## S-D Day, Dec. 15

The President has proclaimed Dec. 15 "S-D Day" and hopes to have all Americans drive safely enough to go through the 24-hour period without a traffic fatality.

This is a worthy thought but it makes us wonder why we should be asked to save our own lives. If the nation can make it through S-D Day without a fatality it will be a miracle—wrought by the drivers themselves. And they are the only persons who can do it.

## Which Comes First?

Nebraska egg men are working for a new egg law that will better quality eggs and better methods of handling them to maintain quality from producer to consumer.

If the law is passed—and if it is a good law—it should show remarkable results in the price of Nebraska eggs. Nebraska eggs are the poorest quality in the nation and consequently get lowest prices. States having quality egg laws, such as Minnesota and California, get premium prices for eggs.

LARGE EGG BUYERS SOMETIMES REFUSE NEBRASKA EGGS BECAUSE QUALITY IS GENERALLY SO LOW.

The matter of raising quality, however, is a ticklish one and poses the problem, "Which comes first, the quality or the price?"

Quality eggs come only by proper feeding and handling of Hock and eggs. This costs the farmer money and as long as prices are at their present low level most farmers can't see putting added expense in their egg program.

On the other hand local buyers can't pay high prices for poor eggs. They operate on a narrow

margin and narrowing that margin means they will lose money. If they run the risk of having their shipments refused because of poor quality they will literally lose their shirts.

After the program has been in operation for a while it will work to advantage of all concerned and will be good for the state.

Applications for Clarke-McNary seedlings for 1955 planting are available in our office now. The supply of several varieties is limited and will be distributed on a first come first served basis. Ten broadleaf, three evergreen and three shrub varieties are listed. Not many years ago we heard much about ways of keeping our boys and girls on the farm. Seems now we were on the wrong trail. With present day machinery and efficiency it's taking lower farmers to produce the things we need. Just one son to replace Dad on the old home farm.

A recent survey reported that fewer farm children are attending college than from any occupational group. Factory and unskilled workers are sending more children to college than our farm folks.

Farm-related industry needs far more college graduates with agricultural background. The most fertile fields today are engineering, chemistry and marketing. It is estimated that our colleges will in the next five years graduate only half the number needed. Now that cold weather is with us the rats and mice begin their annual scourge of contamination and destruction. Naturally the more people who participate in an eradication program, the more effective it will be. Several countries have reported almost complete control in county-wide campaigns. There are a number of effective rat and mouse control products and baits on the market. Warmin, when used as directed, has given consistent good results. A new one, Pevaly, to be dissolved in plain water provides a sweetened liquid bait that kills rats and mice as they drink. These materials with mixing directions or as ready mixed baits are available at several local stores.

## 'S-D Day, Dec. 15'

For a merrier Christmas, drive with reason during the holiday season.

This appeal was made to motorists today by the National Safety Council as it opened its annual Christmas safety campaign.

The Christmas-New Year holiday season is the most hazardous single period of the year, according to the Council. Twice as many persons are killed in traffic accidents at this time as on the same days of the preceding two weeks. Causes of the extra dangers and higher tolls are heavier travel and the festive spirit of the season, plus the usual winter hazards of bad weather, slippery roads and more hours of darkness.

In an effort to reduce these untold accidents to a minimum, city and state officials, civic leaders, safety councils and 163 organizations again are joining with the council in enlisting the cooperation of every motorist and pedestrian.

In addition, the President's Action Committee for Traffic Safety

has designated Wednesday, Dec. 15 as "S-D Day" ("Safe Driving Day"). Purpose of the day will be to show that motorists and pedestrians can reduce traffic accidents by their own actions, and to demonstrate that the community is the place to attack the traffic safety problem. An all-out national effort will be made to hold traffic accidents to a minimum.

Ned H. Dearborn, president of the council, said the Christmas season can be faced with optimism but not complacency. He pointed out that the fourth of July and Labor Day holiday periods brought substantially fewer deaths than had been expected.

