

Community Chest's Total Near \$8,500

Proett Cites Volunteers

Pledge and cash totals in Wayne's second annual Community Chest drive now stand at \$8,446.36 with a few isolated contacts still to be made.

Chest directors had set a minimum quota of \$6,750 to meet 1955 needs of nine participating agencies.

A breakdown of donations shows that \$706.34 came from institutions, \$757.94 from residents and \$3,797.50 from firms and \$1,284.60 from employees.

Institutions include hospital and employees, Wayne State Teachers college faculty, city schools faculty, employees at post office, courthouse, REA, ASC, city of Wayne, and contributions from the League of Women Voters and King's Daughters at the Church of Christ.

Pledge totals include those local firms having regional offices.

Board Chairman Rev. O. B. Proett commended the more than 100 volunteer workers who assisted in the drive.

Total campaign expense for the 1955 drive was \$394.99. Campaign Chairman Adam Jeffery said the cost amounted to less than \$44 for each of the nine participating agencies.

In closing the drive, Chest directors said any person who still wishes to contribute to the fund may leave his donation at either Wayne bank.

Wayne Kerstine Selected As SCS Progress Winner

Wayne Kerstine, Winside, has been chosen progress winner in the 1954 Sioux City program for permanent agriculture. Conservationist Jack Smith announced this week.

Mr. and Mrs. Kerstine will be honored with three other county farm families at a banquet at Sioux City Nov. 4. The others, also conservation winners, are Mr. and Mrs. Kermit Johnson, Mr. and Mrs. Harry Hoffeld and Mr. and Mrs. Werner Mann.

Kerstine was selected for his conservation accomplishments on the Clara K. Jones farm since September, 1954.

During this time 28,000 feet of terrace was constructed, 66 acres of corn contoured and seeding completed on three acres of waterways, 20 acres of pasture and 17 miles of grass border strips used as turn rows.

This is the second year Kerstine has farmed this place. Smith said. A year ago he farmed up and down hill but later sought assistance from the SCS technicians, requesting a complete conservation plan.

Future plans include crop rotation with legumes and supplementing poorer areas with commercial fertilizer.

Write-in Battles Heighten Tuesday Election Interest

Rain Totals 2.16 Inches Degree Days Published

Fall rains came to Northeast Nebraska this week, slowing corn picking, gladdening duck hunters and bringing good moisture for winter wheat and next year's crops.

Last Wednesday .68 fell and Monday night another 1.48 soaked earth, a total of 2.16 inches during the week.

Temperatures meanwhile have been moderate with daytime highs from 48 to 70 degrees and nighttime readings from 36 to 50 degrees.

Rainfall for October to date totals 3.49 of which 1.11 head of the average of 1.25 for the full month.

Starting this week, The Wayne Herald will include degree-days in the weekly weather story. Degree days is the difference between 65 degrees and the daily mean temperature when the daily mean temperature is less than 65 degrees.

Degree days are computed by dividing by two the sum of the high and the low temperatures for the day and subtracting the result from 65 degrees. The answer is the number of degree days.

For example: Oct. 20 the high was 48 degrees, low was 42 degrees. These numbers added together total 90. Then 90 divided by two is 45 degrees or the mean temperature. Subtract 45 from 65 degrees to get degree days, or the amount of heat the homeowner must make up to keep his house warm. The greater the number of degree days, the greater the amount of fuel that must be burned to heat the house.

Interest in Wayne county's general election livened this week as two more write-in candidates entered the race for county and state posts.

County voters will go to the polls Tuesday to decide five contests.

Ed Glassmeyer, Wayne, stepped into the race for Third District commissioner this week as a write-in candidate. He will oppose incumbent Oliver Reichert, Winside, who was placed on the ballot after Gilbert Fletcher, Hoskins, withdrew.

Fletcher had edged Reichert in the August primary but was nominated for postmaster at Hoskins and withdrew from the race.

Reichert was named to replace him on the ballot by Republican committeemen from the Third district. Battling for First District Commissioner are incumbent Emil F. Meyer, Wayne Republican, and Bon Nissen, Wayne Democrat.

County Superintendent Marie Wright announced last week she was seeking re-election by writes in vote against Gladys Porter, Winside. Miss Wright declined to run in the primary. Mrs. Porter was placed on the ballot by petition.

Strate Enters Race: Ernest Strate, Hoskins farmer, this week entered the battle for legislator from the Sixteenth district. He is a write-in candidate against incumbent L. M. Schultz, Rogers, and Walter Fenske, Hoskins. The district comprises Wayne, Stanton and Colfax counties.

Four men are seeking two directorships for the Wayne county REA. Rollie Longe and Ed Casauwe oppose incumbents A. G. Sydow and Ed Grubb.

