



candidate, there are contests for sheriff, first and third district commissioners and IREA directors in the coming elections. In the 1952 election only one post had a contest. That race was for commissioner of the second district. However piblic spirited a citizen is lifelieult to attract him to public office where the job is full-time and the pay is low. In private business, good men in key positions are paid well. Many governing bodies at the local level are beginning to realize the wisdom of the policy of paying for good men.

Wayne county, however, has been exceedingly fortunate in recent years in having good officers willing to work for low pay. Even though they may have other sources of income, they still are required to put in long hours at less than the pay of many unskilled laborers.

But it is a healthy sign when elected officials have competition for their jobs. It indicates interest in the functioning of the office. We are glad to see it and hope it continues. At this time we hold no brief for any of the candidates—we just like to see more than one candidate for each job. Despite this apparently improving picture there is one county post—that of

county superintendent—without a candidate. An important job, one calling for special qualifications, it has attracted no one. The job pays \$2600 now, which will be increased to \$3,000 Jan. 1. How many persons who can meet the qualifications will accept the job?

County offices in which there is no opposition include assessor, county clerk, clerk of district court, county attorney and treasurer.

Unopposed candidates and their offices are: Henry Arp, assessor; C. A. Bard, clerk: David J. Hamer, sr., clerk of district court; Charles McDermott, county attorney; Leona Bahde, treasurer, appointed to finish unexpired term of Jean Boyd who recently resigned.

The ballot doesn't indicate an exciting election, but at least the situation is improved over last election. For that we are glad.