"No one waved a magic wand for the Fourth of July or Labor Day," Mr. Dearborn said. "The good records came about because motorists generally recognized that holidays are hazardous days. Christmas, the most dangerous of all our major holidays, will require the same care on the highway." Specifically, the council offered the following tips for holiday driving:

1. Respect the weather. Adjust your speed to road and weather conditions.
2. Keep windshield clear, and use tire chains for severe snow and ice conditions.
3. Brake intermittently don't lock the wheels when the road surface is slippery.
4. Follow other vehicles at a safe distance.

## Well Taken Stand

Governor Crosby has announced that he is not prepared "at this time" to accept a recommendation of the Advisory Highway Commission concerning the location of Highway 35.

This means that Mr. Crosby will back up State Engineer Ross, whose decision on the highway location the commission sought to change.

Mr. Crosby did well to take that stand. The location of a road is primarily an engineering matter, and ought to be settled on an engineering basis. We hope that in the future the Highway Commission will refrain from interfering in such technical matters and confine itself to advising the Highway Department on broad policy, the task for which it was created. —Omaha World-Herald.

# Nebraska Farm Outlook



## FARM NEWS REVIEW AND FORECAST

### "Our Roots Are In This Land"

#### Commodities — Brief and Important

##### Cattle

The U. S. Department of Agriculture announced on November 5 that acreage allotments will be in effect for the 1955 corn crop. The national and county corn acreage allotments will be announced at a later date. The commercial corn area to which the allotments apply will be 805 counties in 21 states. In Nebraska, Frontier and Red Willow counties were excluded leaving 61 commercial corn counties.

##### Eggs

The Egg Industry Advisory Committee met in Washington early in October to consider the current low price situation. This Committee's recommendations to Secretary Benson were (1) that the government should not conduct an egg price support, surplus purchase or subsidy program; (2) that the USDA can best serve the industry by intensifying the dissemination of all the facts about poultry population and replacement; and (3) that the USDA should continue to assist in improving efficiency in all phases of the industry, especially distribution.

##### Income

**TAX SHORT COURSE**—A short course for Consultant's on Farmer's Income Tax will be held December 16 and 17 at the University of Nebraska College of Agriculture in Lincoln. Changes in the federal income tax program will be explained by representatives of the Internal Revenue Service. Information and registration forms for the course can be obtained from L. B. Snyder, Agricultural Economics Department, University of Nebraska, Lincoln 3.

### 1955 Adjustments Seen . . . .

Decisions correctly made can help to raise net farm income and bring a more comfortable living to Nebraska farm families. Better living can be achieved when people increase their incomes and learn to spend wisely for things they can enjoy. Farm families need information on the expected economic and political conditions in the year ahead in order to plan production and family living expenditures.

#### Wheat Farmers Hit Hardest

With small acreage allotments and lower support prices the greatest income cut will probably be experienced by wheat growers. The acreage cut is 12 percent and it reduces the nation's wheat acreage to the lowest level permitted by law. The support price for wheat was cut from 90 to 82½ percent of parity. This may be expected to reduce the support price about 15 cents per bushel or from \$2.21 to \$2.06. If Nebraska produces a 70 million bushel wheat crop in 1955, the reduction in income to Nebraska wheat growers would amount to 10½ million dollars.

#### Lower Profits from Livestock

Cattle and hogs make up over half of Nebraska's farm receipts. While producers of feeder cattle received a higher price for stock in the fall of 1954 the feeder-buyers paid these higher prices. This in effect is a transfer of funds as far as the cattlemen in the state are concerned. It increases the income of the cattle ranchers but will decrease the incomes of the cattle feeders in 1955.

IF FAT CATTLE PRICES are no higher next year than the past year, the cattle feeder profits will be reduced to at least half as much as they were in 1954. The reason for this is the fact that feeders paid 2 to 4 cents per pound more for replacements in 1954 than they did last year and feeding and marketing costs will be a little higher in 1955 than in 1954.

