Commodities — Brief and Important

The U. S. Department of Agriculture announced on November 5 that acreage allotments will be in effect for the 1955 corn crop. The national and county corn acreage allotments will be announced at a later date. The commercial corn area to which the allotments apply will be 805 counties in 21 states. In Nebroska, Frontier and Red Willow counties were excluded leaving 61 commercial corn counties.

Eggs

The Egg Industry Advisory Committee met in Washington early in October to consider the current low price situation. This Committee's recommendations to Secretary Benson were (1) that the government should not conduct an egg price support, surplus purchase or subsidy program;
(2) that the USDA can best serve the industry by intensifying the dissemination of all the facts about poultry population and replacement; and (3) that the USDA should continue to assist in improving efficiency in all phases of the industry, especially distribution

TAX SHORT COURSE-A short course for Consultant's on Farmer's Income Tax will be held December 16 and 17 at the University of Nebraska College of Agriculture in Lincoln. Changes in the federal income tax program will be explained by representatives of the Internal Revenue Service. Information and registration forms for the course can be obtained from L. B. Snyder, Agricultural Economics Department, University of Nebraska, Lincoln 3.

1955 Adjustments Seen

Decisions correctly made can help to raise net farm income and bring a more comfortable living to Nebraska farm families. Better living can be achieved when people increase their incomes and learn to spend wisely for things they can enjoy. Farm families need information on the expected economic and political conditions in the year ahead in order to plan production and family living ex-

U.S. Business Conditions Stable

Economic forecasters expect "more of the same", neither boom nor bust in 1955. This means that we may make a projection of national business activity for 1955 that looks at least as good as 1954 except for agriculture

Strong areas in the general business outlook include

- (1) continuation of the housing boom—this means high rate of investment and expenditure;
 - (2) inventory liquidation is expected to diminish;
- (3) total government spending will not be reduced
- (4) consumer incomes are expected to maintain
- (5) consumers are expected to continue spending about 25 percent of their disposable income for food;
- (6) agricultural exports should pick up about 10 percent above last year;

(7) production and employment look about the same in 1955 as it was in 1954—spotted unemployment but no erally serious economic trouble

The general level of business activity in Nebraska The general level of business activity in Nepraska cannot be expected to be as strong as in the nation because the state's economy is more dependent upon agriculture. Strength on the nation's economic front helps to maintain Nebraska's prices and income. However, inherent local price and income weakness will keep Nebraska's level of business activity below that of the nation.

Farm Income Down

Farm income and purchasing power is expedted to slip a little lower in 1955 for the entire United States. This is one of the outstanding weaknesses in the general outlook. Since Nebraska is more dependent on agriculture than states having more industrial activity, its income may face a greater decline than some of the other areas

WHILE NEBRASKA'S TOTAL INCOME, from farm marketings may hold near the billion dollar level, it has been necessary to produce more cattle, hogs, and poultry in order to maintain it. Lower prices and "sticky" costs of producing the additional livestock may actually reduce the farmer's net income or "take home pay".

During the period from 1951 to 1954 the farm value of the "market basket" (food used by average family) dropped from \$495 to \$430 and marketing charges for these same foods increased from \$531 to \$555. This trend will continue under present agricultural and general eco-nomic policy because it is generally accepted by many farm leaders and the national administration, and was apparently endorsed by farmers themselves in the recent

Wheat Farmers Hit Hardest

With small acreage allotments and lower support prices the greatest income cut will probably be experienced by wheat growers. The acreage cut is 12 percent and it reduces the nation's wheat acreage to the lowest level permitted by law. The support price for wheat was cut from 90 to 821z percent of parity. This may be expected to reduce the support price about 15 cents per-bushel or from \$2.21 to \$2.06. If Nebraska produces a 70 million bushel wheat crop in 1955, the reduction in income to Nebraska wheat growers would amount to 1012 million dollars

Lower Profits from Livestock

Cattle and hogs make up over half of Nebraska's farm receipts. While producers of feeder cattle received a higher price for stock in the fall of 1954 the feeder-buyers paid these higher prices. This in effect is a transfer of funds as far as the cattlemen in the state are con cerned. It increases the income of the cattle ranchers but will decrease the incomes of the cattle feeders in 1955.

