A homecoming parade is scheduled through the business section this afternoon to open festivities. A dance will be held Friday night at the school to honor the queen and her attendants.

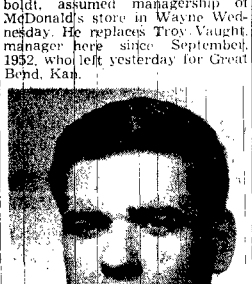
Agler Services Scheduled Today

Details on Program Set By Chairman

Loan rates on the 1954 corn crop were announced Wednesday by Wayne County ASC Chairman Carl O. Sundell.

Farmers may borrow \$1.55 per bushel for loan until Feb. 28, 1955. This compares with \$1.54 a year ago.

This price is applicable on corn stored on the farm if it grades No 3 or better. Loans will become due July 31, 1955.

Rates are the same for Madison, Cedar, Clatsop, Stanton, Stanton, Pierce and Dixon counties. The state rates varied from \$1.55 to \$1.59 in commercial corn producing areas.

Ear corn containing not more than 20.5 percent moisture will be eligible for loan until Feb. 28, 1955. From then until Mar. 31, 1955 corn must not exceed 19 percent moisture content. This figure is reduced to 17.5 percent from Mar. 31 to Apr. 30. It decreases to 15.5 during May, 1955.

Small corn is eligible for loan as long as moisture does not exceed 13.5 percent and meets other grading requirements.

Crib Requirements A crib in Wayne county for 20.5 percent moisture content must not be more than nine feet in width. For each foot in width the crib exceeds this limit, the moisture content of the corn must be one percent less than is otherwise applicable for the period during which the loan is applied for.

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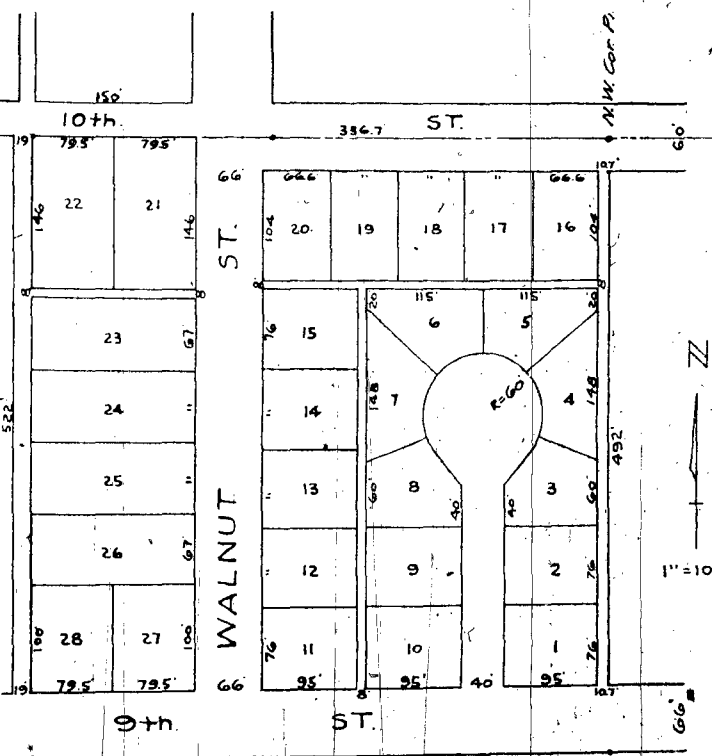
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Plat of New McPherran Addition

With Your County Agent

Water
Howard Gramlich, agricultural director of the Northwestern railroad system, recently made this timely comment concerning water: "The greatest nature of the 1954 summer season is that of the importance of water; water is tremendously important to both rural and urban people. It becomes more and more apparent that we must hold it where it falls or as near that point as it is possible to corral it. Old Mother Nature doesn't do too good a job at distributing rainfall. She is so apt to bring a gusher totaling four to six inches one night and then forget her children in that area for weeks or even months. Man with his skill and engineering talent is just starting to work out the problem of husbanding the water where it falls. Our vastly increasing population requires an immense amount of water for domestic usage. Water is everybody's business."

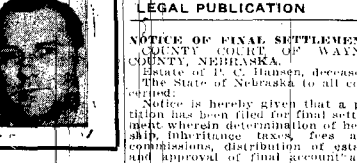
President Eisenhower has officially proclaimed Oct. 3-9 as Fire Prevention week. About \$140,000,000 is lost annually in U. S. from fires. USDA officials make these recommendations which they say prevent 90 percent of these losses:

- Get rid of all trash. Trash provides fuel for unwanted fires. Oil rags are dangerous and if kept should be stored in covered metal containers. If they are exposed to air, they may ignite spontaneously.
- Replace all badly worn wiring. Protect electric circuits against overheating by fuses or proper ampere. Make sure the pump is on its own reliable electrical circuit.
- You wouldn't need the pump to fail when you need water to fight a fire.
- Don't smoke in the barn or in bed or in any other place where a fire may start quickly. It's a good idea to put "No Smoking" signs in areas where you would not want a fire.
- Keep stoves and heaters in good repair and keep combustible material a safe distance from heat sources and smoke pipes. Clean soot from chimneys and if the chimney is cracked or mortar loose, have it repaired. Old unused flue openings are especially dangerous. Carefully follow operating instructions for oil stoves.
- When re-roofing use fire-resistant material such as asbestos metal or spark-resistant asphalt shingles.
- Shut off tractors and other equipment and let them cool before refueling. Refuel equipment away from flames and sparks. Have a fire extinguisher on your valuable farm equipment.
- Check lightning protection of your property. Install only approved lightning rods on all main buildings. A visual inspection will show whether the points and down conductors need attention. If in doubt, have an expert check the system, including the grounds. Make sure the TV antenna is firmly attached to its mounting and check its grounding. Antenna on a chimney may crack the chimney.
- Use only approved equipment for grain drying. Be sure that controls on the equipment are adequate to guard against high temperatures. Make sure gases and smoke from the drier are vented outdoors.