Hog prices will be lower in 1955 than in 1954. Chicken prices will continue low at least through the spring of 1955. The lowest egg prices in the United States will continue to be found in Nebraska. For the next few months egg prices may be below the cost of production for many producers.

#### Policy Implications

Inexpensive food has always been part of our national policy. The American people are not willing to accept malnutrition and scarcity of food commodities. Increasing emphasis is being placed on efficient agricultural production and marketing. There is considerable discussion about "squeezing out the inefficient" and "getting in" or "getting out" of the farm business.

All of these phrases mean that a farmer without adequate resources and income must adjust his business or his level of living. The greatest weakness of this policy is that a farmer without money or credit has little mobility or flexibility. This makes it extremely hard to adjust by buying more acreage, irrigating, buying fertilizer or looking for employment elsewhere.

APPLYING THE "SURVIVAL OF THE FITTEST" TECHNIQUE to farmers is probably fallacious. We cannot be at all certain that the fittest would survive. Sometimes very able farmers are the first to fail in a period of falling farm prices. Particularly if they have lately "taken a chance on prosperity" and gone into debt.

At the same time many inefficient farmers, because of a lucky chance and the accident of timing, may be in a more solvent position to weather out bad times.

It would be relatively easy to apply modern techniques to help farmers adjust and adapt rather than forcing them through the wringer. One key device is credit with rates at least as low as those enjoyed by our largest corporations. Credit should be supplemented with an action program to furnish reliable farm-management assistance to those who want to flex and adapt. For those who want to leave farming, some kind of training could be offered. At least the off-farm opportunities should be brought to the attention of those that want to change.

#### Cattle On Feed . . . 1954 - 55



##### Profit Prospects

Prices of feeder cattle are higher this fall than last. Prices of higher grade fed cattle give promise of maintaining roughly the level of the past spring. Cost of feed will probably average the same or a little higher than last year. These facts indicate somewhat less profit in feeding than last year, though the margin may still be considered fairly satisfactory. According to present indications, the number of cattle fed this year will likely be about the same as last year and total cattle slaughter is not expected to differ much from 1954.

#### Numbers in Feedlots

The number of cattle on feed in Nebraska on October 1 is estimated at 341,000 head, 4 percent more than the number on feed a year previous. Inventories of cattle on feed on October 1, 1954, were up 2 percent in Illinois but down 8 percent in Iowa compared with the number on feed October 1, 1953. For the three states combined the number on feed this year, at 1,305,000 head, is 3 percent less than on the same date last year.

IN THE THREE CORNBELT STATES combined the number on feed, over 6 months was 10 percent less than a year previous; the number on feed for less than three months was 5 percent less; but the number on feed from 3 to 6 months was slightly larger than a year ago. In California, however, the number of cattle on feed increased 41 percent, from 307,000 head on October 1, 1953 to 433,000 head on October 1, 1954.

On October 1, the number of cattle on feed weighing under 600 pounds was 10 percent less than a year earlier; those weighing 600-900 pounds were 2 percent less; those weighing 900-1100 pounds were nearly 1 percent less; and those weighing over 1100 pounds were 11 percent less.

### 1955 Family Outlook Mixed . . . .

For three successive years now the general cost of goods and services consumers buy, has been little different from what it was the year before. Over the 3 years these reports of little or no change, however, have added up to a slight upward drift. The rate of increase has been held down to about 1 percent per year because many consumer goods prices actually have been moving downward. Looking ahead, more of the same general stability seems to be most likely.

#### More "Service Costs" in Food Prices

Food prices will average about the same or a little lower but service costs probably will continue up. Families are buying less of the farmer's food crops in rough form and more in finished or partially finished form. For example, most wheat used to reach the consumer as flour. Now most of it is sold as bread or other bakery products. Industry has taken over much of the food preparation formerly done in the home, and consumers are willing to pay for these services so we have ready-to-cook poultry, vegetables that have been washed, trimmed, and packaged, frozen pre-cooked dinners, and mixes for cakes, puddings and many other foods. The extra cost is largely for labor.

