Junior-Senior Banquet Held Sunday Night

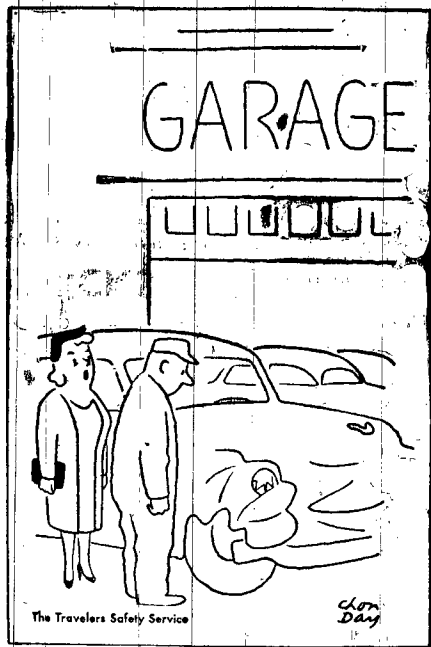

Sunday will open the 14-game league schedule in both divisions. An all-star game will be played in midseason.

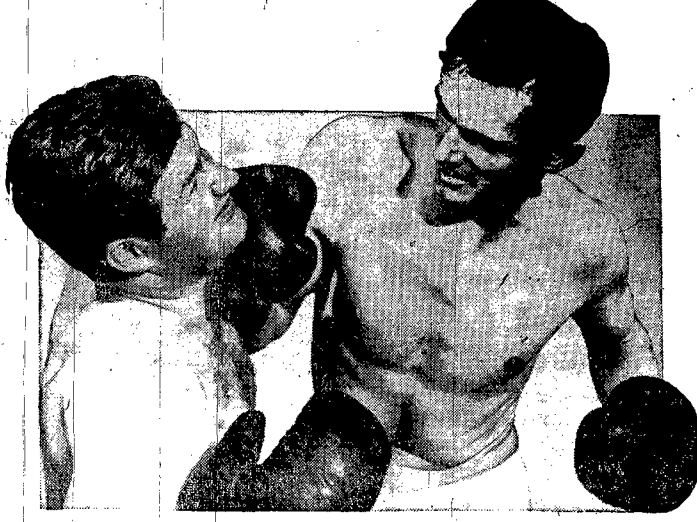
