

City Council Buys Site for Swimming Pool

City Council Passes \$311,000 Budget Ordinance Tuesday

Mill Levy to Be Decided Next Month

Wayne's city council Tuesday night passed an appropriations ordinance estimating expenditures for the coming year at \$311,440. This figure is about \$10,000 over last year, mainly because of extensions to the water works, sewer and street facilities and additional funds for the library.

The new estimate is not a true picture of city expenditures for the year, however. Expenses for the fiscal year which ended Apr. 30 were approximately \$138,540 compared to the appropriations of \$272,500.

Local taxpayers will have biggest interest in the figures when the city tax levy is determined probably at the council's first meeting in July. The levy must be set by July 15. Last year's levy was 14.4 mills. Indications are that the levy will be about the same this year, including a half-mill levy for swimming pool bonds.

Wayne's city band concert of the summer season will be presented Friday night at Bressler park. Director Earl Green announced today.

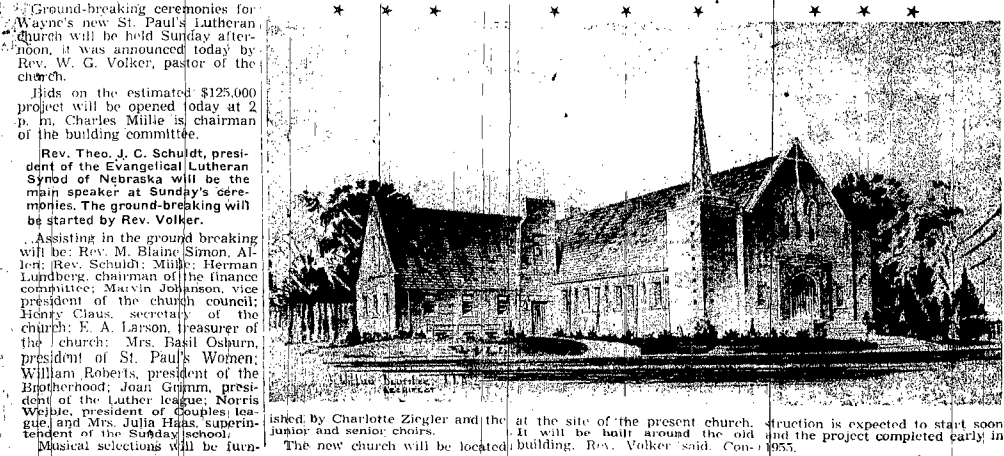
Subdivision Petition Now at Clerk's Office

Wayne will be host to a combined Brown Swiss-Guernsey Dairy show June 18 at the ball park. Judging will begin at 10 a. m.

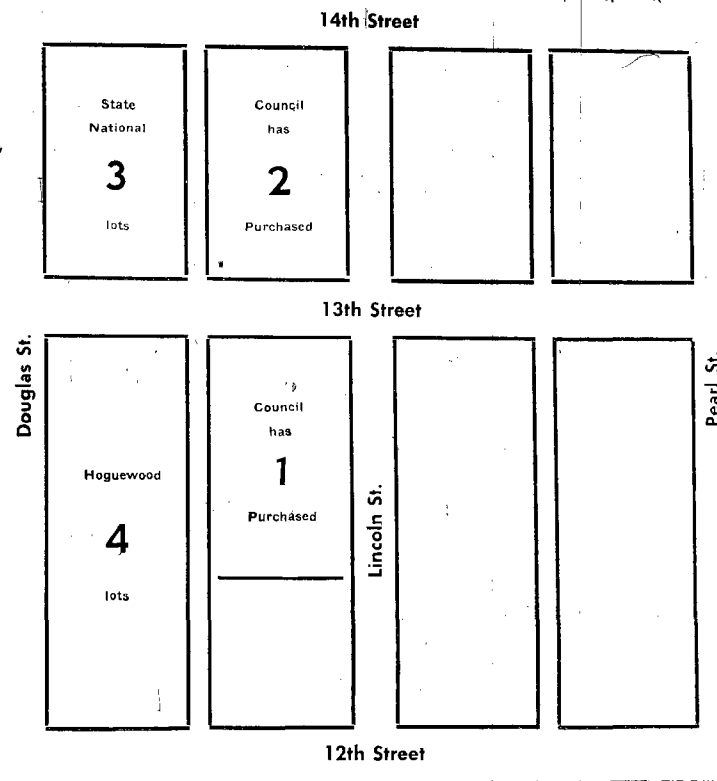
Brown Swiss breeders are expected to show 30 animals while 40 Guernseys are expected to compete for honors. These will not include 4-H animals, also to be shown.

Fair Board President Harry Craven and Secretary Al Bahr said the grant will be used to construct a new 4-H building with rest rooms and water works. Work on the project is expected to get underway this summer.

Steel Pool Priced at \$27,000

Wayne now has property on which to build its new swimming pool. City councilmen voted Tuesday night to purchase lots on the intersection of Thirteenth and Lincoln for location of the pool.

Purchase price of the 14 lots was \$3,500. Eight were purchased from Mrs. Levi Thompson for \$3,000 and six from Mrs. Helen Sierken and Vernor M. Hughes for \$500.