#### Clothing Prices May Increase

Cost of clothing has been showing a steady downward drift the past 3 years. Chief exceptions were shoes and rubber over-shoes, which have increased about 2 percent. The question is: How much longer can this downward trend in clothing prices continue. Although retail clothing prices have dropped, manufacturing costs have not. Prices of some unfinished materials, such as cotton and synthetics, have risen.

Some work clothing is scheduled for a price rise soon. Inventories of clothing and fabrics used in clothing are low enough so that stocks on hand would not seem to call for continued lower prices. Yet wholesale and catalog prices now published suggest that if there is an upturn in retail clothing prices generally, it will not be until next spring.

#### Equipment Inventories Down

In household furnishings and equipment, possibilities for lower prices in the year ahead are less now than they were a year ago. Textile prices may even increase slightly.

## Road Group Backs Governor, Engineer On Highway Stand

Urging early start for relocation

A resolution backing Gov. Robert Crosby and the State Highway department's proposal to relocate Highway 35 between Wayne and Wakefield was adopted at a meeting Wednesday night at the city hall.

Approximately 50 residents of the Wayne area, most of them farmers, attended the meeting.

The resolution also called for work to be started on relocation as soon as legally possible and urged that the Advisory Highway commission adhere to establishing broad policies and not take over functions of the Highway department.

About 90 signatures accompanied the resolution copy sent to Gov. Crosby.

Gov. Crosby met Wednesday morning with the Highway commission to thresh out the question of who is to determine relocation of roads. This decision is now made by the state engineer.

The commission two weeks ago asked that it be given this duty. State Engineer L. N. Resch took the matter to Crosby.

Crosby, is a carefully worded letter said he didn't think the commission could have this power under the law. But he said he would talk it over with commission members.

Monday's resolution was worded as follows:

broad, general policies and not take over the functions of the State Highway Department."

Discussion at the meeting centered around reasons for relocating the present road. Lawrence Ring, Wakefield farmer, said savings would result from not having to build a detour nor to make another construction survey.

Lawrence Carlson, another farmer, said the six miles of present route is covered by the Schroeder Mail Route law and therefore would be maintained at least as well as it currently is.

Carlson added that he thought highway commissioners should exempt themselves from voting on relocation matters in their own districts. He cited a selective service ruling exempting board members when a relative is involved.

A report of the Highway Commission's visit to tour the proposed relocation showed that the road had traveled the route only from Wayne to the airport because of road conditions.

Walter Fenniss, Hoskins, declared the commission should have contacted more of the public involved before rendering a decision.

He added that "it is the job of the commission to fit the public opinion and then tell the highway department where to put the road. It is the job of the department to select the materials for the road."

T. S. Look, who acted as temporary chairman of the meeting, stated he didn't care much where the road was located. He added, "I'm no engineer but I prefer to accept authority and suggestions of engineers and not others."

Other comments generally favored backing of Gov. Crosby and Engineer Ross in their decision to relocate the road.

## For Christmas Fun and Good Eating



You can make professional-looking apples on a stick. Just follow this recipe.

(Select crisp, firm, red apples. Wash and polish. For the sticks, use wooden meat skewers, or flat wood- en blades (tongue depressors) you can buy in a drug store.)

**Candy Apples-on-a-Stick**

8 medium-size red apples	1/2 teaspoon cinnamon
2 cups sugar	1 teaspoon flavoring
1/2 cup light corn syrup	1/2 cup red pure food coloring
1 cup water	

Wash apples; dry; remove stems; insert wooden sticks firmly in stem ends. Stir sugar, corn syrup and water together in medium-size saucepan until sugar almost dissolves. Cover; bring slowly to boil.

