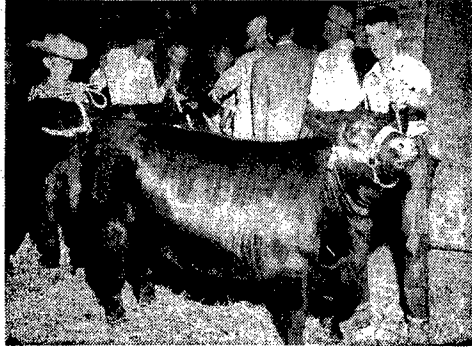


Langemeier Herefords Take Norfolk, Sioux City Honors

Charles M. Craven will receive his 50-year Masonic pin at the local lodge hall tonight.

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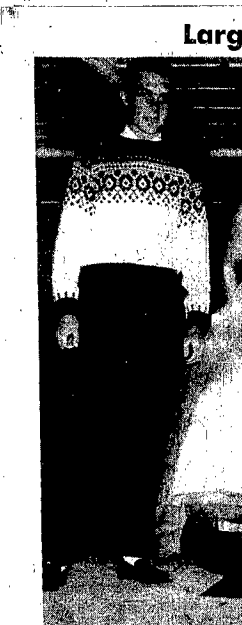
Joe Sublet Wins Herald Grid Contest; Hits 18 of 21

Each unit will cost an estimated \$50, assembled and attached to poles. The Chamber of Commerce recently presented the program to city officials.

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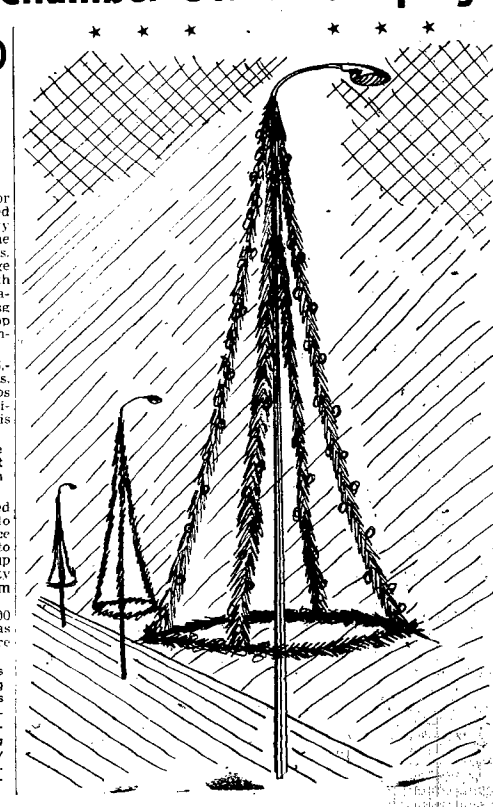

COMIC BOOKS AND THEIR INFLUENCE ON TODAY'S YOUTH IS A VERY TIMELY TOPIC TODAY.

Federated Woman's clubs of America have made it a part of their program this year and the libraries are working in conjunction with them. Librarians have long maintained that good books, and more of them, will triumph over these lurid, poorly written, cheap, so-called comics. Every parent should read "Seduction of the Innocent" by Dr. Frederic Wertham, who has made a study of the problem. Parents magazine has listed and evaluated comics on the market. If you feel they are essential to your child's happiness this list would make an excellent guide. But remember there is nothing of educational value in any of them and the entertainment value is questionable. There is no such thing as a good comic, merely some are less harmful than others. Even the best promoted lazy reading habits. The child for whom reading is difficult will never graduate from them. They are aimed at a very low reading level.

AN OUTSTANDING BOOK ON THE BIBLE.

"Christianity and the Religions of the World" has been placed on the Memorial shelf with a fund given by friends of Mrs. F. W. Huse. It is one of those very large books, too big for your lap but fine for a table. You will find the contents large in scope also. Wayne county again made a creditable showing at the annual Norfolk Beef show. Showing the grand champion steer, a 1300-lb. Hereford, was Jack Langemeier, son of Mr. and Mrs. Ray Langemeier, Wayne.

The champion heifer over all breeds was shown by Duane Lutt, son of Mr. and Mrs. Russell Lutt, Wakefield.

Other exhibitors of purple ribbon animals were Gerald Florine, Delmar Lutt, Karen Willers, Terry Wehrer, Paul Biermann and Johnny Lutt.

A total of 34 calves were shown by the same number of 4-H exhibitors from Wayne county.

The final box score showed eight purple, 16 blue, eight red and two white awards.

Home Extension Agent Myrtle Anderson tells me that ripe tomatoes not only add attractive color to summertime meals but much needed vitamin C and minerals to the diet.

One medium-sized raw tomato, she says, supplies 47 percent of the vitamin C required daily for the physically active person. The same tomato has 33 percent of the vitamin A required daily, eight percent of the iron, five percent of the thiamin and five percent of the riboflavin.

It is interesting to know that

this medium-size tomato contains less than one percent of the calories needed daily.

To get the most good nutrition-wise from your summer crop of tomatoes, use them raw and fresh. But remember, they hold a large share of their vitamins when cooked or canned.

Ripe tomatoes keep best in the refrigerator, where the cold stops the ripening process. Whenever possible peel and cut tomatoes just before using. If you must prepare them early, keep them covered in the refrigerator until time to cook or serve them.

Quality Eggs on Grade
Egg producers can increase their present returns from eggs by producing top quality eggs and selling them on a graded basis.

At the present time there is a shortage of top quality eggs even with the surplus of "undergrades." This is reflected in the large spread between the price paid for "undergrades" or current receipts and top quality eggs.

Last week's issue of Poultry Market News service reported prices for eggs receiving from 12 cents a dozen for AA-large eggs, 45 cents a dozen for AA-large eggs.

Many of the Nebraska producers now receiving 20 to 25 cents a dozen on the current receipt market could get considerably more by producing top quality eggs and selling on a graded basis.

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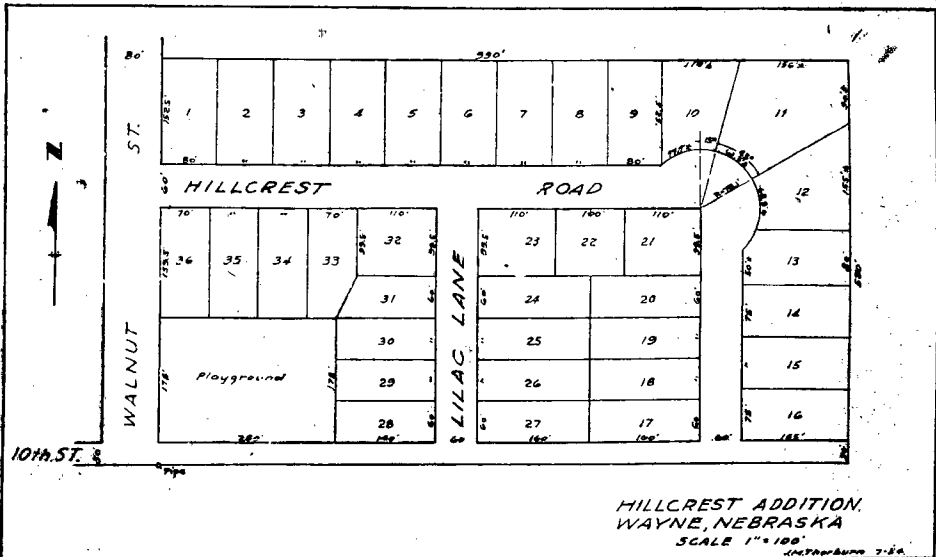
