Tornado Clean-Up Continues; Storm Damages 25 Farms Thursday Night

Woman Dies At Winside; One Injured

Clean-up work was continuing this week on tornado-stricken farms in Wayne county. Friends and neighbors were lending assistance to about 25 farmers whose farm buildings and homes were damaged or destroyed by tornadoes Thursday night.

Relief funds are being started to give disaster victims financial assistance.

The high winds believed to be at least four separate tornadoes struck about 10 p. m. Thursday night killing Mrs. Bertha Nelson, Winside, and injuring her son, Nels. Nearly 100 farm buildings, 12 homes, a church and three schools were either destroyed or damaged.

Emergency workers provided 150 meals and 173 lunches for clean-up crews in the county Friday. About double that number were served Saturday.

Watson Wins at Toastmasters

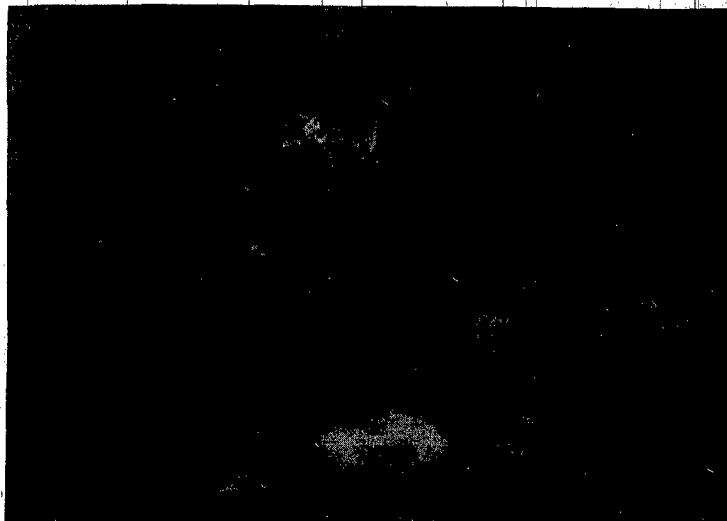
Albert Watson was voted the top speaker at the regular meeting of Wayne Toastmasters Monday night at the Woman's club rooms. His topic was "Civilization."

Cut Carroll And Hoskins Real Estate

Wayne county's 1954 assessed valuation will be approximately \$830,000 less than the 1953 figure, it was announced this week by County Assessor Henry Arp.

Board Cuts Carroll, Hoskins

Arp was forced to reduce his total valuation Tuesday when the county board of equalization cut real estate values for Carroll and Hoskins. Carroll real estate was slashed 25 percent and Hoskins 21 percent. Carroll residents had asked a 48 percent decrease to bring about equalization with Wayne and other towns within the county.

Wayne's Valuation for 1954

Wayne's valuation for 1954 is nearly \$800,000 higher than in 1953. It will total \$4,555,465 as compared with \$4,746,055. This means each mill levied by local taxing agencies will bring \$4,555 instead of \$4,476.

The table of valuations shows

all rural precincts in the county dropped in personal valuations while cities and towns showed an increase. This is due to new schedules set up for valuation of cattle and tractors. There was also a reduction in the number of each of these items assessed. Cattle valuation for the county dropped \$1,914,000. Tractors were cut \$272,000.

In 1953 a total of 56,534 cattle

were assessed at \$6,527,440. This year 51,880 were valued at \$4,541,000. Arp explained this by stating stock cattle were assessed at \$130 per head in 1953 and \$90 per head in 1954. Steers 18 to 30 months of age had values of \$130 and \$100, respectively.

Tractor valuations were also cut

drastically. A 1950 tractor assessed at \$1,260 in 1953, was reduced to \$805 for 1954. Another 1952 tractor was slashed from \$1,680 to \$960.

Corn totals were also down from

a year ago. The valuation for 1953 is \$2,119,166, compared with \$1,734,630 in 1953. Hogs, however, showed an increase of about \$200,000.

The drop in valuation in rural

precincts means levy-making agencies in those areas will have to stretch on until in their efforts in order to make the dollars go as far as possible.

Arp's assessment figures will

now go to the state board of equalization which will review all the figures.

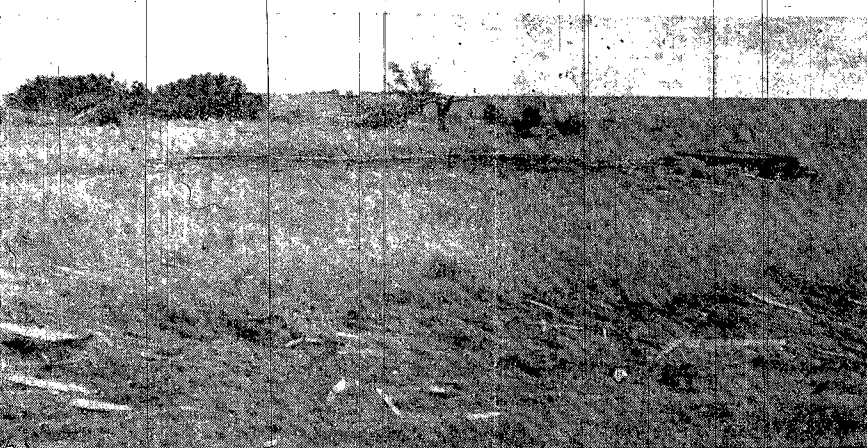

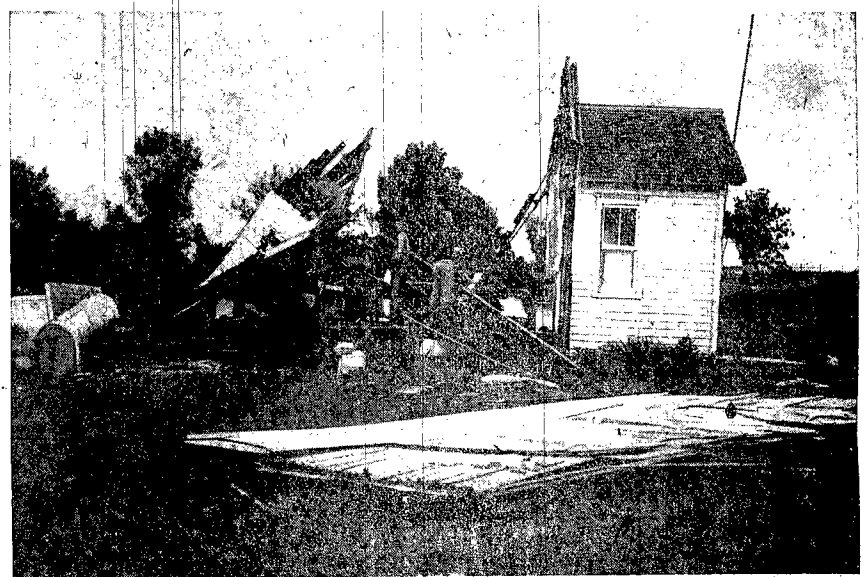
