### Wanted: More Wise Men

Many centuries ago, three Wise Men made a long journey and they arrived safely. The purpose of their trip to Bethlehem was to celebrate the birth of the Christ child.

Now, one thousand, nine hundred and fifty-four years later, many men will journey to their own birthplace to join family and friends in celebrating that same birthday anniversary—Christmas.

These men will travel differently—by high speed motor vehicles—but if they are wise men they, too, can arrive safely.

It is ironic that this Christmas occasion should be the most deadly from an accident standpoint, the National Safety Council says. Last year, 519 persons were killed in Christmas weekend traffic accidents—and Dec. 24 is the most dangerous day of the year in traffic.

Early darkness and bad weather, which add up to poor visibility, increase holiday traffic hazards. Fogged windshields also make it difficult to see and avoid accident situations.

Rain, snow and ice mean slippery streets and highways.

Good fellowship stimulates more drinking, often before driving.

And thousands of unwise men fail to adjust their driving speeds to these hazardous conditions.

To overcome the added hazards of the season, the council says, more wise men, bearing gifts of extra caution, courtesy and common sense, are needed. Then the traditional spirit of Christmas—"Peace on Earth, Good Will to Men"—will spread over the highways and the land.

## HERE AND THERE ...

#### Dangerous Driving

Winter weather means rain, sleet, snow and ice factors that spell "danger" to auto drivers. Two factors reduced visibility and adequate traction often present in the winter-time make for the greatest danger on our streets and highways.

By adapting his driving to these winter conditions, every driver can help prevent winter traffic accidents. These six rules are a good formula for safe driving:

1. Accept your responsibility—Don't blame the weatherman.
2. Get the level of the road. Find out just how slippery the road is.
3. Keep the windshield clear. Have equipment in good working order.
4. Use tire chains. They cut stopping distance in half.
5. Pump your brakes. It reduces skids.
6. Follow at a safe distance. Give yourself room to stop.

#### Crops for Diverse Acres

Dry edible beans will not be included in the group of crops for which acreage limitations apply on use of diverted acres, according to E. E. Peterson, extension economist. This group includes commercial vegetables, potatoes and sweet potatoes. There will be no 1955 acreage limitations on dry edible beans.

Cost of Operating Freezer Money management isn't all in the amount of money income and paying off the grocer, the tailor and the doctor, it could save. Home Management specialists at the University of Nebraska.

The family can make money for itself by using its available resources to full advantage. For example, what does it cost to store a pound of food in a freezer? That still allows how long it stays there—the turnover in other words. If the freezer is filled only once a year, the cost of electricity alone is 5 1/3 cents a pound. If the freezer is filled four times a year, the cost drops to 1 1/2 cents.

These figures are from a USDA study for a 12-cubic foot freezer with a capacity of 5-10 pounds and electricity figured at 2 1/2 cents a kilowatt hour.

#### Short Courses and Experimental Farm

Two items were mentioned most to Chancellor Hardin on his recent visit to Northeast Nebraska. Farm folks are interested in the establishment of an experimental farm in this area and also in revival of the farm short course program at the college of agriculture.

A committee of farm and town folks from Northeastern Nebraska has been working on the establishment of the experiment farm, for sometime. The group met last summer with Dean W. A. Lambert, Chancellor Hardin and others and outlined the need for research work in this area.

The farm short course program at the college of agriculture was dropped during the war and it is hoped to get it started again. Farm folks indicated the need for practical training of farm youth such as the old farm operators course which was highly successful.

## CAPITOL NEWS

LINCOLN — Nebraskans this week were doing some serious thinking and planning on developing recreation and park areas.

One proposed project under consideration is old Fort Robinson near Crawford in northwest Nebraska. The other is in the Gavins Point dam area, on the Missouri river in the northeastern part of the state.

Eventually both projects might involve action by the State legislature.

In this day and age recreation areas for the use of citizens are becoming increasingly necessary. Nebraska, with a few of the finest natural wonders and historic spots, has slumbered while such nearby states as South Dakota have attracted tourists and their spending by the hundreds of thousands.

For some time groups have been advocating making a state park out of Fort Robinson. This 22,000-acre area, a former army post and timber reserve, is now used as a federal beef experiment station. Seventeen states are involved in the project although the University of Nebraska college of agriculture loses the actual work.

