

Aug. 30 is Opening Day at City Schools

Five Teachers Join Faculty

Wayne city schools will open the 1954-55 school year Monday, Aug. 30, Suppt. E. W. Willert announced this week.

Advance registration for high school students is slated Tuesday, Wednesday and Thursday next week. Principal Fred Rickers said ninth graders will register Tuesday from 10 a. m. to 2 p. m.

Upper classmen who did not complete their registration last spring and students attending Wayne High for the first time must complete their registration Wednesday or Thursday. Hours will be 10 a. m. to noon and 2 to 4 p. m.

County Superintendent Marie Wright said free high school attendance cards are being mailed this week. She urged all persons who have not completed applications for these cards to do so immediately.

Kindergarten registration at city schools will be held Aug. 30. Morning registration will include all children with last names starting with A-M, inclusive. Afternoon registration will include all children with last names starting with N-Z, inclusive. Definite session assignments, morning or afternoon, for the second day of school will be made at the registration.

Children entering kindergarten must be five years of age on or before Oct. 15, 1954. Children who will be five between Oct. 15 and Jan. 1, 1955 may enter kindergarten by means of a testing program.

If your child has taken the test, results should be taken to registration with the child's certificate. If your child was not registered for kindergarten last year, you should bring his birth certificate to registration.

Willert said Aug. 30 would be a full day of school. Doors will open to students at 8:45 a. m. There will be no school labor day. First teachers' meetings are scheduled for Aug. 28 at 9 a. m. and 9 p. m. he added.

Slate 1.75 Mill Increase in 1954 Wayne Tax Levy

Wayne's 1954 tax levy will probably be raised about 1.75 mills over 1953, figures in the office of County Clerk C. A. Bard revealed this week.

Definite levy for Wayne and all other counties in the district will probably be set at a special meeting of the county commissioners Friday, Bard said.

Biggest reason for the increase in the Wayne levy is the increased amount needed to finance operations of Wayne Public Schools. About \$1,500 more than 1953 will have to be raised through taxes to meet the school's needs.

Increases in the county and state levies are also necessary. Only reduction came in the levy for city government. Levies for the four branches for both years are shown below:

Farmers-Owners Busy Building New Mount Hope Phone Lines

Completion Planned for Next Month

Farmers-owners of the Mount Hope Telephone company, northwest of Wayne, were busy this week replacing their present lines with five new lines.

The company which serves 38 rural customers, has two lines at present which are over 45 years old. They will be replaced by five new lines, three of which will have common battery service. Some are hoping reduction of customers per line will result in better service.

Farmers are contributing their own labor. About \$4,500 was spent for material for the new project. This includes 275 new poles, 163 crossarms and 8,800 pounds of high-strength steel wire. Supervising labor is Gordon Sholes, O'Neill Northwestern Bell foreman. Construction tools were loaned the farmers by Northwestern Bell.

Plans call for completion of the project early in September. A number of new customers will be added to the lines, including several rural schools in the area.

Polio Group Sets Emergency Fund Drive in County

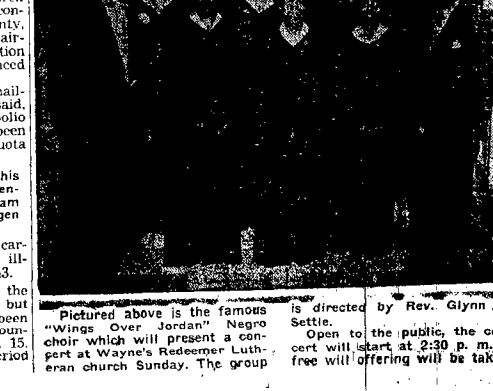
An emergency drive for March of Dimes funds soon will be conducted by mail in Wayne county. Mrs. Chris Tietgen, county chairman of the National Foundation for Infantile Paralysis, announced this week.

About 3,000 letters will be mailed Friday or Saturday, she said, in an effort to replenish polio funds. The national goal has been set at \$20 million, but no quota has been set for this county.

Funds have been depleted this year by the Foundation's extensive polio prevention program and patient care, Mrs. Tietgen said.

At present county funds are caring for eight patients at the Negro Settlement, a son, A. A. Settle.

There are no new cases in the county at present, she said, but most persons who have been stricken by polio in Wayne county have become ill after Aug. 15, leaving the most dangerous period of the year yet to come.

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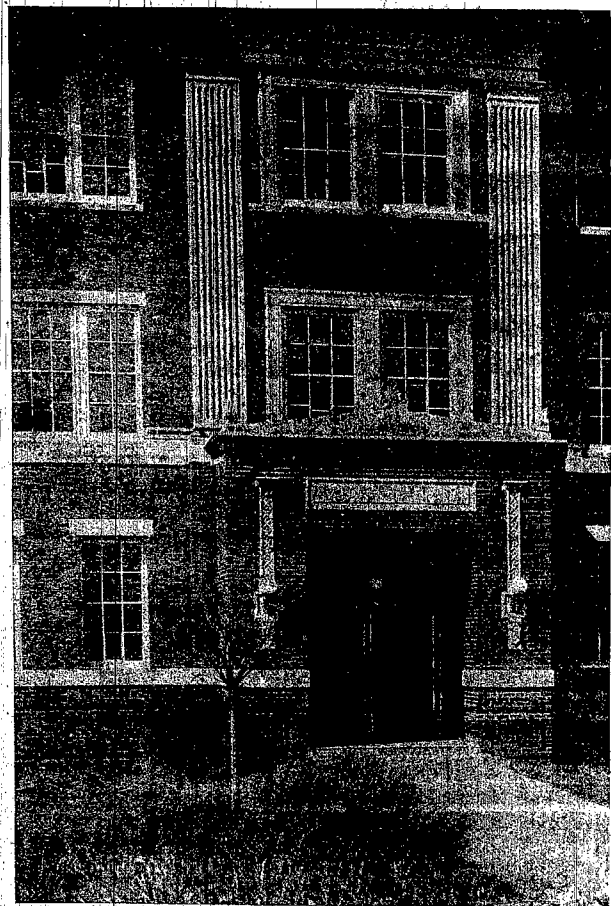

Pheasant Season Slashed to 10 Days in State

Nebraska's 1954 pheasant hunting season Saturday was slashed to 10 days by the State Game Commission. This compares with 38 days last year. The season will run from Oct. 16 through 25.

Ten of the state's 99 counties, including Madison, Pierce and Antelope, were closed to pheasant hunting altogether. Bag and possession limits were cut from three last year to two this season. As usual, only cocks can be bagged. A reduced pheasant population was given as the reason for the cut. Seasons on migratory waterfowl

also set Saturday but dates are announced later on a federal level. There will be no grouse season this year, the commission decided. Rabbit season runs from Apr. 1 through Jan. 31 with a bag and possession limit of five. Squirrels may be hunted Oct. 1 through Dec. 1 with limit set at five.

Hunting dog owners may now train or run hunting dogs in the fields. According to Nebraska game laws it is illegal to run or train hunting dogs on land on which game birds are found between Apr. 1 and Aug. 1.
