Must Apply Before Loan Maturity

Farmers who reseal their farm-stored grain...

Storage payment rates for the various crops included under the 1953 crop resale...

The rates are approximately the same as commercial storage rates.

If the farmer redeems his resale loan before maturity date, Roberts explained, he will receive a storage payment for the period...

Since 1954 crop wheat loans will mature Mar. 31, 1955, one month earlier than last year, the extended maturity date for the 1953-crop wheat resale loans has been set to coincide.

Farmers who wish to reseal their grain or to convert purchase agreements into resale loans should make application at the county ASC office during the month before the 1953-crop maturity date.

Green Manure Wheat Acreage Deadline Set

County ASC Chairman Thomas P. Roberts announced this week that June 1, 1954 is the final date by which producers must use wheat acreage for green manure, cover crop, hay pasture or silage if such acreage is not to be classified as "wheat acreage" under the wheat allotment program.

Producers who have planted an acreage of wheat which they wish to use as green manure, cover crop, hay pasture or silage and whose wheat acreage has not yet been measured, should notify the county ASC office and designate the acreage on which the practice will be carried out.

Under the wheat marketing program, effective for this year's crop, a farmer with an acreage allotment of more than 15 acres who exceeds his farm wheat acreage allotment in 1954 becomes subject to a marketing penalty of his "excess" production.

A farmer with an acreage allotment of 15 acres or less may produce as much as 15 acres of wheat without incurring marketing penalties.

However, by not permitting overplanted wheat acreage to reach maturity, a producer has an opportunity to bring his acreage into compliance and thus avoid the quota penalty and loss of eligibility for price support.

The deadline is set far enough ahead, Roberts said, for completing this green pasture practice before wheat maturity and to enable the county ASC committee to make final check of performance and issue marketing cards to eligible producers before harvest.

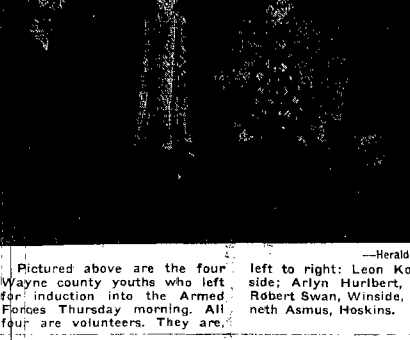
Wakefield Jack Engel was elected president of the newly organized Wakefield Junior Chamber of Commerce at a meeting Thursday night at the fire hall.

Must Provide Facilities

"We need to remember that in Kansas, Iowa and Nebraska we have few natural recreational facilities, such as many states have." Lewis continued, "so we must provide them."

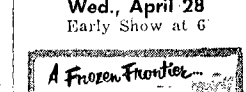

## Is Coordination the Answer?

Thursday two men with long experience in community recreation discussed recreation plans for Wayne with members of the Chamber of Commerce and groups working with recreational programs.

One of the main points emphasized by both men was use of a coordinating body for scheduling recreational activities to avoid conflicts.

Scheduling can often result in more recreation for everyone without increasing the number of activities. At times the complaint "there is nothing for children to do" may be justified. At other times just the reverse is true, because of timing conflicts.

If a baseball game, Boy Scout meeting and choir practice are scheduled at the same time, there is little doubt which activities will suffer.

Certainly the idea of a coordinating group warrants further investigation.

Arbor Day is set aside by law in most states for encouraging conservation, planting of shade and forest trees about homes, communities and along roads and streets.

As the need for conservation has grown in public esteem, Arbor Day has assumed increasing importance. It is widely observed by many groups throughout the country in every state in the union at some time during the year.

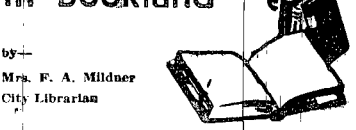

## HERE AND THERE With Your County Agent

By Harold Ingalls

**1954 Drill-Box Surveys**  
Nebraska seed oats drill-box surveys are being made in Madison and Cedar counties this year. Purpose of the survey is to find out what kind of seed farmers are planting where they are obtaining seed and quality and purity of seed being planted. Other information such as the use of certified seed and fertilizers will be collected.

Cooperating with the Nebraska Crop Improvement association in this work will be the division of noxious weeds of the state Department of Agriculture, the Nebraska Grain Improvement association, state seed laboratory and state and county extension services. Representatives of these organizations go into the fields in all parts of the two counties at the peak of the oat seeding season to obtain one pound samples of the grain being sown.

Identity of the samples are kept confidential, but the individual farmer will receive an analysis of his seed for his own information as well as a summary for the entire county. This type of survey has been conducted in 10 other counties over the past three years and much valuable information has been collected. For example, one sample of seed taken last year showed a weed seed content of 11,700 per pound of seed. This result showed the farmer was planting almost as many weed seeds as oats kernels.

In the other hand, in another county for the entire county, the farmers were doing an excellent job in planting good seed of adapted varieties which had been rechecked and treated. About 15 percent of the farmers in this county were planting certified seed, the survey showed.
