

Legion Tourney Finals Slated Here Friday

Finals of the annual District III class B Junior Legion and midget baseball tournaments will be held at the Wayne ball park Friday afternoon. It was announced today by Tournament Managers Keith Boughy and Arnold Mau.

The finals were originally scheduled tonight but Tuesday night's rain forced postponement.

Farm Safety for Children, Too!

Children trapped in iceboxes caused the whole nation to take action to remove doors from all abandoned refrigerators. The whole nation's attention centers on a child trapped in a well. Firearms, unsupervised swimming areas, electrical outlets are mentioned as dangerous to children.

Yet these take comparatively few lives as compared with the farm tractor. In six months 285 children were involved in tractor accidents.

NINETY WERE KILLED AND ONLY HALF WERE 14 YEARS OLD.

Children from 8 to 11 commonly do tractor work and many parents boast of the amount of work they accomplish. Children of these ages cannot get driver's licenses in most states, but apparently there is no minimum age for tractor operators, whether on the highway or in the field.

At this season, more and more children are allowed to operate tractors . . . and at

the same time fatalities and injuries increase.

The judgment of these youngsters, unseasoned by experience, can't be good . . . yet they can do a lot of work and save Dad a lot of time and money. Until the accident, that is.

When Dad picks up the crushed body and rushes to the hospital, when he looks at the broken form, hopelessly mangled by a massive farm tractor . . . he'd gladly work those extra hours or hire another hand rather than have his son's lifeless body in his arms.

It is wonderful to have a son who is capable beyond his years, but it is worth the risk to trade the hours he saves you for his injury or death? Think it over. This is Farm Safety Week.

July 27, 1939: Wayne city council, at regular meeting Tuesday evening, decided to have two new

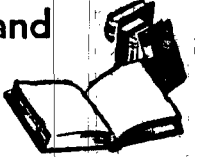

Aid Seed Production

A new tool has been added to those already being used by seed producers in an effort to produce seed of higher quality. This new tool has been gaining in popularity ever since it was first used in 1940. Dinitro compounds and Pentachlorophenol mixed in diesel fuel have been most effective when applied as a spray to the seed crop a few days before harvest. This results in killing the green foliage as well as the weeds which may be present, thus reducing the moisture content of the plants enough to permit direct combining and safe storage.

Earlier tests indicate that much alfalfa and clover seed lost through usual handling methods can be saved by spraying with chemicals and direct combining. Another place where it has been used effectively is in weedy fields of grain and in soybeans particularly.

When Corn Needs Water
Moisture supply during ear and kernel formation rather than the total seasonal supply, makes the big difference in corn yields. In tests at the Nebraska Experiment station seven inches of supplementary irrigation in three applications, made on July 15, 23 and Aug. 1, more than doubled the yield, 144 bu. as compared to 69 bu. for unirrigated.

Earlier and later irrigation were less efficient and delaying irrigation until advanced tasseling yields 35 bu. per acre. Irrigation after silking helped little and after milk stage, none. This emphasizes the critical need for water when tassels and silks are forming.

Corn can reach wide and deep for water. Where plentiful irrigation was supplied test corn plants

drew 93 percent of their needs from the top 30 inches of soil, but non-irrigated corn drew 57 percent of its water from below the 30 inch level.

4-H Talent Contest

Third annual county 4-H talent contest will be held at the Wayne auditorium Thursday, Aug. 5. Each club in the county is invited to participate with musical, vocal or variety skills of their own choosing. A committee of three judges select the top two acts to compete in the District contest which will be held in Wayne Aug. 17.

The top scoring two acts in each of eight districts in Nebraska compete at the state contest to be held during the Nebraska State Fair.

One or more acts are generally chosen from this contest to participate in a national program at Chicago during the National 4-H Club congress meeting in December.

Wayne county has been fortunate in having one of the winning acts in each of the past two district contests.

There is no admission charged at these contests and the public is cordially invited to attend.
