Plan Meet Tonight for Area Heads

Final preparations are being made for Wayne's second annual Community Chest drive Friday. Members of the residential drive committee will meet at 7:30 p. m. today (Thursday) at Hotel Morrison for final instructions. This meeting, under Mrs. John Einung and Henry Ley, will be attended by nearly 60 block captains who have volunteered their services for the drive.

Prior to the meeting Boy Scouts will distribute Community Chest handbills to all houses in Wayne as a last reminder to residents that the drive is coming. VFW post assisted with outdoor display material on the drive.

The downtown drive, headed by Clarence Kuhn, was completed Wednesday evening.

Last week Girl Scouts, Brownies, Boy Scouts and Cub Scouts distributed Community Chest materials to homes.

Quota for this year's drive has been set at \$6750. This is an increase of \$750 over last year's budget, but two more drives are included in the 1955 campaign.

Participating agencies in this campaign are Red Cross, Salvation Army, Girl Scouts, Boy Scouts, Cancer, United Defense fund, Local Emergency Disaster fund, Remedial Speech clinic and Youth Recreation fund.

Campaign officials have asked persons who will be out of town during the drive to leave contributions with a neighbor or mail their checks to the Wayne Community Chest.

No clubs will be solicited directly by officials said, but any contributions will be gratefully accepted.

Earlier this week solicitations were made in Wayne schools and at WSTC.

Many red feathers, signifying that the wearer has given to the Community Chest, are already seen about Wayne.

Contributions may be made to specific agencies in Community Chest or simply to Community Chest. Pledges may be paid at once or in four quarterly installments.

GOP Names O. Reichert to Fill Election Ballot Vacancy

G. Fletcher Quits to Take New Position

Olivert Reichert, Winside, was named Republican candidate for Third district county commissioner at a special meeting of 30 Wayne county GOP committeemen in the city hall Monday night.

Reichert's nomination followed the resignation of Gilbert R. Fletcher, Hoskins, as a candidate for the post. Fletcher had defeated Reichert in the August primary.

Fletcher has been recommended for the position of acting postmaster at Hoskins, a post left vacant by the resignation of Ed Winter recently. The recommendation added that Fletcher be given the job until his appointment can be made permanent.

Reichert received 16 of the 20 votes Monday. Others nominated were Edward Glassmeyer, Wayne, and George Wittler, Hoskins. Glassmeyer received eight votes and Wittler six.

Committeemen voting were from four precincts in the Third district. They are Brenna, Chapin, Hancock and Hoskins.

County voters will decide only three races in the Nov. 2 election with this new development. Ben Nissen, Wayne Democrat, is opposing incumbent Emil F. Meyer, Wayne Republican, for first district commissioner.

Walter Fenske, Hoskins, opposes incumbent L. M. Schultz, Rogers, for state legislator. Candidates for REA directors are A. C. Sydow, E. P. Kaauve, Ed Gaubb and Rollie Longe.

Sheriff Offers \$50 Reward as Vandals Raid County Schools

District 83 Latest Hit; Warn Boards

Sheriff Hans Tietgen today posted a \$50 reward for information leading to the arrest and conviction of vandals who have damaged several county schools in recent weeks.

Tietgen warned school officials to be on guard in coming weeks against Halloween pranksters. Any violators or trespassers on school property will be prosecuted to the full extent of the law, he added.

Latest victim of the vandals was the District 83 schoolhouse, northwest of Winside. The break-in occurred Oct. 2 or 3 when vandals forced entry through a coal chute.

Desks were ransacked, some school equipment stolen and profane language written around the school. The schoolroom and basement were strewn with mud.

Several other instances of out-buildings being damaged have also been reported.


Legion Votes to Buy New Furnace

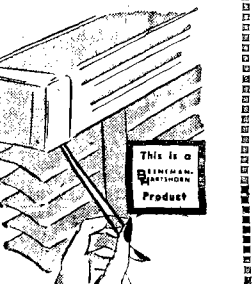
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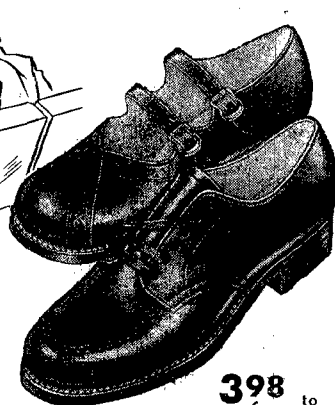
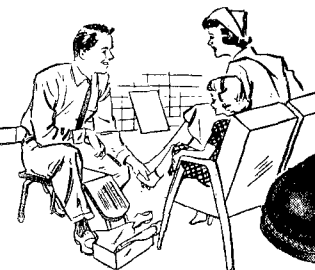

High Milk Production

A recent issue of the Journal of Dairy Science reports a herd production of 525 pounds of butterfat per cow fall on home-raised feeds. This production was secured by a 43-year-old, Illinois farmer who milks an average of 21 cows.

C. W. Nibler, extension dairyman at the University of Nebraska, summarizes the farmer's operation in this way: First, cows were available of different ages that had the inherited ability to produce. Second, a good ration was fed that was high in protein, high in total digestible nutrients, low in fiber, simple in essential vitamins and minerals and highly palatable.

The protein was needed for growth and milk production; digestible nutrients were needed to satisfy high-energy requirements, and vitamins—especially A—and minerals calcium and phosphorus were needed for growth, milk production and general health. Fiber content must be low if the animals are to be able to take in enough useful feed for high production. Palatability must be high.

The feeding procedure on this farm was briefly as follows: good, lush improved pastures were provided for about 150 days. At times the permanent grass-legume pasture was supplemented with rye pasture. In addition, good hay was