Those who think its uses should be wider point out that Fort Robinson played an important and colorful part in the story of the Old West, particularly in the Indian wars. Here was located the Red Cloud Indian agency and here the famous Sioux Indian chief, Crazy Horse, was killed.

This area has some of the prettiest scenery in Nebraska and has fine hunting and fishing areas.

But until recently little headway has been made on changing it to other uses than the beef project.

#### Differing Viewpoints

Several contending forces have been operating. The University naturally wants to keep it as an experiment station. Officials from the idea of tourists, contending

people and controlled experiments with animals don't mix. Citizens in Crawford and the surrounding area would naturally like something to build up their trade. When the army closed the fort several years ago, it left a gaping economic hole for Crawford businessmen.

Also some ranchers in the area are antagonistic toward the project. They criticize the station for raising "tax-free beef." University officials answer this by saying that the work is being done for the long run benefit of the cattlemen.

The State Game commission has wanted to establish recreation, hunting and fishing areas. Paul Gilbert, executive secretary of the commission, said he at one time had hoped to have a herd of buffalo there.

The State Historical society wants to establish a museum there, possibly reconstruct the old Indian agency and safeguard the monuments and historic spots.

These groups got together for a recent meeting and it appeared that they are much closer to agreement than before.

State Sen. Monro Dixler, Harrison, said backers of the state park idea have about given up the idea of getting the federal government to sell the land. Best bet now seems to be a long term lease, Dixler said.

University of Nebraska officials said the No. 1 consideration must be that the beef experiment station will stay. But the University has agreed to let the State Historical society do some of the things it wants. Next step will be fitting the State Game Commission into the picture.

Gilbert said a survey could be made for about \$300. He thought not more than 3,000 acres would be needed.

Dixler said he hoped something could be done soon so a bill could be introduced in the coming session of the Legislature.

### Gavins Point

In another corner of the state citizens were mobilizing in a group known as the Gavins Point Improvement association. Purpose is to get the federal government to buy more land around the proposed Gavins Point reservoir so the public can have fishing, hunting and picnic areas.

At present the federal government has set a policy of buying as little land as possible. The reason given is economy.

But association officials point out that the dams were "sold" to the general public in the idea they would furnish recreation areas.

The association decided to try to get the Eisenhower administration to "soften" its policy. If this doesn't work, an effort will be made in Congress to get more money appropriated.

Also failing, the group will seek a state appropriation. State Sen. Dwight Burney, Hartington, whose district embraces the dam area, said he would be "happy" to back a bill to get state money to buy the extra land.

### Cannery Possibility

Hope has been revived on a Nebraska development of another kind—a proposed cannery in the Holdrege area.

The federal Department of Agriculture has eliminated restrictions on commercial vegetable planting, thus clearing the way. If this hadn't been done, Nebraska farmers would have been unable to raise commercial vegetables if they wished to be eligible for price supports on corn or wheat.

### Sufficiency Rating

Gov-elect Victor Anderson said he thinks there should be some way to "appeal" from a sufficiency rating given to any particular stretch on the state highway system.

The sufficiency rating is the method of determining which roads should be improved first. It takes into account road conditions, costs of maintenance, safety factors and traffic volume.

Anderson said that persons who disputed the State Highway department's ratings should have a right to have a public hearing. State Engineer L. N. Rees agreed but said that since there is not enough money to improve all the roads that should be improved, it is doubtful that even a substantial change in a road's rating would put it on the program list any sooner.

### Mental Health

The State Board of Control took some more steps in its developing mental health program. Dr. Cecil Wittson, Nebraska Psychiatric Institute, Omaha, was made co-director of all mental health programs in the state. A Houston Tex. doctor, Jackson Smith, will come to Nebraska after next July 1 to head up a program of research in care of the mentally ill.

The Board announced it will build two new structures at the Lincoln State Mental hospital. One will be for mental patients who have tuberculosis. The other will be for the criminally insane.

## Out of Old Nebraska

Prepared by the Nebraska State Historical Society

**Frontier Christmas**  
 The record of Christmas on the frontier is as scanty as that regarding the celebration of any major holiday. What is known of course, that it was not the commercialized holiday it is at the present time.

