## Too Many Cooks . . .

Once again the Nebraska Advisory Highway commission was devoting its time and attention to highway location. That may be in decline re-election to the post. William Beckenbauer is observing his thirtieth anniversary in business in Wayne by holding "open house" at his parlors.

It is, then establishment of an advisory commission has created the unique situation of placing groups in charge of the tough job of deciding where a highway shall be constructed. It could contribute only to confusion, and possibly cross-purposes. If the state engineer and his staff after adequate studies decide that a road should be built in conformance to a carefully detailed plan, and then the members of the advisory commission decide that construction should follow another route, immediately there arises a question of

wherein lies the final authority. Beyond this muddled situation, obviously undesirable whenever conflicting opinion arises, there is the practical matter of added expense. It costs money to complete all the surveys and the accompanying studies necessary for the location of a road. The outlay for these surveys and studies frequently runs into a tidy sum. Then if another group decides that the highway route should follow another line, possibly the original one, construction of a new road means more surveys and more studies, and of course, more expense.

One of the first bureaus falling to the new legislature, it would seem, is to decide upon authority of the advisory group which the legislature itself created.—LINCOLN STAR

**CHRISTMAS CAROLS, CHRISTMAS COOKIES** or Christmas programs, you may need help preparing them. Your public library can provide what you need to make the Christmas the merriest ever. Christmas planning help is only one of the many year-round services of your Wayne Public Library. The new Christmas Annual and the Ideals Christmas book are particularly lovely this year.

**WE PUT UP THE CHRISTMAS TREE** in the children's department last Saturday. It isn't as large as some trees we have had but it is a pretty tree. We love to watch the youngsters when they reach out to touch an ornament with a shy hand or admire the lights. Then we hear all about the wonderful tree Santa left at their house last Christmas and the conversation always drifts to what he is going to bring them this year. It's lots of fun!

**"FIFTY CENTURIES OF ART" WAS A BOOK** divided from the Book-of-the-Month. This beautiful book is a survey of art, from the early Egyptian to modern times. It is in full color, on slick paper, and not only a good source of ready reference but nice for browsing.

**ON THE MORE PRACTICAL SIDE WE HAVE A** new book put out by Popular Science experts, "All About Your Car." There are 240 articles and hundreds of illustrations, a real manual for auto owners. Whether you want to know how to avoid radiator trouble, get the most from a gallon of gas, how to patch or waterproof your car's top or buy a good used car, this is your book.

**IN THE BIOGRAPHY DEPARTMENT WE HAVE** the story of Queen Mother Elizabeth and her family by Jennifer Ellis. The title is "Royal Mother." It is an intimate portrait of her long and full life. The style is easy and it is full of many previously unpublished anecdotes and photographs.

**AS FOR NOVELS, WE HAVE A NEW ELIZABETH** Seifert book called "Marriage for Three." This is a good light novel but not one of her "doctor" novels in case you were expecting that.

**ONE OF THE BETTER NOVELS IS "VIEW** From Ponce's Head" by Basso Hamilton. It deals with the publishing field and the people of a southern community and has a very good plot. If you are too busy how put in on your list to read after Christmas.

## Just Half the Story . . .

Counties, cities and schoolboards are required by law to publish a list of claims paid with tax money. This is to allow taxpayers to know where their tax dollars are spent. Newspapers have long campaigned to have complete minutes of meetings of all tax supported divisions published in newspapers. Some persons always say it's a foolish waste of money and just an attempt by newspapers to create more revenue. A law requiring full minutes to be published in detail would make a better informed public.

Here is a good example . . . For the past month a rumor has been going around in Pierce that the school board acted too hastily and sold the bonds on the new auditorium too quickly. They had to pay interest on borrowed money for six to eight months before it was needed. On a \$139,000 bond issue this is quite a lot of interest.

That's just half a story . . . look over the minutes of the schoolboard and you find all the story . . .

The schoolboard immediately sold the bonds after the public voted approval of the new auditorium. Financial experts predicted higher rates of interest in 1955 and the trend the last few months has proven this true.

The schoolboard sold the bonds at the favorable low rate of interest and immediately re-invested that money in government "short-term paper" that earned approxi-

mately the same rate of interest. So for a \$1.00 interest paid out of \$1.00 interest was earned.

So a low rate of interest favorable to the taxpayer was earned in selling the bonds and the reinvestment of the money earned interest to protect the taxpayer until the new building has to be paid for.

Here is another question often asked . . . When the bonds were sold why didn't the schoolboard let a contract to start building the school last fall?

In the summer and fall contractors are busy rushing the work they have on hand. They are not interested in taking on an extra job late in the fall or to undertake winter building.

The schoolboard waited until last week to call for bids. This way many more bidders can be interested for a job to start in the spring. On Friday, December 17, bids on the new auditorium will be opened and the interest by the contractor has been high. This is a good indication of savings to the taxpayer. Active bidding will bring lower prices.

So when the facts are all understood the schoolboard has acted wisely and saved the taxpayer considerable money. It is hoped the next session of the state legislature will make provisions that schoolboards and other civic organizations print "all" of their proceedings. An informed public is a good investment when public funds are being considered. PIERCE COUNTY LEADER.

## HERE AND THERE . . . With Your County Agent

**Better Dairy Returns.** A summary of dairy production records in a neighboring state show that 15 good cows produced the same net income as 91 average cows.

The average cows produced 4,249 lbs. of milk last year while the best five herds averaged 10,139 pounds.

The high producing herds returned 4.4 times as much for each hour of labor as the average herds.

Dairy men agree that these points are necessary to assure a satisfactory return from a dairy enterprise.

1. Start with the best cows available.

2. Breed own replacements using the best sires available. Artificial breeding makes available a source of superior inheritance.

3. Constant selection and culling based on records of production and satisfactory literature performance.

4. Comparative Value of Molasses. Molasses is worth about two-thirds as much per pound as corn. It takes about 6 1/2 gallons of molasses to equal the energy value of a bushel of corn.

Molasses is normally a source of energy. It is a very poor source of protein and is low in phosphorus and vitamins. Cattle do like it though and will readily eat feeds mixed with molasses even when these feeds would be unpalatable by themselves. When mixed with ground feeds it helps cut down on dust.

Molasses is a good feed buy at times, but before investing much money in handling facilities, feeders should realize that the price in relation to other feeds varies widely from year to year.

**New Tax Advantage.** A change in income tax allows farmers to treat as current expense costs of carrying out certain soil and water conservation measures.

The costs must be in connection with land actually used in farming. These costs include leveling, grading, terracing, contour farming, construction, control, and protection of drainage channels, drainage ditches, earthen dams, water courses, outlets and ponds, eradication of brush and planting of windbreaks.

Costs claimed in one year may not exceed 25 percent of the gross income from the farm.
