Mrs. Tietgen is chairman of Wayne county chapter of the National Foundation for Infantile Paralysis.

The award, signed by the national president, Basil O'Connor, was presented to Mrs. Tietgen by Clinton Belknap, East Nebraska representative for the organization.

Mrs. Tietgen received the honor at a meeting of the Wayne county chapter where patient care bills were allowed and plans laid for an emergency March of Dimes appeal, set for Aug. 16-31.

The August emergency drive, officials said, is necessary because heavy expenditures this year for a nation-wide testing of trial polio vaccine and increased production of gamma globulin have depleted national funds.

Along with these programs, the foundation has followed its previous programs of patient aid, training of professional personnel and research.

In third district three Republicans are vying for nomination as commissioner.

On the national level seven Republicans and three Democrats have filed for U. S. Senator full term. For the U. S. Senator full term ending January 1955, 16 Republicans and three Democrats have filed.

In the other short term Senatorial vacancies, expiring January, 1959 one Republican and one Democrat have filed.

Seven Republicans and four Democrats have filed for the post of governor.

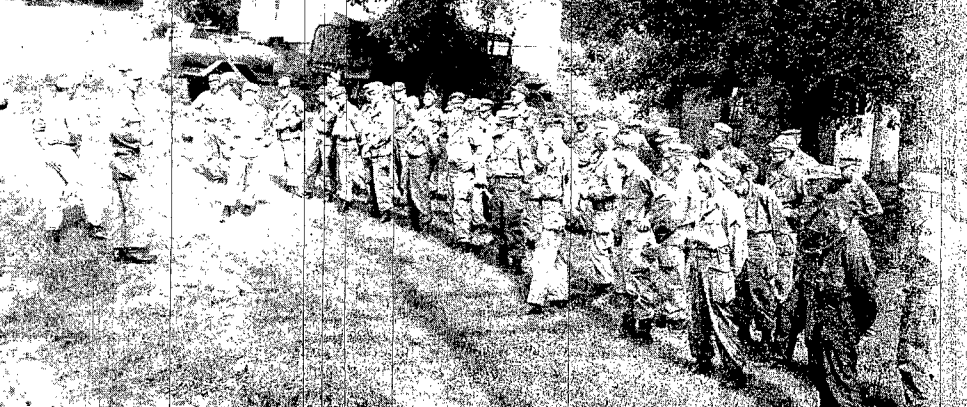

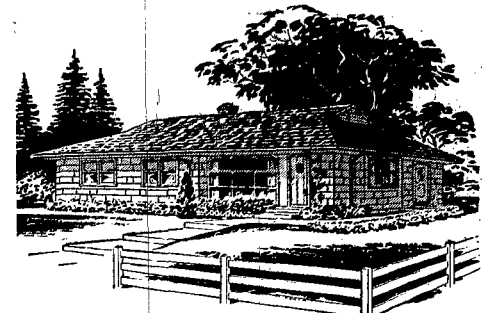

# FARM NEWS REVIEW AND FORECAST

## ... THE ECONOMIC SITUATION ...

The level of national prosperity depends upon how much the nation spends. The more that all spending units spend, the greater is national prosperity. This is because every dollar that is spent is received as income by some person or group. Spendings are income.

A partial reason for the downturn in business activity the past months is that money expenditures have declined. Many heavy goods industries that had earlier experienced a large expansion in response to defense production have now reduced operations because of reduced military

spendings. Consequently, employment has declined resulting in falling income which in turn has reduced spending for consumer goods. This has reduced consumer good production which has reduced employment in consumer goods industries and this in turn has again lowered incomes.

But in many cases, reduction in production was less than reduction in sales (consumption expenditures) resulting in the building up of unsold goods—inventories. Thus the "inventory adjustment period"—that we are now undergoing.

## "Our Roots Are In This Land" C. C. C. Program For on The Farm Storage

Farmers have the responsibility for making sure that suitable storage is available for their 1954 crops of wheat, corn and other grains—either on the farm or in commercial elevators.

Grain storage space is expected to be especially scarce in Nebraska and other Great Plains States if 1954 crop yields are average or above. The large carry-over of grains and oilseed crops plus 1954 production will more than fill the available space in commercial elevators and warehouses.

- 1) Rereal Program—15 cents per bushel per year.
- 2) Farm Storage Facility Loans—four percent.
- 3) Farm Storage Equipment Loans—four percent.
- 4) Fast Depreciation for Income Tax—five year.

## Lamb Feeding Profitable

Numbers of all sheep and stock sheep in the United States, according to the U. S. Department of Agriculture, were fewer on January 1, 1954 than on the corresponding dates in 1952-53 or than the average for January 1 for the 10 year period 1943-1952. Similarly, in Nebraska, the numbers of all sheep and lambs were less on January 1, 1954 than on the same date in 1953, or than the average for January 1 during the 10 year period 1943-1952.

The Nebraska count of stock sheep and lambs, however, on January 1, 1954 was 13% greater than on the same date in 1953 and about 6% greater than the average for January 1 during the 1943-52 period. Sheep on feed in Nebraska were 6% fewer in numbers on January 1, 1954 than on the same date in 1953 while in the United States there were about 4% fewer sheep on feed on January 1, 1954 than on the same date a year earlier.

No report is yet available as to the size of the 1954 lamb crop. Sheep and lamb slaughter in 1953 was greater than in 1952 so that the number of ewes in the U. S. for lambing in 1954 was lower than for a year earlier. The early lamb crop has generally done well due to good pastures and favorable weather conditions.

Marketings of early lambs have been somewhat earlier than usual with good quality and heavier than average weights.

The lamb crop in Nebraska may have been greater than in 1953 because of the greater number of stock sheep on hand.

Lamb prices this spring were higher than in the spring of 1953 while slaughter sheep prices were about the same to a little under the prices of a year ago. Prices as of late June were receding which is in line with an expected seasonal decline during the second half of the year.

Prices have been good so that feeders generally made money on their lamb feeding operations this past winter if they did not delay too long in buying feeders.

Meat is in abundant supply with more beef being available than a year ago, less pork and with lamb and mutton supplies being about the same as a year ago. The relative abundance of beef, pork and poultry supplies will serve to keep lamb and mutton prices at a lower level due to the competition of beef and pork for the consumers favor.

Unless widespread drouth conditions prevail to curtail pasture and hay production as well as feed grains the outlook for feeding lambs is for a favorable season ahead.

## COMMODITY BRIEFS

Don't let any \$30 hog talk cause you to hold your hogs after they have reached normal marketing weights. Holding for higher prices, as they get fatter, will probably mean less money.

We can expect weaker prices from here on out with minor ups and downs depending on daily numbers marketed. Indications are that we are heading for lower prices for hogs and cattle, particularly during the 4th quarter of the year. The reason for this statement is that the June Pig Crop Report indicates that 13% more pigs were saved in the Nation the first half of 1954—in Nebraska 20% more pigs were saved.

In addition, 10% more sows are expected to be farrowed during the remainder of 1954 than last year in both the Nation and in Nebraska. And also, turkey and broiler producers have stepped up production. All in all there is going to be much more meat going to market this fall and winter which will depress prices. A good corn crops helps.

As of the middle of July corn crop prospects were excellent, however some top burning has occurred in the East. A large corn crop will mean more storage space needed. The CCC has recently purchased an additional 100 millions bushels of space. It will be used chiefly for "take over" of 1953 corn.
