Preserving Grass Silage

When green forage is placed in a compact mass in a silo for a time the plant cells continue to live and to breathe, using up oxygen that is entrapped. In five hours practically all of the oxygen has disappeared. This prevents the development of mold. Acid forming bacteria multiply rapidly in the silage, and in 48 hours each gram of silage juice (about ½ teaspoonful) may contain one hundred million becteria. These bacteria attack the sugars and develop acetic and lacit acid; without enough sugars for the bacteria to work on, putrification or rotting develops. The production of acid is the most important change in the process. Acidity prevents the growth of undesirable bacteria and exclusion of air prevents the development of mold. The amount of acid developed in the silage depends largely on the percentage of sugars that is ensiled. Alfalfa and clovers contain practically no sugar and grasses suitable for grass silage contain relatively small amounts of sugars for conversion to acids. It is necessary to add a preservative to produce a quality silage from legumes or grasses.
