

ASC Outlines New Rules for County Committee Elections

Nominating Committees To Be Set

Wayne county will have two new ASC committees this fall under a new procedure set up recently by the government to govern annual ASC elections coming up.

No date has been set for the elections but they will probably be held in September or October.

Under the new procedure, a county election board will choose three farmers from each precinct to act as nominating committees.

Member of the election board will be County Agent Harold Ingalls, District FIA Supervisor Lawrence Fuchs, Hartington, SCS Farm Planner Jack Smith and Farmers Union President Ernest Steffen.

A new rule says no persons can serve more than three years as a member of either the precinct or county committee. This would mean County Chairman T. P. Robert, Wayne, and Committeeman William A. Thomas, Winside, will be ineligible for office. Committeeman Otto Gerleman is eligible for re-election but must be nominated and elected in the coming elections.

After the county committee is selected, it will appoint the county officer manager. The county committee will take office the first of the month following its election. Present members will hold office until that time.

Township nominating committees cannot be members of regular precinct ASC committee. Each nominating committee is to name 10 candidates from which the three ASC committeemen and two alternates will be elected.

All elected chairmen will be delegates to the convention to elect members of the county committee. Vice chairmen will attend if the chairman cannot.

Puppet Show Scheduled At WSTC Tuesday Night

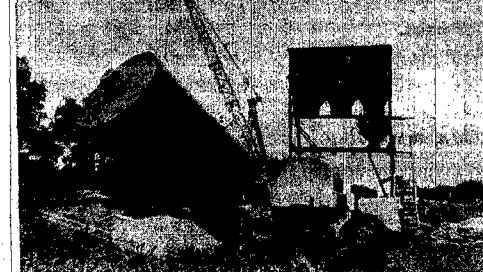


All the glamour and gaiety of a Broadway stage opening night will be presented at the Wayne State auditorium Tuesday night when the college special programs series offers the Lords puppets.

Interest High in Primary as Three Seek Sheriff's Office

Wayne county's 1954 primary election drew more interest this week when two more candidates filed the state with last minute filings.

Frank Woehler, Wayne, made it a three-way battle for the nomination for sheriff when he filed Thursday afternoon, hours before the filing deadline. Ed H. Glassmeyer, Wayne, had filed for the third district commissioner Wednesday afternoon.

Woehler will be opposing incumbent Hans Tietgen, Wayne, and Emil Dion, Wayne, who had filed earlier. All are on the Republican ticket.

Filed in a three-way race for the third district commissioner's nomination are incumbent Oliver Tietgen, Winside, Glassmeyer, and Gilbert R. Fletcher, Hoskins. They also are all Republicans.

The county office may have to be filled by appointment after the election. County Superintendent Marie Wright did not file for reelection and no other candidates placed their names in contention.

This means the county could get a new superintendent of schools with only one vote at the November general election, providing the write-in winner has the necessary qualifications for the post.

If no such winner is determined, county commissioners must appoint a new superintendent. After Jan. 1, the job will pay \$3,000 under the new salary schedule adopted by commissioners earlier this year.

Further opposition in the primary comes in the race for directors of the Wayne County Rural Public Power district. Ed Gauw, Wayne, and Rolfe Longe, Wakefield, are opposing incumbents Ed Grubb and A. G. Sydow, both of Wayne, on the non-partisan ticket.

Citizens will also have a choice in the district first commissioner's race, although not until the November election. Incumbent Emil Meyer, Wayne Republican, will be opposed by Ben Nissen, Wayne Democrat.

Officers without opposition are county clerk, treasurer, assessor, attorney and clerk of the district court.

In the state legislature, Walter Fenske, Hoskins, has filed against incumbent L. M. Schulz, Rogers.

A total of \$7,000 is now available for erecting the building. This includes a \$500 grant from Ak-Sar-Ben, a similar grant from the county, donations of \$2,000 and individual loans of \$4,000.

He will make an outstanding senator. His current experience with the same legislation that he will deal with in the Senate is an asset to the Republican party and the state."

44 Boards Hike 1953 Requests

County Clerk C. A. Bard this week began work on determining tax levies for Wayne county's 85 school districts.

Estimates from the various school boards prepared at annual meetings June 14 show that more than \$25,000 in additional taxes will be levied for school purposes within the county next year.

Requests for tax funds have increased from \$284,340 in 1953 to \$308,740 in 1954. The 1954 figure does not include requests from Districts 23, 56 and 61, which have not filed their certificates of school tax votes. Bard does not have certificates from Districts 37 and 34 but is expecting them this week.

More than half of the districts have asked increases in tax levies, ranging from \$11,500 in Wayne to \$200 in Districts 21 and 47. Revisions downward were made in 17 districts, ranging from \$1,000 in Districts 1 and 76 to \$10 in District 80. Requests for tax funds remained the same in 21 districts.

Most of the increase requests were made to cover increases in teachers' salaries and building repair. District 82 is asking \$1,500 next year because several children will be sent to kindergarten at Randolph. The district asked no tax money in 1953.

Contracting Districts

Ten county districts will contract with other districts for construction next year. They are 12, 14, 20, 37, 38, 43, 44, 58, 82 and 83. Contracting rates vary in each district and are pegged on a cost per pupil basis. Rates at Wayne schools for other districts are \$3 per week for elementary pupils. Districts 43, 14 and 20 contract with Wayne schools.

In addition to county districts, taxes will also be levied here to pay for pupils attending school in other counties. Two of these are in Dixon county and one each in Stanton and Pierce counties. These levies will be determined by those counties and certified to Wayne county for collection.

A complete list of the tax requests for each district will be published in next week's Wayne Herald.

Salary Increases Show Effect?

Increases in salaries of county officers seem to be attracting more candidates for these all-important jobs.