Remove cover; boil rapidly, without stirring to 300° F. or until 1 teaspoonful syrup separates into hard brittle threads when dropped into cold water. During cooking wipe sides of pan often with wet cheesecloth wiped around a fork. Add flavoring and enough coloring to tint syrup bright red; remove from heat; stir until blended. Tip saucepan; dip apples, twisting in syrup until covered. Let any extra syrup on apples drain back into saucepan. Work quickly, placing saucepan over low heat or boiling water if necessary to keep syrup thin enough to coat apples easily. Save any excess syrup to help stick on decorations. Place coated apples, stick up, on lightly greased cookie sheet to harden.

# Res States Democracy Must Determine Best Road Program

## Access Road Is Not Only Consideration

State Engineer L. N. Res made the following public statement regarding roads and highway construction in Nebraska.

"I believe the people are beginning to realize that if needed traffic services are to be provided they must pay for them.

"I believe they realize as well that at our present rate of expenditures we will never catch up with the \$230,000,000 backlog of necessary highway improvements which now exist. When we speak in terms of \$230,000,000 we are merely discussing improvements to take care of present day traffic volumes.

"Research and study indicate that motor vehicle registrations are going to increase and we should consequently be planning not for today but for years to come.

"The backlog is going to increase with increased highway use and unless some far-reaching decisions are made Nebraska will never be able to provide the traveling public the facilities demanded.

"There is no room in this problem for complacency. There is no room for serving merely the interest of individuals or groups. The problem must be analyzed and solved on the broad basis of benefiting the greatest number of people. It converts to the axiom of democratic government; namely, the greatest good for the greatest number.

"I constantly have delegations coming to my office requesting highway improvements for their area. Nothing would please me more than to be able to assure them that some form of improvement would be made. Because of lack of adequate revenue and the uncertainty of the revenue we now have, I am not able to make such a statement.

"It is my sincere hope that in the near future the people themselves become so acutely aware of the cause of our highway problem that they will demand that corrective measures be taken.

"As they become more and more familiar with the extent of highway needs, they will begin to realize that the highway system must be considered in its entirety and not just in its role of an access road to a certain community or business.

"This important, but providing traffic service for the greatest number of highway users is even more important. We are making some progress but the rate is entirely too slow.

"The only person who can accelerate this rate is an informed and conscientious citizen who will face the problem squarely, consider it unselfishly and then, by his voice in government, demand a solution be found.

"Only after this has been done will any subsequent state engineer be able to tell groups or delegations that their highway needs will be completely satisfied."

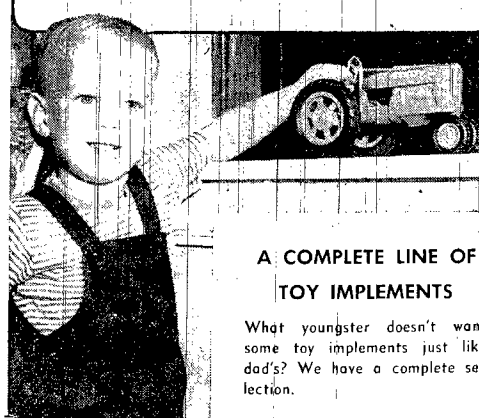

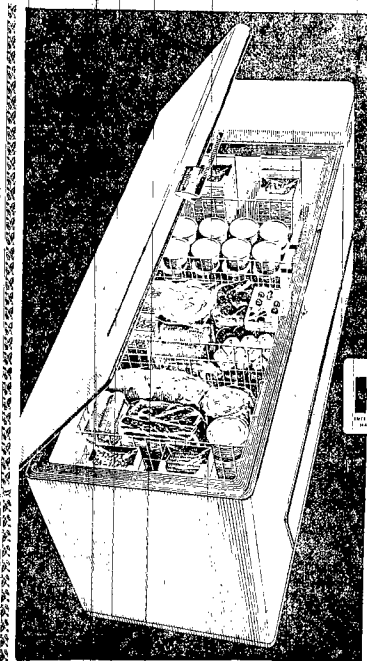
