Baker has filed a petition alleging that said deceased died intestate on August 8, 1941, a resident of Wayne County, State of Nebraska, seized of an undivided one-third interest in the East Half of Section 21, Township 26, Range 7, in Antelope County, Nebraska, in which petition he has derived an interest through inheritance, praying for determination of the time of death, that he died intestate, the heirs, degree of kinship and right of descent of real property of the deceased, which petition will be for hearing in this court on September 10th, 1954, at 2 o'clock p.m.
