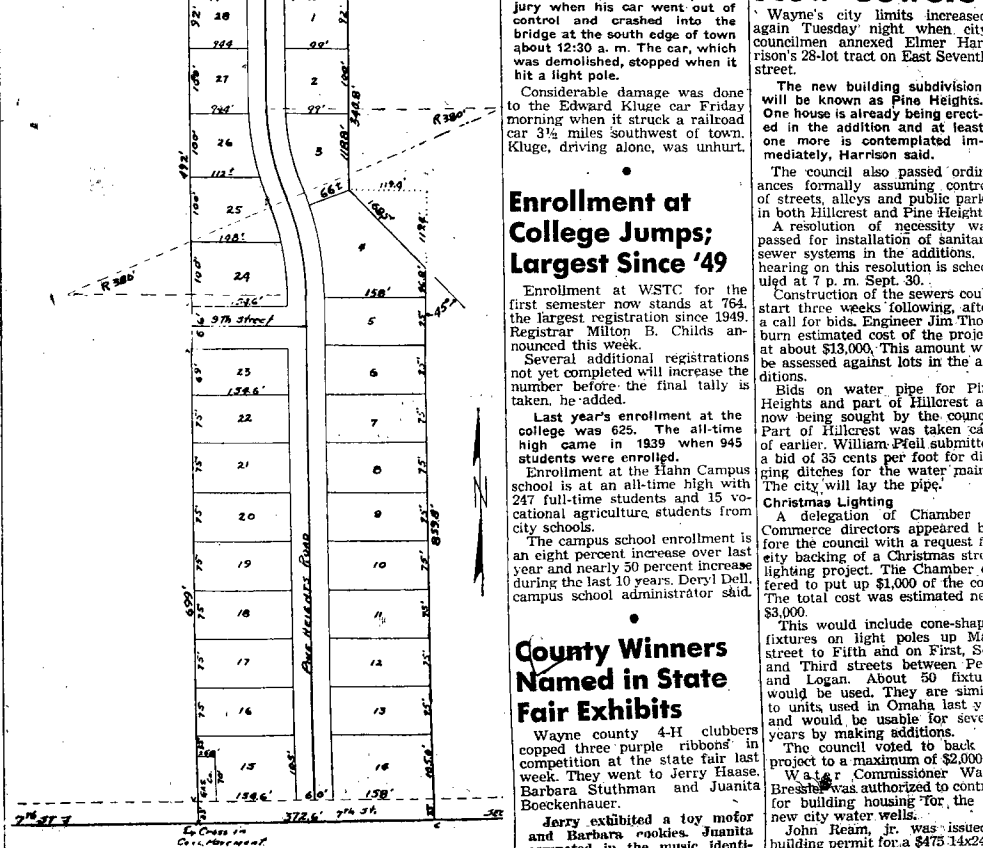

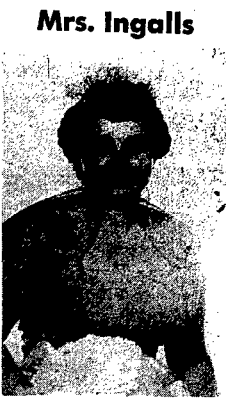

Section 1. That the Mayor and Council of the City of Wayne, Nebraska deem and hereby declare it advisable and necessary to pass this resolution and to cause to be constructed in Sanitary Sewer District No. 15, consisting of lateral sewers and main sewer lines, to be constructed in accordance with the plans and specifications prepared by J. M. Thornburn, special engineer appointed by the City, and reference is hereby made to the said plans and specifications which have been filed in the office of the City Clerk and are open to public inspection and have been approved by the Mayor and Council.

Section 2. 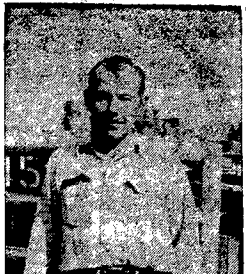

Rooters Day Friday

Nineteenth annual Rooters day program will be held Friday at the College of Agriculture. William J. Loeffel, chairman of the Animal Husbandry department, and R. J. Meade, who is in charge of swine investigation at the Nebraska Experiment station, have arranged a program of interest to everyone associated with the swine industry.

