruit sections. Sweeten to taste with sugar. Arrange in dessert dishes; top with coconut. Makes 6 servings.

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Excise Tax Cut To Lower Phone Rates Locally
Nebraska telephone users served by Northwest Bell Telephone company will save about \$1,800,000 annually in taxes on local and long distance service as a result of the reduction in federal excise taxes effective Apr. 1, according to L. O. Arstad, company general manager in Nebraska. The tax has previously been 25 percent on long distance calls costing 25 cents or more and 15 percent on local service charges. The new rate is 10 percent on both types of service. "Your telephone bill is lowered by the entire difference between the old and new tax," Arstad said. "Taxes are an important factor in the telephone company's operations," he continued. "The total taxes on our operations, along with federal excise taxes, have amounted to \$3.01 per month per telephone on the average. With this reduction, the figure will be about \$2.37 per month per telephone."

Tree Delivery Started
 More than 11,000 Clark-McNary trees have been ordered by 36 Wayne county farmers for planting in 1954. Distribution of these trees was started Thursday with shipment from the Benson nursery, Halsey, and from Plumfield nursery, Fremont.

These trees are delivered to farmers at cost under the Clark-McNary program and are to be used for windbreak and woodlot plantings.

Although shipment of trees has begun, orders are still being taken as long as supplies last. Several evergreen varieties as well as a half a dozen broadleaf varieties are still available. Application blanks for ordering are available in the County Extension office.

Water System Demonstration?

The preferred time is September or October. Two days will be devoted to the demonstration to which the public will be invited. The huge carryover of stored grains, particularly wheat and corn, is causing those in charge of the commodity loan program some concern. USDA officials report that we will have a storage problem whether the 1954 crop is large, average or small. Some special inducements being offered to aid in the grain storage problem include:

1. A special re-sealing program will encourage farmers to hold 1953 crop loan and purchase agreement stocks of corn and wheat on the farm for another year.
2. Farm storage facility and equipment loan programs will be continued for another year, enabling farmers to borrow a large part of the cost of building or buying additional storage space.
3. "guaranteed occupancy" program to encourage construction of new warehouse and elevator facilities.
4. Special income tax features (similar to those authorized for defense plan amortization) under which the cost of new farm or commercial storage facilities can be amortized over a period of five years.
5. CCC bins which are used to store Government-owned grain

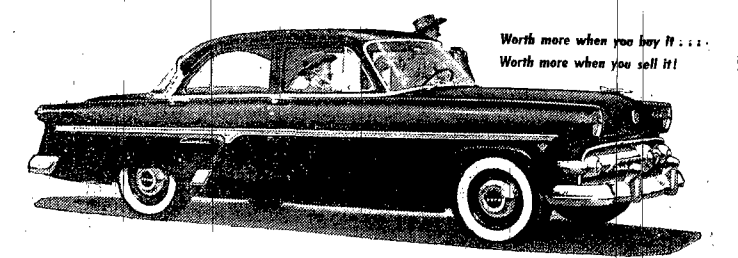

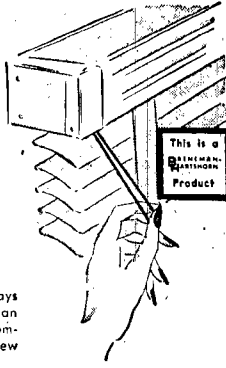

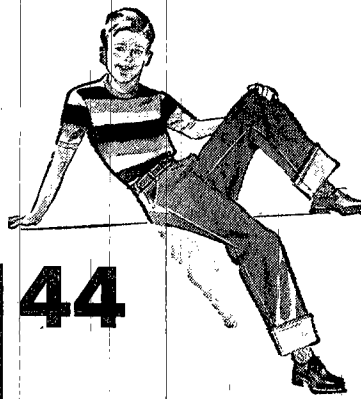