Although five county offices have unopposed candidates and one office has no candidate, there are contests for sheriff, first and third district commissioners and REA directors in the coming elections.

In the 1952 election only one post had a contest. That race was for commissioner of the second district.

However public spirited a citizen is, it is difficult to attract him to public office where the job is full-time and the pay is low. In private business, good men in key positions are paid well. Many governing bodies at the local level are beginning to realize the wisdom of the policy of paying for good men.

Wayne county, however, has been exceedingly fortunate in recent years in having good officers willing to work for low pay. Even though they may have other sources of income, they still are required to put in long hours at less than the pay of many unskilled laborers.

But it is a healthy sign when elected officials have competition for their jobs. It indicates interest in the functioning of the office. We are glad to see it and hope it continues. At this time we hold no brief for any of the candidates—we just like to see more than one candidate for each job.

Despite this apparently improving picture there is one county post—that of

county superintendent—without a candidate. An important job, one calling for special qualifications, it has attracted no one. The job pays \$2600 now, which will be increased to \$3,000 Jan. 1. How many persons who can meet the qualifications will accept the job?

County offices in which there is no opposition include assessor, county clerk, clerk of district court, county attorney and treasurer.

On the primary ballot the race seems to shape up this way:
Candidates for sheriff—Hans Tietgen, incumbent; Emil Dion, Frank Woehler; all Wayne Republicans.

Candidates for first district commissioner—Emil Meyer, Republican incumbent and Ben Nissen, Democrat, both of Wayne.

Candidates for third district commissioner: Oliver Reichert, Winside, incumbent; Gilbert R. Fletcher, Hoskins and Ed H. Glassmeyer, Wayne, all Republicans.

REA director candidates are incumbents Ed Grubb and A. G. Sydow. They are opposed by Ed Caauwe and Rollie Longe. These posts are non-political.

Unopposed candidates and their offices are: Henry Arp, assessor; C. A. Bard, clerk; David J. Hamer, sr., clerk of district court; Charles McDermott, county attorney; Leona Bände, treasurer, appointed to finish unexpired term of Jean Boyd who recently resigned.

The ballot doesn't indicate an exciting election, but at least the situation is improved over last election. For that we are glad.

Money in the Bank

Grain in the bin is like money in the bank—it needs to be protected and preserved if losses are to be avoided. Insects in stored grain carry huge sums of money every year. The germination of oats may also be seriously damaged by slight heating in the bin. Rats, mice and birds likewise cause untold damage.

Bins should be thoroughly cleaned before storing new crop grain. Spraying bins with a 2½ percent solution of DDT, Methoxychlor or TDE is recommended. For safe storage grains should contain less than 13 percent moisture content when binned.

European Corn Borer

Reports from several farmers indicate a severe infestation of corn borers this year. When 50 or more egg masses per 100 plants are present spraying will usually pay. For detailed information on corn borer control request Extension Circular 1553 from the Extension office.

Storage Space Needed

Prospects for a bumper oats crop plus the necessity of clearing cribs of scaled corn will no doubt find many farmers looking for extra grain storage space in the next 60 days.

In recent years many farmers have sold grain from 30 to 50 cents a bushel under support prices because there was no storage space available.

The Commodity Credit Corporation has extended for another year, through June 30, 1955, the period during which its farm storage facility loans will be available to farmers.

These loans, available through local banks or direct from the local ASC committee, can be used to finance up to 80 percent of the cost of new storage facilities built or bought by farmers for the storage of crops. They are available to producers of wheat, corn, oats, rye, barley and soybeans.

Under a new provision of federal law, any grain producer who has built or remodels grain storage buildings after Dec. 13, 1952, is allowed a federal income tax deduction for amortiza-

tion of the structure over a period of five years following the date of construction.

A resale program for the 1953 crop stored on the farm under CCC loan provides that farm stored stocks of grains can be resold for another program year after the maturity of the original 1953 crop CCC loans.

Farmers can also convert purchase agreements on these commodities, if held in large quantities, into price support loans for the extended period.

Farmers who resale their 1953 crop on the farm will receive a storage payment in full with the help of the new facilities.

A meeting designed to survey the local situation and provide information to farmers, builders and warehousemen will be held in Wayne on the afternoon of July 21. Further information can be had anytime at the local ASC office.

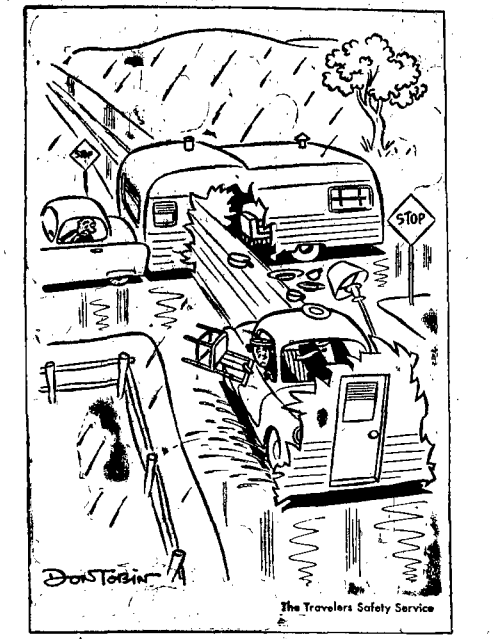

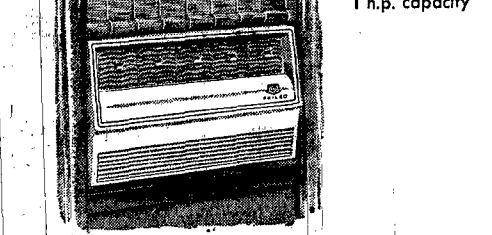
