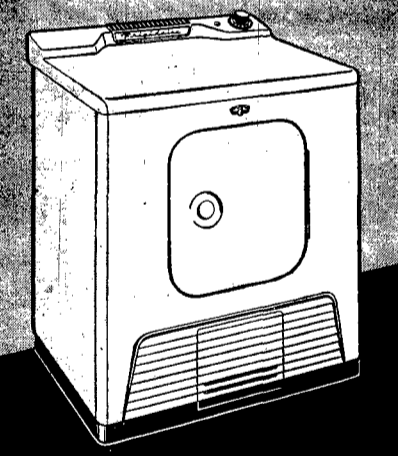
Herbolsheimer - Voss Rites Held Sunday In Lutheran Church
