Fine Weather
"It is a privilege to live in Wayne!"
Wayne county's soil soaked up 1.53 inch of rain in the past week, brought in along with cooler temperatures. Some of the moisture was in snow flurries Sunday.
Temperatures in Wayne dropped to below freezing Sunday night, but little frost damage was reported.
The week's rain brought total moisture for the year to 6.50 inches, nearly three inches ahead of the 40-year average for the first four months of the year, according to Weatherman Archie Wert's records.
Rainfall for April, however, was almost exactly average, as 1.99 inch was recorded, compared to average of 1.98.
With the added moisture farmers are approaching the planting season with increasing optimism.
County Agricultural Agent Harold Ingalls said Wednesday oats and alfalfa are practically all in and up, with oats showing the best stand he has seen in "many" years.

Use Sargent Silo Lumps In... Preserving Grass Silage

When green forage is placed in a compact mass in a silo for a time the plant cells continue to live and to breathe, using up oxygen that is entrapped. In five hours practically all of the oxygen has disappeared. This prevents the development of mold. Acid forming bacteria multiply rapidly in the silage, and in 48 hours each gram of silage juice (about 1/4 teaspoonful) may contain one hundred million bacteria. These bacteria attack the sugars and develop acetic and lactic acid; without enough sugars for the bacteria to work on, putrefaction or rotting develops. The production of acid is the most important change in the process. Acidity prevents the growth of undesirable bacteria and exclusion of air prevents the development of mold. The amount of acid developed in the silage depends largely on the percentage of sugars that is ensiled. Alfalfa and clovers contain practically no sugar and grasses suitable for grass silage contain relatively small amounts of sugars for conversion to acids. It is necessary to add a preservative to produce a quality silage from legumes or grasses.

Advantages Of Grass Silage

1. You can put up hay anytime in the field cured hay.
2. More feed value can be saved with silage. This is especially true of protein and carotene. (Carotene is the material from which an animal makes Vitamin A). An experiment conducted at the USDA Research Center, Beltsville, Md., showed 86% of the protein was saved in grass silage. Fifteen times as much of the carotene was saved in grass silage as in the field cured hay.
3. Grass silage saves storage space. By putting up both grass and corn you have a silo in use the year round.
4. Grass silage is especially good when pastures dry up in August and September. Cows will maintain their milk production on grass silage and often times show a gain.

Is An Upright Silo Necessary?

Upright silos are very good if you have one. However, very good results are being obtained with trench silos or piling it on the ground as silage stacks.

Molasses Is Best Preservative

Most of our agriculture schools recommend 200 lbs. of grain per ton of green forage or some type of molasses be used as a preservative. We recommend 30 lbs. per ton of Silo Lumps, a molasses preservative. Molasses is very high in sugar and the more sugar you have, the better job of preserving it will do.

What Is Best Time to Harvest Various Crops?

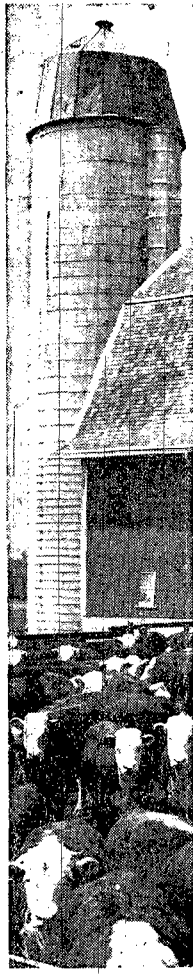
Purdue University Circular 333 states: "Crops cut before they become too mature contain a higher percentage of protein, carry more carotene and less crude fibre than crops that are allowed to fully mature. Much of the potential feeding value of hay crops is lost every year by delaying cutting too long."

Tonnage of Hay and Silage

Alfalfa or clover when properly cured will run about 15% moisture. The same crop made into silage will run from 70 to 80% moisture. You generally obtain 4 to 5 tons of silage from the same acreage where you would obtain 1 ton of hay, because in hay making some tonnage is lost in shattered leaves.

Comparison of Grass and Corn Silages

Good grass silage can readily replace corn silage. It should be remembered, however, that grass silage does not contain as much total nutrients per ton as corn silage. On the average, it contains about 90 percent as much total digestible nutrients.



How to Add Preservative

Figure 50 lbs. of Sargent Silo Lumps to the ton and spread this in the bottom of the wagon and then chop the hay on top of it.

Grass Silage for Dairy Cattle

For dairy cattle, grass silage has a feeding value of 80 to 90 percent of corn silage because of its higher moisture content.

Grass Silage for Beef Cattle

For beef cattle in the feed lot grass silage is similar to feeding cattle on pasture. In other words, you get a much cheaper gain.

HERE AND THERE With Your County Agent

Corn Needs Nitrogen
Research during recent years has shown that corn yields can be stepped up through the increased use of nitrogen. Those reporting on these tests qualify this statement by adding, "with a readily available supply of phosphorus and potash and under normal weather and moisture conditions."

No general recommendation can fit all conditions, particularly of phosphorus and potash. The application of 40 to 80 pounds of available nitrogen on second and third year corn has generally given increases of five to eight bushels for each 20 pounds of nitrogen applied.

Hog Production Goals
A standard of goals for hogs that will please both producer and consumer have been listed as follows:

- 1. Sows to farrow and save 10 or more pigs per litter.
- 2. Pigs to make their gains on 300 pounds or less of feed per 100 pounds gain.
- 3. To weigh 200 pounds per head at 154 days.
- 4. Carcasses to measure 31 inches in length with no more than 1.5 inches of backfat.

We don't expect many hog producers will meet these goals, but it has been done in supervised programs conducted in several states.

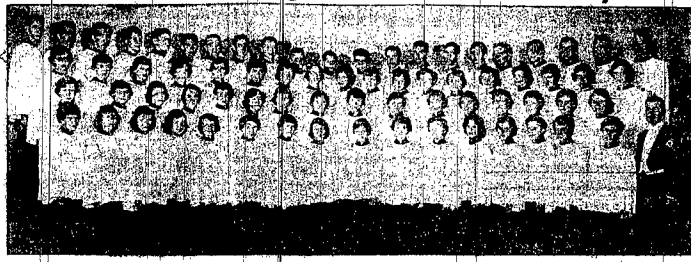
