Dick was handed the job of seeing that the lights were installed and immediately hit a snag . . . he had a very meager budget for hiring help. To stretch the money as far as possible he donned overalls and became one of the crew, working hard and long to get the job done.

Now it is done, and we say, "Well done, Dick Wilson, well done!"

## Your Answer . . . "Refused"

Getting fired of third-class "junk" mail cluttering up your mail box? Maybe you're sick of all

the mail addressed to "Occupant," "Patron," etc. in your letter box lately.

If so, the Post Office department says you can strike back. Simply write "refused" on the envelope or mailing piece and put it back in the box. The mail man will take it back to the office where it will be destroyed if the sender doesn't guarantee return postage.

"Junk" mail consists mostly of advertising solicitations, political handouts and "come-on" gimmicks. It's growing at a surprising rate. In 1944 the department handled 4.8 million pieces. Last year the total was a staggering 12 BILLION.

It's making the mailman a house-to-house bill peddler, a job for which boys were once hired. How come, you ask? It is the result of an order issued by Postmaster General Summerfield. Mail used to be accepted only if it had an address on it. Under the new order, all a mailer has to do is to find out how many persons there are on each postal route (the postoffice sends out the information at intervals), make up a bundle for each route and send it to the letter carrier. The mailman is required to deliver the "Occupant" mail to each person on his route.

The postoffice charges 1 1/2 cents for each piece of "mail" sent out under the "blanket mail" privilege. That is Mr. Summerfield's theory—possibly correct—that this would be profitable to the department. But carriers are now complaining that they have to carry such loads of "blanket mail" that it is interfering with their primary job, which is to distribute genuine mail.

They complain not only about the additional load. With a delivery of "blanket mail" a carrier must stop at every house on his route. Without such "mail" he ordinarily would have nothing to deliver at a number of houses and could pass them by.

With the amount of "blanket mail" steadily increasing and the Christmas season not far off, the outlook for letter carriers is rather bleak.

The only recourse for carriers and others who don't like junk mail, it appears, is to demand that the "blanket mailing privilege" order be rescinded. To aid this cause, start writing "refused" on your junk mail and leaving it in your mailbox. Then write Postmaster General Summerfield, Washington 25, D. C.



## Highway 35 Comments Squeaking-Wheel Policy . . .

The State Highway department, with the approval of the Federal Bureau of Roads, favors relocating Highway 35 between Wayne and Wakefield. These experts say rebuilding the road two miles south of its present route would be cheaper, and would serve more traffic.

In Lincoln this week, however, the Advisory State Highway commission voted in favor of rebuilding the road on its present route. This was in accordance with the strongly expressed views of people in the Wakefield area.

Since the commission's vote is only advisory, State Engineer L. N. Ress is not bound to accept it. He said he or the governor would announce a decision later.

When the commission was created by the legislature, it was the general impression that it would advise the Highway department on general policy. We doubt if many members of the Legislature thought it would intervene in such technical matters as highway locations, one that it would attempt to overrule engineering decisions.

## Advisory Commission . . .

The disagreement between the state engineer and the Highway Advisory board over the routing of Highway 35 east of Wayne is certain to explode into an issue for the Legislature to settle.

The question will be whether a Highway board with only advisory powers is of sufficient value to justify itself. Without going into the merits of the Wayne-Wakefield controversy, we have this situation. The Highway department has laid out a rerouting of No. 35 which it says is best from the standpoint of engineering and service to the public. The dispute which followed the announced change was taken to the Advisory council and it decided against the state engineer.

This puts the state engineer in this position: The law puts the responsibility on him. But the adverse decision of the commission makes it difficult for him to fol-

low his judgment, since the commission sides with the dissenters. What, then, shall he do, assume the responsibility the law puts on him, or yield to the commission against his judgment?

The people have said, whether they meant to or not, that we shall not have a commission with authority, since they refused to remove the provision of the constitution which would have required that all members of the commission could not be Lincoln City Clerk. If we can't have a commission with authority, the question is should we have any commission at all? The present instance shows that a commission without authority serves a doubtful purpose.

If it sides with the engineer, it has not changed what a course it has increased controversy over an issue the law puts into the hands of the Highway department.—*Norfolk Daily News*.

## Vote of Confidence . . .

This has been a red letter week as far as Wakefield and community has been concerned, when the State Highway Advisory board went on record as favoring the present location of Highway 35 between Wayne and Wakefield, by a unanimous vote.

It seems to us that since this Advisory board was set up for the purpose of advising, that Mr. Ress would stop his crying and abide by the wishes of the people. About all we can say for our State Engineer Mr. Ress is that he sure does know how to cry, and with the aid of the bureaucrats he is getting the job of "crying" done in loud tones.

But the facts are there, the State Highway Advisory board has studied them, have been on the ground and by Ress will have to admit that seven men's opinion

are certainly as good as one man's opinion. In fact, the Advisory board had all the facts before them and, after making an inspection trip over the proposed routes, came up with the result that we of the Republican have been advocating for many, many months.

The only difference with our facts are that they were open to the public, and the arguments put forth were all done with the interests of the people of Northeast Nebraska. Can Mr. Ress say that the result of the meeting of the State Highway Advisory board coincides with our thoughts, and we believe that this group of men should be given a vote of confidence from all of the people of the State of Nebraska for taking the stand they have in this matter.—*Wakefield Republican*.

At the Lincoln meeting several commissioners suggested that before the Highway department decides on any relocation it should take up the matter with the commissioner whose district is affected.

If all decisions are to be so "cleared," the building of a proper state highway network will become all but impossible. In the case of the Wayne-Wakefield relocation, we have no conviction as to who is right and who is wrong. But Mr. Ress and the Federal engineers are convinced their first decision was based on sound engineering, they had better stick to it.

If the members of the commission continue their policy of intervening in matters of highway location they will turn their group into a counterpart of some county boards, which parcel out the available road money among the various supervisors, to be spent on the principle of the squeaking wheel.

If that is the road the commission is taking, it would be best to get rid of it.—*Omaha World-Herald*.

They are also most versatile and the quickest to cook of all natural foods.

**Certified Seed Directory**  
Fall edition of the Nebraska Seed directory is now available at the county agent's office or by writing to the Nebraska Crop Improvement association at the college of agriculture.

Clare R. Porter, secretary-manager of the association, reports that there is a reasonably good supply of high quality certified seed available for distribution in Nebraska this year. The certification program provides a reliable source since farmers producing this seed must meet several requirements.

Porter points out that only varieties recommended by the Nebraska Agricultural Experiment station can be certified. The fields are inspected to see that they are free of noxious weeds. Before the seed is harvested, the field is inspected. Before it can be sold as certified seed it must pass the requirements established for determination and purity in the laboratory.

There is no charge for the directory which lists the grower of certified oats, hybrid corn, spring barley, grasses, sorghums, sudan grass, alfalfa, clover, soybeans and spring wheat.

**Oats Variety Tests**  
A report of yields on all 1951 small grain variety tests supervised by the Nebraska Experiment station is also available in our office. MO-1205 continues to be the top producer in these tests! Several so-called new varieties which are being offered by itinerant seed salesmen have been far down the line when grown side by side with recommended certified varieties.
