In races for senator, governor and other state posts, Wayne county went traditionally Republican. All GOP candidates rolled up convincing margins. Leslie precinct was the only one of 17 in the county to show any Democratic tendencies.
Six of eight proposed constitutional amendments gained favorable support in the county. Failing were those permitting the legislature to provide for appointment of county assessors and boards of equalization and to appoint a tax commissioner or commission.

Funeral services for Dr. C. T. Ingham, 85, Alhambra, Calif., were held at the Presbyterian church Friday afternoon.
Dr. Ingham, who practiced medicine in Wayne 32 years, died last Wednesday at Norfolk. He had been stricken with heart disease about six months earlier.
Rev. O. B. Proett officiated at Friday's services. Don Schuler, laundier, sang "Consoling the Bereaved," accompanied by Mrs. H. A. Welch.

Dr. Ingham was active in civic affairs while practicing in Wayne. He served on the city council and board of education and was county physician from 1917-1932. He also served as college physician and in the same capacity for the Army unit here during World War II.
He was the only two-time president of the Wayne Kiwanis club. He also served as worshipful master of Wayne Lodge No. 120, AF & AM. He was a thirty-second degree Mason and a member of the Wayne Presbyterian church for many years.
Celebrating 50 years of medical practice in 1943, he was granted an honorary life membership in the Nebraska Medical association. He also was a member of the NE Nebraska Medical association.
Son of Mr. and Mrs. Francis E. Ingham, Charles Thomas Ingham was born Oct. 2, 1869, at La Grange, Tex. He was educated in Monona county, Ia. schools and attended Western Normal college, Shenandoah, Ia.
A graduate of the Sioux City college of medicine in 1893, he moved to Coleridge and practiced there until 1913. He served as city physician while there. He started his 32 years in Wayne in 1913 and retired in 1945, when he moved to Alhambra.
Survivors include his wife; two daughters, Mrs. D. H. Summers, Russellville, Ark., and Esther, Sahas, Calif.; and two sons, Ralph, Alhambra, and Dr. Charles G., superintendent of Norfolk State hospital.

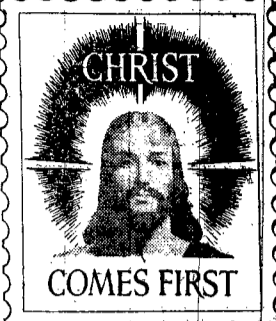

Kellogg Sparkles As Wildcats Upset Kearney, 21-0

Quarterback Scores with 55-Yard Run

Don Kellogg, his arm braced and heavily taped to protect a healing shoulder, sparked Wayne State's Wildcats to a 21-0 upset victory over Kearney's Antelope Friday night at Norfolk's Memorial field.

The 155-pound quarterback, seeing action for the second time since his injury in the Peru game, played the last 1 1/2 minutes of the tilt, keeping Kearney off-balance all night with a mixed attack featuring his keeper's specialty.

Kellogg climaxed his performance with a brilliant 55-yard run in the 13:52 mark. He was forced to reverse his field twice during the run to evade Antelope tacklers.



Wayne's complete dominance is shown by the statistics. The Wildcats had 15 first downs to eight for the losers and rolled up a 281-144 margin in yardage.

Kearney started out by marching to the Wayne 27 but Wayne stiffened and took complete charge of the game.

The Wildcats marched 73 yards for their first score with Jarrod Dennis going across. Kellogg booted the extra point.

A 44-yard drive in the third quarter brought the second touchdown with Dennis scoring again, this time from one foot out. Kellogg again added the conversion.

Kellogg thrilled the fans with his touchdown run in the final minutes. Wayne had a third and 10 on its own 45 when he cut off left tackle, reversed his field, worked back to the left, switched to the right and fell into the end zone with two Kearney tacklers. Dave Meyer added the extra point after Kellogg left the game.

Kellogg's performance earned him the World Herald Star-of-the-Week award and moved him into strong contention for a spot on the all-NCC team.

Wayne's victory moved it out of the NCC cellar. The Wildcats could move farther up the ladder Saturday by downing Doane.
