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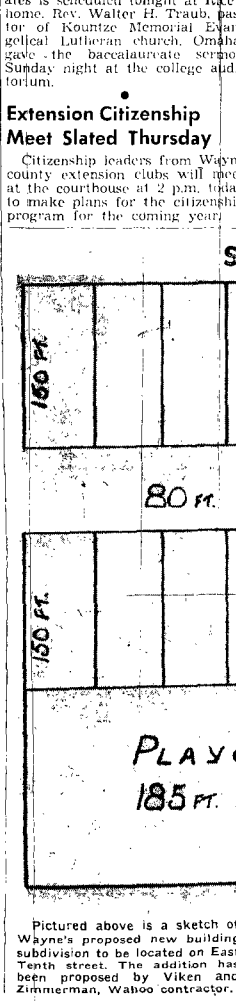
### Treasurer Boyd Appointed New Winside Postmaster

Doris Wentzel was named Wayne High valedictorian at commencement exercises Friday night at the city auditorium. She was awarded the Nebraska church college scholarship.

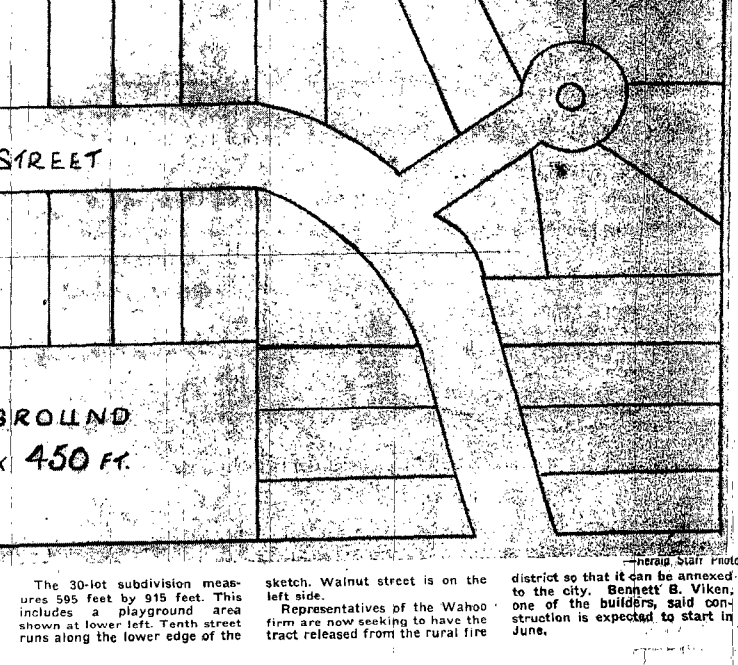

# Cereal And Milk Make Glamour Souffle

Crissy-Top Corn Flake Souffle  
 2 tablespoons butter  
 2 tablespoons flour  
 2 cups milk  
 1 1/2 cups grated American cheese  
 2 1/2 cups corn flakes  
 4 eggs, separated  
 1 teaspoon salt  
 1/2 teaspoon dry mustard  
 Melt butter, add flour, and stir to a smooth paste. Add milk gradually, cooking low heat, stirring constantly, until thickened. Add cheese and stir until melted. Crush 2 cups of the corn flakes slightly; add to cheese sauce. Beat egg yolks with salt and mustard. Stir hot mixture gradually over the yolks. Beat egg whites until stiff and fold in cheese mixture. Turn into 2-quart casserole. Sprinkle remaining 1/2 cup corn flakes around edge of center of casserole. Bake in a slow oven (325° F.) about 50 minutes. Yield: 6 servings.

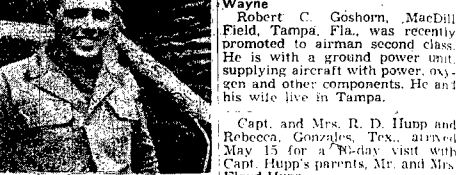

Horn Fly Control
Horn flies may be controlled with several insecticides applied to burlap back rubbers. Circular 1568 tells how these very small blood-sucking flies, as always present wherever cattle are pastured during the summer, may be successfully controlled.

Houseflies have also started to emerge and will increase with amazing rapidity if warm weather continues. A few houseflies can produce several millions within the next sixty days. A general cleanup around the farm is in order. A new insecticide called Malathion, when mixed with sweet baits, is proving very effective for control in barns. Baits are made by mixing one cup of 50 percent Malathion, one cup of molasses and three gallons of water. Malathion is definitely a poison and should be handled with caution. It should never be used in homes or milk houses or sprayed on cattle.

Keep Eggs Cold
Eggs, so plentiful and such good buys this season, need to be kept cold just as other protein foods do. Coding eggs promptly after gathering from the hen's nest is important because the temperature on the egg when laid is around 105 degrees F. But eggs also need to be kept cold—right up to the time they are used.

Best temperature for holding egg quality for short periods is from about 35 to 45 degrees F. If kept at room temperature—70 to 80 F.—eggs may drop in quality in a few days. Above 80 F. they lose quality over fast. Thus eggs lose quality during shipping in a hot truck, in unrefrigerated store rooms or ordinary market counters or while left in a hot car or out in the kitchen. That is why it pays to buy from markets where eggs are kept under refrigeration and sold from refrigerated display counters. It also saves quality—the quality you pay for—to put eggs in the home refrigerator promptly and keep them there until used.

Test Soils Now
The soil testing laboratory at Lincoln reports that they are now operating at only one-half of capacity. The big push in soil samples comes in the winter and early spring which makes for delayed reports on soil testing results. Now is the ideal time to get those soil samples so that the test information can be studied before another crop year.

Pocket Gopher Control
Now is the best time to control pocket gophers which have been active for some time. Traps or poisons may be used as a method of control. Baits are probably more satisfactory and easier to use in large installations. Carrots or potatoes with strychnine or poisoned oats or wheat are good pocket gopher baits. Instructions may be found in Extension Circular 1544, "Pocket Gopher Control" to be had at your county agent's office.
