 Total Wayne rainfall for May was 4.37 inches—1.33 inches over the 40-year average of 3.24 for the period.
 May rains brought total rainfall for the first five months of 1954 to 11.07 inches. Average for the period is 6.83 inches. This gives Wayne a surplus of 4.24 inches for the year thus far.
Getting Wetter
 According to Recorder Wort, Wayne is becoming a wetter county year by year.
 While rainfall for the first five months of the year averages 6.83 inches over a 40-year period, the average for the last 10 years has been consistently higher, 9.27 inches.
 Average rainfall for a year is 22.30 over the 40 years, but for the last 10 years that average has increased to 26.61, a jump of 4.34 inches.
 Sunday evening's rain was shown on weather records for Monday, because readings are taken from 5 p. m. to 5 p. m.



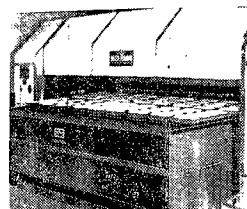

20 Years Ago

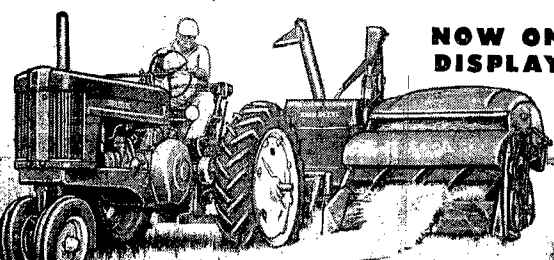

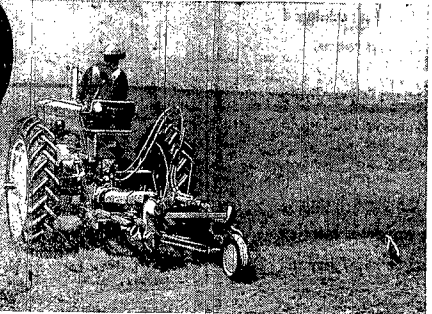

Fertility Shows
The dark green of many oat fields observed while driving out in the county indicates use of fertilizer has really been stepped up. Those fields that are sparse and yellow are the exception but the contrast certainly emphasizes the need for adding fertility. The present prospects for a good oat crop are the best in several years.
The rains are making the farmers smile, particularly those who had un-sprouted corn lying in dry surface soil. We are especially fortunate in missing those torrential showers until the corn gets well started.
Alfalfa has apparently recovered from the sharp freeze in early May although the first cutting is delayed and considerably lighter than was anticipated early.
Ray Agler, Jr. reports that sweet clover weevils are at work in a new seeding. The experts tell us that ordinarily these pests quit feeding in June and thus spare the new seedlings. It wasn't so last year and makes us rather dubious

now. They can be controlled by spraying with insecticides such as DDT. The job needs to be done promptly if sweet clover weevil damage is observed.
Weed Control
We have had several inquiries about control of morning glory in oat fields. Oats may be damaged considerably by the use of 2,4-D but generally speaking the beneficial effects of weed elimination will be greater than possible crop damage.
The least damage will be done if 2,4-D spraying is done when the oats are in the boot stage, before heading. On heavily infested spots where the crop is apt to be smothered anyhow, spraying should be done now.
All of the latest information on controlling weeds in field crops with 2,4-D is available in bulletin form at our office in the courthouse.
Local Donors Award Trips
It seems to us that providing opportunity and encouragement for young folks to spend several days together with others at camps and regional meetings is certainly worthwhile.
During June Wayne county will have 15 4-H club members attending such meetings with the majority of fees provided by local donors.

June 14 a similar group convenes at Chadron State park for annual conservation camp.
The last three days of June are set for our annual district 4-H camp at Stanton. Wayne county had some 60 members attending last year.
Donors providing the means for attending these events include the agriculture committee of the Wayne Chamber of Commerce, the Wayne Kiwanis club, the First National bank, Sherry Brothers, Seyler Motors and Dr. John Edmundo.
Corn Test Plots
The local FFA Chapter, supervised by Ag Instructor St. Burnett, has planted a corn test plot, the results of which should prove interesting.
