The bottom shelf of the bookcase has grown into the full libraries of children's books, encompassing every phase of human activity. These riches are for the asking at your Public Library. Why not pay them a visit this week and see our display of new books. Our yearly budget for children's books runs around \$700 a year and at this time you will see nearly \$500 of these books all at once. After this week they will be out in circulation and how fast they circulate you have no idea. "Let's Read" is our slogan this year and that ought to be a good slogan for parents as well as children.

THE PIX CAMERA CLUB HAS HUNG A DISPLAY case in the main reading room. Each month they will show pictures taken by their members or any other photographs of particular interest to the community. It is a glass wall case hung by the main door.

LAST WEEK WAS NATIONAL EDUCATION WEEK and in the flurry of preparing to entertain the teachers and getting ready for our own Book week this week we forgot to mention a book for teachers. Which would certainly have been appropriate, "Good Morning Miss Dove," a Book-of-the-Month selection, is almost a small town classic. It is about that dear, dreaded schoolmarm whom all of us knew and whom each of us will come to know in the future. She's an institution in America. It is the kind of a book that will make you feel better for having read it, which is more than can be said of many, many books written these days. So we recommend "Good Morning Miss Dove," not just to teachers, but to anyone who has known teachers. . . . and who hasn't!

IF YOU LIKE ADVENTURE WE HAVE A BOOK called "Ice Floes and Flaming Water" by Peter Freuchen. It is a true adventure in Melville Bay, the story of what happened to the author and a band of Eskimos on a danger-filled rescue mission.

ALL THE SCHOOL CHILDREN AND THEIR teachers will be visiting the library this week so if you see horries tramping in and out from 9 a.m. throughout the day the reason will be Children's Book week, the biggest week of the year at libraries all over the land.

Less investment is required to get into the sheep business than in the cattle business. A good start can be made with about 30 ewes. Then if you find you like the sheep business, expansion can be made in units of 30 head, as this is about the right adopted sheep as a continuing enterprise usually settle on 120 to 300 head depending on the size of the farm.

Good shepherds advise that one should adopt a plan of all-early or all-late lambs. The goal set by most flock owners is a 125 percent lamb, crop and 10 lbs. wool per ewe.

An encouraging factor in the sheep business is the new Wool bill recently signed by the President. Its aim is to increase domestic wool production by 71 million pounds through incentive payments which may range up to 110 percent of parity.

These facts and figures would lead most of us to agree with the Secretary when he says, "There is more opportunity in farming today than at any time in history."

Except from losses from predators, and this is a serious problem in many areas, sheep are pretty much of a sure thing. Sheep are subject to few diseases in epidemic form; parasites are the most common ailment.

Sheep fit well where there is plenty of pasture and roughage. Like cattle, they can make good use of these cheap feeds.

What did we do at Wayne? NOTHING! This bill, which was signed into law by the President of the United States, was the deliberate intent of Congress in enactment of Public Law 380 to honor our American Veterans, both living and dead, who fought so gloriously in the struggle to keep our country free.

Who's fault it is that we can't take time out for Veterans day is neither here nor there. Can't we at Wayne set aside a day, or even one hour in respect for our veterans?

At least one million have made the supreme sacrifice . . . plus the wounded and those maimed for the rest of their lives. We should salute these veterans on Veterans day and also salute those living who will fight again for this country.

In closing, next year can't we set aside a portion of our time for veterans only? Think it over.

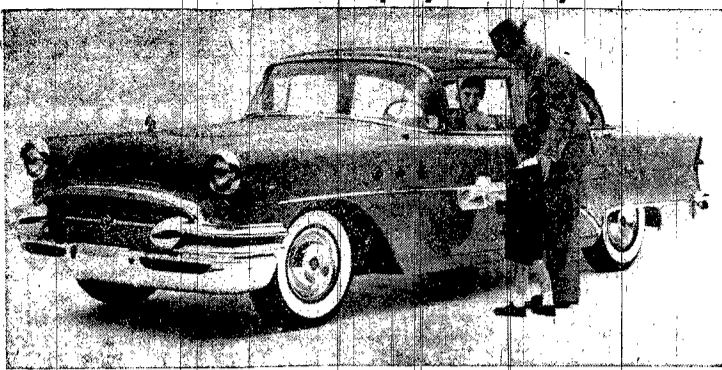