IF FAT CATTLE PRICES are no higher next year than the past year, the cattle feeder profits will be reduced to at least half as much as they were in 1954. The reason for this is the fact that feeders paid 2 to 4 cents per pound more for replacements in 1954 than they did last year and feeding and marketing costs will be a little higher in 1955 than in

Hog prices will be lower in 1955 than in 1954. Chick prices will continue low at least through the spring of 1955. The lowest egg prices in the United States will continue to be found in Nebroska. For the next few months egg prices may be below the cost of production for many

Policy Implications

Inexpensive food has always been part of our national policy. The American people are not willing to accept malnutrition and scarcity of food commodities. Increasing emphasis is being placed on efficient agricultural production and marketing. There is considerable discussion about "squeezing out the inefficient" and "getting in" or "getting out" of the farm business.

All of these phrases mean that a farmer without adequate resources and income must adjust his business or his level of living. The greatest weakness of this policy is that a farmer without money or credit has little mobility or flexibility. This makes it extremely hard to adjust by buying more acreage, irrigating, buying fertilizer or looking for employment elsewhere

APPLYING THE "SURVIVAL OF THE FIT-TEST" TECHNIQUE to formers is probably fallacious. We cannot be at all certain that the fittest would survive. Sometimes very able farmers are the first to fail in a period of falling farm prices. Particularly if they have lately "taken a chance on prosperity" and gone into debt.

At the same time many inefficient farmers, because lucky chance and the accident of timing, may be more solvent position to weather out bad times.

It would be relatively easy to apply modern techniques to help farmers adjust and adapt rather than forcing them through the wringer. One key device is credit with rates at least as low as those enjoyed by our largest corporations. Credit should be supplemented with an ac-tion program to furnish reliable farm-management as-sistance to those who want to flex and adapt. For those who want to leave farming, some kind of training could be offered. At least the off-farm-opportunities should be brought to the attention of those that want to change.

Profit Prospects

feeder cattle are higher this fall than last. Prices of higher grade fed cattle give promise of maintaining roughly the level of the past spring. Cost of feed will probably average the same or a little higher than last year. These facts indicate somewhat less profit in feeding than last year, though the margin may still be considered fairly satisfactory. According to present indications, the number of cattle fed this year will likely be about the same as last year and total cattle slaughter is not expected to differ much from 1954.

Numbers in Feedlots

The number of cattle on feed in Nebraska on Octo-ber 1 is estimated at 341,000 head, 4 percent more than the number on feed a year previous. Inventories of cattle on feed on October 3, 1954, were up 2 percent in Illinois but down 8 percent in lowa compared with the number on feed October 1, 1953. For the three states combined the number on feed this year, at 1,305,000 head, is 3 percent less than on the same date last year.

IN THE THREE CORNBELT STATES combined

the number on feed over 6 months was 10 percent less than a year previous; the number on feed for less than three months was 5 percent less; but the ness that three hollis was 5 percent less, but the number on feed from 3 to 6 months was slightly larg-er than a year ago. In California, however, the num-ber of cattle on feed increased 41 percent, from 307,000 head on October 1, 1953 to 433,000 head on

On October 1, the number of cattle on feed weighing under 600 pounds was 10 percent less than a year earlier those weighing 600-900 pounds were 2 percent less; those weighing 900-1100 pounds were nearly 1 percent less; and those weighing over 1100 pounds were 11 percent less. Marketings during the past three months in the three states were 8 percent larger than for the corresponding period a year earlier, while replacements were 3 percent smaller. The number placed on feed during the past three months was estimated at 612,000 head compared with 633,000 head placed on feed during the July-September period last year. The 34,000 head of short fed cattle placed on feed after July 1 and marketed before October 1 was 42 percent larger than a year earlier.

Of the cattle on feed October 1 in the three Corn-

Of the cattle on feed October I in the three Corn-belt States, 26 percent are expected to be marketed in October, 22 percent in November, and 22 percent in December. This would be a slightly slower rate of market-ing than was intended for the same period last year.

Feed Supplies

The supply of feed grains and concentrates available for the 1954-55 feeding season is 4 percent larger than last year but the supply per animal unit is approximately equal to that of last year. The supply of high protein feeds per animal unit may be slightly less than in 1953-54. Most of the increase in supply of feed grains results from the larger carryover under loan or owned by the Commodity Credit Corporation.

