

Commission Relocation Veto To Delay Highway 35 Project

Ress Claims Six Months Road Setback

Action on a proposed hard surface Wayne-Wakefield road suffered another delay Monday. Members of the state Highway Advisory Commission for the first time in their 14-month history, voted against a highway department recommendation on Highway 35 relocation.

By a voice vote, the seven-man commission voted to keep Highway 35 between Wayne and Wakefield where it now is. As the commission has no executive powers, its recommendations are purely advisory. So, the highway department could still go ahead with the relocation.

State Engineer L. N. Ress said he would talk with Gov. Robert Crosby before making up his mind.

Six-Month Delay

Ress told a Herald staff member Tuesday that he held on construction of the road would be delayed a minimum of six months if the decision of the commission is followed. This would mean construction cannot start at least until next summer.

Commissioner Merle Kingsbury, Ponca, took the lead Monday in pushing through the resolution favoring the present route and improving it.

The highway department had recommended a relocation two miles south of the present highway.

Later Commissioner Ray Ogier, North Platte, offered a resolution carrying two major items:

1. Proponents of the present north route are to furnish the extra right of way to widen the route from 66 to 100 feet.
2. The city of Wakefield will pay the balance of the cost of storm sewers, cutting and gutting along the route where it goes through that town.

This amendment was passed by the commission after a lengthy debate.

Ress protested that Wakefield didn't know what an obligation it was taking on. One official said it might cost \$50,000. But Kingsbury replied, "They offered to do it. That's as plain as it can be."

The highway department ran into trouble over the Highway 35 problem a year ago when it was discovered it was part of the federal-aid system, but not part of the designated state highway system.

Action on relocation was halted after a threatened suit over this point. Legislation would be necessary to include it in the state designated system. This must be done before construction can start on either route.

In commenting on the construction delay, Ress told the Herald: "We have no construction surveys, plans or federal approval. It will take a month or six weeks to get approval for improvement of the present route from the federal bureau of public roads."

Remainder of the six-month delay would be spent preparing construction surveys and plans, securing right of way and advertising for bids, he said.

Federal approval had been secured on the proposed relocation and the project was listed for letting last November. After action was dropped because of the legal difficulties, commissioners inspected the two sites last month.

Ress added in his talk with The Herald that construction on Highway 35 between Winside and Hoskins would also be delayed by Monday's action by the commission. It is one of 28 other relocation projects to be considered by the commission.

The total was nearly \$69,000 under the advance estimate of \$591,900.

Low bidder among nine on the general contract was Busboom and Rauh, Salina, Kan., at \$354,268. Other bids ranged as high as \$434,444.

Natkin and company, Omaha and Lincoln, was low among three bidders for heating, plumbing and air conditioning at \$112,931.

Low electrical bidder was Bauer Electric, Yankton, whose price of \$54,963 bettered three other bids.

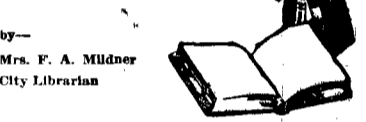
15 Years Ago

Prevent Corn Loss

Now is a good time for planning ways to avoid loss in next year's corn crop.

A recent corn borer check showed that Northeast Nebraska had the heaviest infestation with more than 5 1/2 borers per stalk. The damage to this year's crop in 15 Northeast counties has been estimated at 15 million dollars. The application of 1 1/2 pounds of DDT per acre at the proper time has given fair control of this pest.

Corn rootworm which has reduced yields in many fields can be controlled by treating the soil at planting time with one of several insecticides. The recommended ones are: Hentochlor (32 lbs. per acre, Aldrin (1 lb. per acre) or BHC (1 1/2 lbs. per acre). Field losses at harvest take a larger share than many folks realize. Recent good weather has been ideal for gleaning dropped ears either by hand or with live-stock. The amount of corn left in the field can be easily estimated by using these measures. Each medium sized ear in 90 ft. of row represents one bushel per acre. For shelled corn, each 15 kernels per square foot represents one bushel per acre.

The two things which will do most to prevent corn loss in 1955 are:

1. Use every measure available to control corn borers and corn rootworm.
 2. Harvest early—perhaps consider what forced-air drying equipment can do to improve the efficiency of your corn harvest.
- Farm Social Security**
Farm operators have not been covered by the social security law up to now. Beginning Jan. 1, 1955 practically all of them who make as much as \$400 profit in a year will come under old-age survivors insurance.
- Here are the most important points in the new law:
1. Farmers will pay three percent of their net earnings up to \$4,200.
