Will it be a "kneehigh by the 4th of July? A "yardstick" to measure corn grown in Wayne county was taken to the A. P. Winston farm 1 1/2 miles north of Wayne Thursday to begin a check on this question. Janet Banister, 13-year-old daughter of Clark Banister, who farms the land, assisted Bill Richardson of the Wayne Herald in taking the first reading. Growth had reached six inches when the first reading was made Thursday. Each Tuesday the same stalk will be checked and photographed to record its growth during the week. An average stalk in a 36-acre field on an average farm was chosen for the test. The corn shown was planted May 18. The field lies on the west side of Highway 15 just south of Dog creek and the stalk stands 11 rows inside the field directly west of the field entrance. Passers-by are urged to watch its growth each time they pass the field.

Speech therapists who will participate in this year's clinic include Ernest Burg, professor of remedial speech at the University of Nebraska, and Alice Livingston, formerly speech correction specialist for the Omaha public schools.

In connection with the clinic, a college class in remedial speech will be offered at which time teachers-in-trainee may observe the techniques employed by the specialists.

## St. Paul's Lets Contracts On New \$132,000 Church

Construction of Wayne's new St. Paul Lutheran church is expected to start within a week, it was announced today by Rev. W. G. Volker. Bids on the \$130,000 project were opened at a meeting of church officials last Thursday.

Bids totalled \$132,154.90. Successful contractors were: Christensen Construction, Pender, general; Tiedtke Plumbing and Heating, Wayne; plumbing and heating, and Robert Jeffrey, Wayne, electrical.

Christensen submitted a bid of \$110,685 for the general contract. Other bids were: Klinger Construction company, Sioux City, \$114,387; Karl Ott, Wayne, \$116,649; Ho-Lie Construction company, Sioux City, \$121,750; and J. H. Hesse Construction, Pender, \$125,500.

Tiedtke's bid of \$15,796.15 was lower than four others submitted. They were: Martin Plumbing and Heating, Norfolk, \$16,147; C. W. Suter, South Sioux City, \$17,851; Fremont Engineering company, Fremont, \$18,800; and Sterling Wenke, Pender, \$19,837.

Paul Shyre, who adapted Poe's works for dramatic presentation, also directs and acts in the production. Shyre, a graduate of the American Academy of Dramatic Arts, is assisted by Cleopatra Foster and Michael Tolan. All three have achieved recognition on the Broadway stage, radio and television.

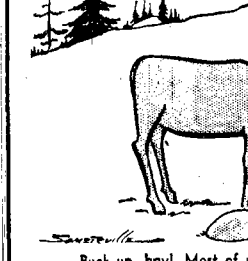

# Nebraska Farm Outlook



## FARM NEWS REVIEW AND FORECAST

"Our Roots Are In This Land"

### Efficient Use of Farm Labor Through Use of Machinery

The U. S. farm labor report for March indicated that farm wage rates increased 1.5 cents per hour from January, 1953 to January, 1954. Although this increase is small, the trend is in the opposite direction from that of prices received for most farm products. Barring unexpected reversals in prices of farm products and wages of labor, net farm incomes are likely to be less in 1954 than in 1953.

One way to check the decline in net farm income is to increase the efficiency with which labor is used on the farm. Better planning to eliminate waste motion and to keep labor fully employed at profitable work is essential. Successful farmers will use machinery efficiently. This may involve using farm machinery on more than the usual acres of each crop.

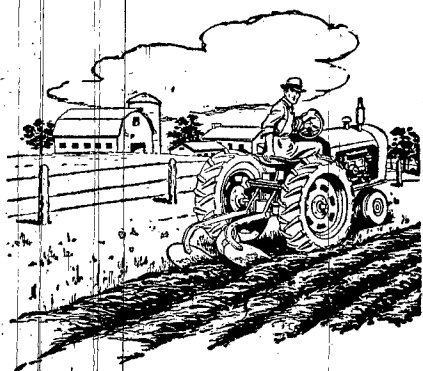

Custom rates are usually based upon averages. Consequently, the man who used his machinery on more acres than the average and is efficient in use of machines can show profit at average rates.

The average cost (not including labor) of operating a two-row mounted corn picker was 92 cents per acre when used on 321 acres. If custom rates are set at that figure the man who picks less than 124 acres of corn will lose \$1.14 for every acre picked.

The man who picks between 625 and 749 acres of corn can make a nice profit at 92 cents per acre.

The reduction in unit costs varies with each machine, but without fail shows a decline up to the point where repairs and upkeep become excessive or where other costs increase more than fixed costs decline. Custom work should not be



expanded to where it causes the operator to neglect his farm business. Full use of machines is an effective way to make labor that operates the machine more efficient.

### Commodity Briefs

#### CATTLE



Prices of top grades of slaughter cattle are showing a seasonal weakness, while prices of middle grades have strengthened somewhat. Numbers slaughtered under Federal inspection dropped below that of a year ago for the first time during last half of April.

#### HOGS



Hog prices continue strong but many market experts expect prices to begin to decline about mid-July. Indications are that the increased spring farrowing over last year will be twice as large as earlier expected. Price declines are not expected to be disastrous.

#### POULTRY



On April 1, producers had 19% more young chickens on farms than a year earlier. With this large an increase, the outlook for late 1954 egg prices is not very favorable for producers. Egg prices now are about 33% below a year ago in Nebraska.