If the rate of feeding per animal unit is about the same as the 1947-51 average, the total supply of feed concentrates will be sufficient to meet the 1954-55 requirements and leave a carryover into 1955-56 nearly equal to that of this year. Hay supplies are generally ample in the northern part of the country but are very short in most of the area from Colorado and Texas cast to the Atlantic Coast.

Feed Prices

Corn prices this fall will average a little higher than a year earlier, as "free" supplies, (excluding stocks under the government program) became tight later in the marketing season. Prices of outs and barley are expected to continue unusually low relative to corn prices in 1955. The general level of high-protein feed prices may not be greatly different from that of the past year, although soy-bean meal prices probably will average lower and cot-

1955 Family Outlook Mixed

For three successive years now the general cost of goods and services consumers buy, has been little different from what it was the year before. Over the 3 years these reports of little-or no change, however, have added up to a slight upward drift. The rate of increase has been held down to about 1 percent per year because many consumer goods prices actually have been moving downward. Looking ahead, more of the same general stability seems to be most likely.

More "Service Costs" in Food Prices

Food prices will hyerage about the same or a little lower but service costs probably will continue up. Families are buying less of the framer's food crops in rough form and more in finished, or partially finished form For example, most wheat used to reach the consumer as flour. Now most of it is sold is bread or other bakery products. Industry has taken over much of the food preparation formerly done in the home and consumers are willing to pay for these services so we have trady-to-cook poultry, progetables that have been washed from preceded dinners, and mixes for cakes, puddings and many other foces. The extra cost is largely for labor.

Clothing Prices May Increase

Cost of clothing his been showing a stoady downward drift the past "I years. Clinef exceptions were shoes and rubber overshoes, which nave meets-red about 2 percent. The question is: How much longer can this downward trend in clothing prices continue. Although retail clothing prices have dropped, manufacturing costs have not. Prices of some untimished materials, such as coffon and synthetics,

nave risen.

Some work clothing is scheduled for a price rise soon. Inventories of clothing and fabrics used in clothing are low enough so that stocks on hand would not seem to call for continued lower prices. Yet wholesale and catalog prices now published suggest that if there is an upture in retail clothing prices generally, it will not be until next spring.

Equipment Inventories Down

In household farmshings and equipment, possibilities for lower prices in the year ahead are less now than they were a year ago. Textile prices may even increase slightly.

Inventories for household equipment like refrigerators, washets, television, etc. are much reduced so that lower praces are not likely in 1955.

Discount house sales have been very much in the news. Most of such saies at below fixed prices have been made in the large cities and thus for have not been important to farm families. But as the practice of departing from fixed retail prices become more widespread, lower prices for all consumers are likely.

xed retail prices become more widespread, lower price or all consumers are likely.

OFTEN THESE LOWER PRICES are accompanied by different arrangements for handling manufacturer's guarantees and services, or delivery charges are added. Probably the most important point for consumers to keep in mind is the need to consider price in terms of total purchase arrangements.

Personal Service Costs Continue Upward

The general increase in service costs seems likely to continue. Medical care, household service, laundry rates, heatily-hop services, hair cut and similar expenses that moothe a large element of individual personal service have shown a shortage of personnel and especially large price increases during the past decade.

Nebraska Farm Family Budget Tighter In '55

From the family living angle cost changes are not enough to raise serious questions. Nebraska farm families are almong those with prospects for declining Income in 1955. Thus, in spite of so-called stability with its slight upward drift in costs for family living, they will be faced with iproblems of cutting budgets and adjusting family plans to safeguard the goals and satisfactions they consider resential.

A good plan for managing family funds involves many personal values and must be tailormade. A plan for one family seldom fits another exactly. The plan for 1954 is in excellent cuide for the adjustments needed for 1955. Add it and check it against the expected income—lower income for Nebraska farm families, that must cover it. It doesnit take long to learn exactly where they stand. With a tailormade plan each family can cut intelligently. I essenter to allow more there, as needed. I less candy, more home produced food. . . fewer movies now, and still keep a tight hold on the good life they all want in the future.