From the records available, it would appear that Christmas generally was celebrated with little ado. The giving of gifts was by no means the well established custom it is today. Such gifts as were given were apt to be homemade.

Occasionally, there seems to have been some effort to decorate for the season, but "Christmas trees" were scarce and frequently a cottonwood branch decorated with strings of popcorn had a record of the first Christmas in Nebraska Territory from the columns of the Nebraska Palladium, the territory's oldest newspaper and direct predecessor of the Nebraska City News-Press which celebrated its centennial last month.

To indicate the state of things in the territory, the actual ceremony referred to in the Palladium was held across the river in St. Mary, Ia. I'm going to reproduce the news paper account of that first Christmas celebration to give you some idea how times have changed. The editor wrote:

"We regret the urgency of those calls of duty which have arisen, compelling us to forego the pleasure of meeting our friends at the hospitable mansion of our highly esteemed German friend, H. Myers, St. Mary."

Such was the first Christmas in Nebraska Territory. A look at the advertisements in the paper carrying that account would indicate that most of the small stock of goods available for purchase by the citizens of Bellevue was carried in stores across the river in Iowa, either at St. Mary or Glenwood. The two principal stores were those of P. A. Sarpy, St. Mary, and Nuckolls and Company, Glenwood.

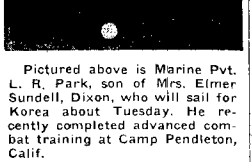

## Apply Fertilizer in the Fall for More Profits

Fertilizer applied this fall means more profits for Nebraska farmers of next year's crop, according to The National Fertilizer Association.

The Association bases its conclusion on facts reported by agronomists at the University of Nebraska. According to M. D. Weldon and W. E. Ringler, extension agronomists, fall application of nitrogen is recommended for next year's corn and oats crop and for bromegrass and other cool season grasses.

They also point out that fall application should be made of superphosphate or mixed fertilizers high in phosphorus and nitrogen. This phosphorus and other nutrients and organic matter, and soil seedings of alfalfa which were not adequately fertilized at the time of seeding.

Weldon and Ringler list four reasons why farmers should consider fall application of nitrogen for next year's crops: (1) Soil is a good storehouse for nitrogen. The applied nitrogen will be held in the topsoil unless lost by erosion. (2) Nitrogen fertilizers help break down hard crusts, reduce decomposition of stalks, straw, etc., is essential for good seedbed preparation and also releases plant nutrients for the growing crop, as well as adding organic matter to the soil. (3) Nitrogen fertilizers often are more readily available in the fall and early winter. (4) Farmers have more time in the fall for fertilizer application.

In the case of nitrogen fertilizer for next year's corn or oats, it is recommended that application be made on stalk or stubble ground after soil temperature falls to 53 degrees F. equivalent to an air temperature of about 50 degrees F.

For oats, an application rate of from 30 to 60 pounds of nitrogen per acre is recommended. Recommendations for corn following clover are: First year corn, up to 40 pounds of nitrogen per acre; second year corn, 40 to 80 pounds of nitrogen per acre; and third year corn, 60 to 100 pounds nitrogen per acre.

While bromegrass and other cool season grasses respond very well to nitrogen applied either in the fall or early spring, Weldon and Ringler note that fall application has resulted in higher yields of forage and seed. They recommend rates of 80 to 120 pounds of nitrogen per acre for hay or pasture, but no more than 40 to 80 pounds for seed production.

For best results, phosphatic fertilizers should be applied before or at the time of seeding alfalfa at a rate of from 30 to 40 pounds of available phosphate per acre per year. Old stands of alfalfa that should have received phosphate at the time of seeding, but did not should receive from 80 to 120 pounds of available phosphate per acre in connection with new fall seedings of grasses and legumes.

Dr. H. F. Rhoades, Agronomist, Nebraska Agricultural Experiment Station, reminds farmers that to obtain specific information about fertilizer and lime on their own farms, the soil from each field in question should be tested. Soil captions with instructions for taking soil samples and special sheets for providing necessary information about each sample may be obtained from any county agricultural agent. Detailed recommendations for each field will be based upon the soil tests and the information that is supplied by the farmer.
