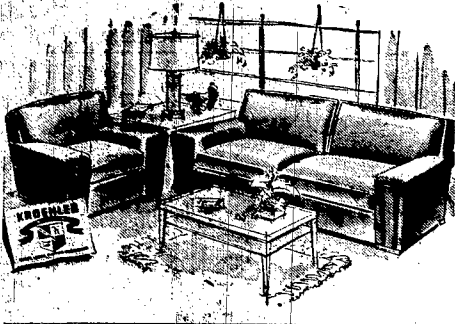

A mural on the south wall of the museum depicts a friendly greeting between Indians and a caravan of pioneers. Territorial maps show U. S. and Nebraska as they looked a century ago.
A chart of LaPorte, first Wayne county seat, is included. It formerly hung in the county judge's office. One of the valuable relics is a hand-made American flag dating back when 36 states were in the Union.
Furniture items include a hand-carved desk which represented Wayne county at the Chicago World's Fair in 1893. A sewing machine and an organ, each about a century old, are in the museum.
A spinning wheel, infant's cradle with doll garbed like a baby of 50 years ago, wedding dress and muslin gown displays, China cabinets with dishes dating far back add further variety.
Of special interest to the men will be a collection of guns, carpen, shoe shaper, grain cradle, saddle, panhaus fork and ladle and a 40-year old corn root.
Plans call for the museum to be open on designated days and by special appointment. Aim of the special days will be to invite people to bring collections exhibits.

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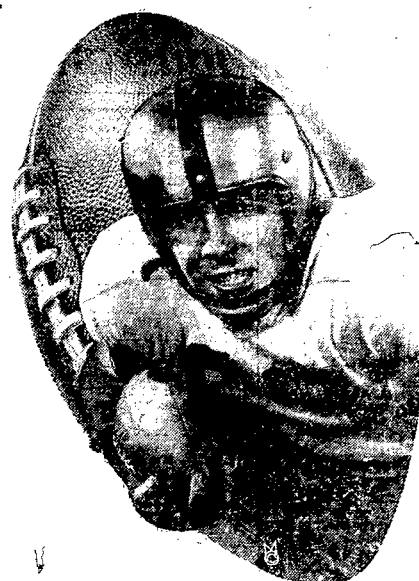