Two guest speakers to appear on the program are Dr. R. C. Wahlstrom, animal husbandry department, South Dakota State college, and Dr. R. N. Hazel, animal husbandry department, Iowa State college. Dr. Wahlstrom will discuss "Progress in Swine Nutrition." Dr. Hazel has for his topic, "Breeding for the Meat-type Hog."

During the afternoon program Dr. Clifford M. Hardin, chancellor of the University, will discuss "The Place of the Agricultural Experiment Station." Other speakers from the College of Agriculture will be Dr. W. V. Lambert, dean of the College of Agriculture; D. R. Warner and R. J. Meade, assistant professors of the animal husbandry department, and Dr. M. L. Baker, associate director of the agriculture experiment stations.

Money Maker Next Year

Fertilizer spread this fall or next spring on corn stalks, straw or other crop residues can be a money maker for next year, says Dr. M. D. Weldon, extension agronomist at the College of Agriculture.

The fertilizer will feed the soil micro-organisms to speed up digestion or organic matter in the

soil without robbing the soil of nutrients needed by the growing crop in the spring. This will help build better soil structure and make more certain the proper feeding of the crops planted next spring.

As soon as corn stalks and other crop residues are returned to the soil, the population of soil micro-organisms doubles and begins to attack this organic matter.

Unless there are ample amounts of nutrients in the soil to build the bodies of these micro-organisms, their growth will be limited. As a result, the digestion of the organic matter will be slowed down and the organisms will compete with growing crops for the nitrogen, phosphate and other nutrients they need in common.

The organic matter they produce sticky substances that help clump soil particles together into clusters or aggregates that make the soil open and porous. Thus water can soak in faster and more of it will be held for crop production.

A by-product of good soil structure is the saving in power needed to till the land. When the soil is open and granular, less power is required to pull the plow and other tillage implements.

Dr. Weldon points out that top-dressing cover crops sown in corn or green manure crops sown in small grains will increase the fall growth of these crops. Two benefits will result: the soil will be better protected over the winter and more organic matter will be added to the soil when these crops are plowed under.

If these cover crops are grasses additional fertilizer may be needed when they are plowed down in the spring so that the soil organisms will not compete for nutrients with the growing crops.

Houdersheldt Theft Salvages Wayne Tie at Allen

Light Eagles Halt Wayne Offensive

Glenn Houdersheldt's 53-yard return of a pass interception robbed Allen's Eagles of one of the prize upsets of the 1954 football season Friday night at Allen. Houdersheldt's theft enabled Wayne to salvage a 6-6 tie with Allen. Coach Bill Dedricksen's eleven, which generally gave Wayne 15 pounds per man. Allen consistently outcharged the heavier Wayne line and stopped the Blue Devil running attack cold for the last two quarters. Wayne did not muster a sustained drive all evening.



Both touchdowns came in the final quarter. Allen scored on the first play of the period when Larry Good circled left end for six yards. Jack Dietz had set up the Eagle marker by recovering Don Wrightman's fumble on the Wayne 25. Wrightman had tried to field an Allen punt.

Allen moved to the 11-yard line with two passes and Bruce Hutchings legged it around right end to the four. Fred Kjer lost two yards just as the third quarter ended.

Leroy Stark attempted a dropkick for the extra point but it was low.

Wayne's touchdown came minutes later when Allen seemingly had another scoring drive going. The Eagles took over on their own 39 and Kjer immediately ran right end to the Wayne 44.

Norman Koester lost six on a backfield fumble and the Eagles were forced to go to the air. Hutchings pitched out to left end Dietz but Houdersheldt broke in and was away. He was aided by one of the very rare downfield blocks thrown by Wayne all night.

Wayne attempted to send Larry Hofeldt over right tackle for the extra point but Allen's smothered quarterback Bob Schwartzzenbach before he could make the handoff.

Wayne's lack of offensive power was due wholly to a lack of blocking. Allen's smaller line repeatedly broke through and smothered Wayne's backs before plays were started.

With this lack of blocking went a good case of fumbles. Wayne lost possession four times through fumbles.

Net Three Yards
How weak Wayne's offensive punch was is indicated by the second half statistics. The Blue Devils mustered only one first down and had a net gain of three yards for the entire half.

Allen, running from a combination double wing-T, equaled Wayne's five first downs, all of them coming in the second half. The Eagles had a -12 yardage in the first half.