#### DAIRY



Lowering the support price on butterfat from 67 cents to 56 cents reduced the price received by Nebraska producers by about 40 cents per cwt. on grade "A" milk and by about \$1.00 on ungraded milk. Min. price for "A" set by Fed. Market Adm.—not ungraded.

### The Hog Situation

Push pigs for the early market! Hog numbers are up 10% over last year. Hog prices will follow the usual seasonal trend next fall—will not go up in November and December as in 1953. Farrow the usual number of sows in the fall of 1954.

The hog-corn ratio will still be favorable through most of 1954. That is the gist of the hog outlook. Let's look at the details.

Pigs saved in the fall of 1953 were down 9% from a year earlier. Most of these have been marketed by now. The December 1 survey indicated that farmers intended to farrow 6% more sows in the spring of 1954 than a year earlier. The increase will probably be considerably higher. During December hog prices jumped to \$26. Under similar conditions farmers have increased pork production. No doubt this situation has caused some farmers to keep more sows than they planned earlier.

#### Expected Farrowings Higher

A later survey indicates a 9% increase in sows kept for farrowing in the Corn Belt. The increase was particularly high in winter farrowings—December to March. The high prices paid for brood sows this spring—\$125 to \$150—is another indication of more farmers wanting to raise pigs.

Cold storage stocks are down about one-third from last year—406 million pounds on March 1 as compared with 600 million a year earlier. Lard stocks are down and the price has strengthened materially. This will tend to strengthen hog prices.

#### Record Feed Stocks

The feed supply will depend on 1954 grain production. Stocks in storage now are excessively high. Much of the acreage taken out of corn production will be seeded to grain sorghums, barley or oats.

With normal yields total grain production will be ample to hold prices down to support levels—and possibly much lower at harvest time. This would mean a continuation of the very favorable hog-corn ratio. At present, 100 pounds of live hog will exchange for 18 to 20 bushels of corn. The long-time average is 12.5 bushels.

### Getting More From Your Roughage

Nebraska farmers are expected increase the amount of roughage in the dairy ration and reduce the volume of high protein feed. The Nebraska feed report of April 1 indicates a drop of 4% in the consumption of concentrates compared to April 1, 1953. The reduction in the use of concentrates is expected to be even larger in the months ahead.

Farmers have indicated several factors which prompted a slow-down in purchase of high protein feed: the drop in governmental price supports on dairy products and the high price of high protein feeds. More home grown feeds will be used in the ration. Acreage allotments on wheat



#### Early Price Break Seen

Hog prices can be expected to remain strong throughout the summer. The remaining hogs can well be fed to 250 pounds. Some predict \$30 hogs in June. Prices usually reach a peak in August or early September, but the increased farrowings during the past winter may lessen the expected increase.

It should pay to push hogs for an early fall market. Heavy marketing of spring pigs in October and November could result in a decided break in prices. Some predict prices as low as \$16 by November and December. Unless hog producers become panicky and rush their pigs to market, prices might not drop that low.

Barring increased unemployment the hog-corn ratio will probably remain favorable at least until the peak numbers of spring pigs arrive on the market. It is likely that hog production will remain quite profitable into 1955.

Fall pigs should be profitable even though they will not sell on as strong a market as the early spring pigs. Any surplus of bred sows will likely sell high in August.

Even though lard prices are stronger again, lardy hogs will sell at a disadvantage. The trend is strongly toward the meat-type hog. The lardy hogs are discounted more severely at the market than they were several years ago. The type of hog marketed will be a more important factor than it has been in the past.

and corn will tend to leave more for grass and legume crops.

Prospects for good spring growth in grasses and legumes appear to be very encouraging in almost all Nebraska areas. The quality of feed and total nutrients retained will depend on weather conditions, maturity and harvesting methods used at harvest time.

#### Weather Losses High

Many farmers do not realize the rapidity of the loss of nutrients from weather damage in hay. The crude protein content of many samples of alfalfa hay as analyzed (dry basis) by the Department of Agricultural Chemistry at the University of Nebraska, ranged from 6 to 16%.

The low quality of samples contained 120 pounds of crude protein per ton compared to 320 pounds from the better samples. The vitamin A or carotene content ranged from practically zero to 42,000 International Units per pound of hay.

Research carried on in many sections of the country on nutrient losses in forage under different methods of harvest and preservation as shown below:

At the present price of protein supplements, it would cost about \$25.00 to bring a ton of the low quality hay up to the protein content of the top quality hay. Farmers should take advantage of good haying practices and reduce the "cash out of pocket costs" by preserving more food nutrients in home grown hay.

Almost all of the dry matter and nutrient losses for field-cured hay and barn-dried hay occurred in the field whereas silage losses occurred principally during storage in the silo.

### ECONOMIC SITUATION

The agricultural outlook for 1954 indicates that prices and incomes to farmers during the remainder of the year are likely to continue only slightly under 1953 levels. During the first quarter of 1954, both prices received by farmers and cash receipts from farm marketings averaged almost 3% below the same period in 1953. If weather conditions this spring and summer are not abnormal, total farm production and marketings in 1954 may be only slightly less than a year ago.

Production cutbacks on wheat and cotton may not be fully offset by prospects for increased

production of feed grains and most livestock products. Average prices received by farmers declined last fall, but have improved somewhat since then.

Prices may decline some again later in the year under the impact of the new harvests and increasing hog production. However, government price supports will continue to cushion the price effects of large supplies. Farm operators' realized net income will likely show some reduction this year, but probably not more than 4 or 5% from the 1953 total of 12.8 billion dollars.