Other county officials are unopposed. They are Clerk C. A. Bard, treasurer Leona Bahde, Sheriff Hans Eitzen, County Court David J. Hamer, Assessor Henry Arp and Attorney Charles McDermott.

Wayne voters will cast their ballots at the usual polling places: first ward in the fire hall, second ward at the library and third ward at the courthouse.

A sample ballot for Tuesday's election appears on page 7, section 2 of today's Herald. This includes the eight constitutional amendments which have been placed before the voters.

Wightman Top Scorer Friday Night

Wayne High's Blue Devils gained revenge for a 1953 defeat Friday night by soundly trouncing the outclassed South Sioux City Cardinals, 38-0.

Paced by Glenn Houdersheldt's passing and the running of Don Wightman, the Blue Devils kept their 1954 record clean. Wayne now has six straight victories after an opening tie with Allen.

Houdersheldt and Wightman were each responsible for three touchdowns. Houdersheldt threw two scoring passes to Larry Hofeldt and raced 29 yards with a pass interception to add another. Wightman scored on runs of six and 17 yards from scrimmage and 50 yards with a stolen Cardinal pass.

Wayne's stout defense kept the Cardinals from ever threatening seriously. Coach Ray Burnight's eleven crossed the midfield only three times during the game. Their deepest penetration was to the Wayne 35.

A testimony to Wayne defense is the yardage total of the losers. They collected a net of only 30 yards. Wayne held them to a mere four yards in the last half.

Wayne scored almost at will. The Blue Devils punted only once.

One of the fastest scoring offensives of the year was given by Wayne to open the final quarter. On the first play Houdersheldt pitched a short flat pass to Hofeldt who rattled 37 yards to the end zone in 13 seconds had elapsed in the period.

Lightning struck the Cardinals again 38 seconds later when Houdersheldt intercepted Rich Berggren's pass and raced 29 yards for another touchdown.

Two minutes later Wayne had another touchdown after Dick Jerome Hanson's punt. Norm Possibil recovered on the South Sioux 24. Three plays later Wightman skinned over left tackle cut to his right and went 17 yards to score. His placement was no good.

Dean had one brilliant 85-yard scoring jaunt called back when of Gehlen ruled he stepped out of bounds.



Beware of Corn Pickers
The clatter of the mechanical corn picker can be music to our ears as we see those golden ears roll out into the wagon box. However, one careless move and the tune is changed. One farmer in Wayne county had the grueling experience of having a clothes caught in the elevator this past week. Luckily he escaped without loss of limb or his life.

As weather conditions hamper the harvesting at times, we do have a tendency to want to hurry and "make hay while the sun shines". No one will argue that a clothes hand, arm or foot is worth the rush act of working such late hours.

Mrs. Harold Stephal, Loretto, reported in the Nebraska Farmer that she believes, "A light lunch in mid-afternoon saves many accidents. It gets the farmer off the tractor and rests him, making him alert. Accidents happen so often when farmers have been on the same piece of machinery. The steady grind of work becomes monotonous and dull.

I know many farmers' wives are out there in the corn field helping their husbands, thus it would mean an extra effort to fill a thermos bottle and pack a light lunch at noon preparing for that mid-afternoon snack. However, wouldn't that rest period be worth it if an accident could be averted?

Efficient Heating
Storm windows are fast replacing the screens these days as the chilly breezes warn us winter is not far away. Cleaning the furnace or oil burner is next on the list of things to get done.

Clara N. Leopold, home management specialist, states that a quarter of an inch of soot on a furnace wall will reduce a home's heating efficiency as much as 30 percent. This much soot alone will build up in the radiator of most coal-fired furnaces during a single heating season. Although oil and gas-fired furnaces don't build up nearly as much soot as coal-fired furnaces, they, too, should be cleaned on a periodic basis, preferably once a year.

Modern furnace cleaning removes dirt, dust and other debris

that accumulates in ducts that run from the furnace to floor or wall registers or outlets. Specialized designed equipment which creates a tremendous vacuum is used to remove such foreign matter from the heating system.

Soil Testing Fee Increase
Farmers planning to submit soil samples to the state soil testing service should do so before Monday as the present fee of \$1.00 per sample will be increased to \$1.50 Nov. 1. All samples submitted before Nov. 1 will still be tested for the present fee of \$1.00, says Delno E. Knudsen, assistant extension agronomist at the University of Nebraska.

Lime tests will be made first and promptly mailed to the farmer's county agricultural agent. The complete soil test along with a letter of recommendation will be sent out later. The complete results should be received by the farmer within three to four weeks. Soil boxes and information sheets are available at each county agent's office.