The sketch at left shows the location of the lots purchased. They are located two blocks west of the National Guard armory. Figure 1 indicates the location of Mrs. Thompson's lots. This tract measures 150 by 200 feet. The Sierken-Hughes lots are shown by figure 2. They measure 150 by 180 feet. Thirteenth street is a 60-foot street. It has not been cut through between the two tracts. Total size of the tract available thus would measure 150 by 440 feet.

The pool would be located on the Thompson lots to provide access to sewer facilities for drainage. It is impossible to place it on the north tract as the lots are over the crest of a hill and could not be serviced by the city's sewer system.

Figure 3 indicates lots now owned by the State National bank. It has been indicated that they will be made available to the city. Lots belonging to the Hoguewood estate are shown by figure 4.

The council's action Tuesday followed taking of options of the tracts last week. Engineer Jim Thiburn said, "I don't know of any better place among the sites available."

The council also heard an interesting discussion on steel swimming pools and filtration equipment by a representative of a filter system company.

Steel Pool Estimate

This representative quoted a price of \$27,000 for a steel pool erected in Wayne. This would be for the pool only, which would measure 40 by 100 feet with a 35 by 30 foot diving area. The diving area would be in a "tee" adjoining the pool proper. A filter system for such a pool was estimated at \$7,000. A pool of this size would accommodate about 500 persons, the representative said.

In discussing steel pools, he suggested the council take optional bids on steel pools to get a comparison in prices. Central City recently took bids on both types.

Work on the two bond issues necessary to finance the pool is also progressing. They involve \$10,000 in issues of \$35,000 and \$5,000. These will be handled through both Wayne banks.

Farmers Can Apply Now for Wheat Acreage

Farmers on land on which no wheat was seeded for grain for all the years 1952, 1953 and 1954 may apply for a 1955 wheat acreage allotment. It was announced this week by County ASC Chairman Thomas P. Roberts.

To be considered for an allotment on a farm which had no wheat seeded for grain for any of those years, the farmer must apply in writing to his county ASC committee by June 25.

Blank application forms are available at the County ASC office for use in filing requests for allotments.

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An Easy Way to End Surplus

National Dairy Month started June 1 with the National Dairy Council and all segments of the industry striving to attain a goal of three glasses of milk a day for every American.

Agriculture Secretary Benson told a June Dairy Month luncheon in Chicago last week that the objective was a worthy one, and if met would help ease the nation's dairy surplus problem.

Mr. Benson noted that government's vast holdings in surplus dairy products are costly to buy and costly to store.

"Since I began talking to you," he remarked, "the storage bill on dairy products has been about \$1,000."

"In terms of our large and growing population, however, these surpluses represent little more than two or three additional glasses of milk a week per person."

Milk drinkers and non-milk drinkers should join the National Dairy Council this month, and every month, in helping to achieve the three-glasses-a-day target.

Is it a further attempt to narrow consumer buying into tighter operating hours? Or is employee pressure, for the missed day off, too great to bear?

Frankly we'd like to know. It seems a bit silly the present way we are handling it.

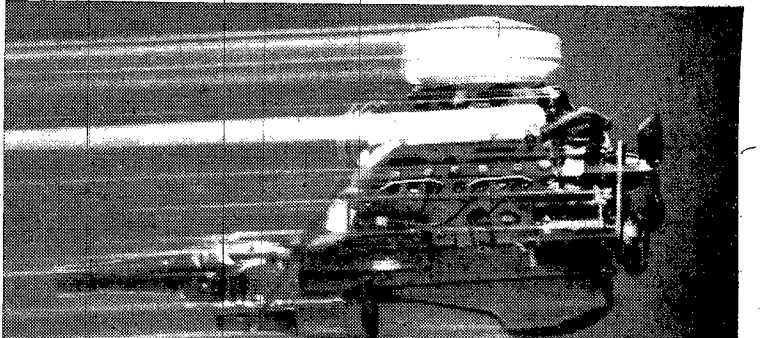

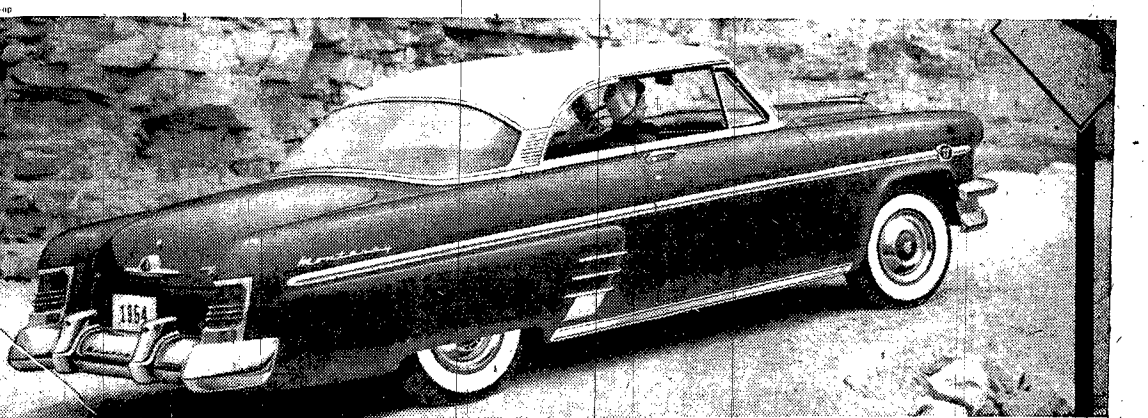
