# Council Approves Plans For New Pool's Bathhouse

Wayne's city council Tuesday night, tentatively approved plans for a bathhouse and fixtures at the new municipal swimming pool. Engineer J. M. Thorburn presented plans and specifications for the project at the council meeting Tuesday. Thorburn's estimate of cost was about \$17,200. This includes the bathhouse, plumbing, wiring, fencing, ladders, diving boards and stands, lifeguard chair and sidewalks around the pool. The bathhouse will be constructed of glazed tile with a brick facing. It measures 20 feet in length. It is 24 feet wide on both ends and 26 feet wide in the center. Dressing rooms, showers, check room, rest rooms and space for concessions is provided. The council is expected to advertise for bids on the project at its next meeting. This work on contracts could be awarded after Feb. 10.

## Group Seeks Recreation Center Here

Recreation for the city's youth also came in for lengthy discussion Tuesday. Representatives of Wayne Prep's government classes presented a petition requesting the council provide a youth center for recreation. It carried 230 signatures. Boyd Grier acted as spokesman for the group. He presented results of a poll of high school students showing the most favored project. Questionnaires filled out by parents were also presented. They showed 77 percent in favor. None of the dissenting votes were presented, however. Nearly an hour was spent discussing the matter but the council showed no inclination favoring the idea. Councilman Willard Wiltsie said, "If there is need for a youth center, I feel it should be provided by the youth themselves to furnish an incentive for using it." Other council members expressed similar opinions. The petitioners were asked to contact the Community Chest recreation committee for possible backing. Three applications for manager of the swimming pool were taken under consideration. Others were received for life guard and instructor. The council is also considering an offer of Bennett B. Viken to give the city a playground area in Hillcrest addition. Viken's offer included a stipulation that he will pay half the city's cost of paving along the west side of the playground. Decision on the offer is expected at the Jan. 25 meeting. Assessment scheduled for Sewer District 15, which covers Hillcrest and Pine Heights additions, were also studied. The council will meet as a board of equalizing the assessments at 7 p. m. Feb. 8. Stanley Morris was granted a new five-year lease for the city property where his machine shop is located. Rate is \$100 per year. A request was received from H. C. Fiebert for the city to purchase his shop building and pumps at the airport. Estimated cost was \$4,700. However, it was pointed out there is no law permitting the council to acquire buildings in this manner. John Groskurth was issued a building permit for an \$8,000 residence at 512 Logan. The house currently on the property will be moved. Thorburn was hired as a special engineer for the Main street lighting project. This would extend the mercury arc lamps up the entire length of Main street and also east on Tenth by the college.

# Hearing on Vital Highway Bill Set for This Afternoon

Hearing on LB 1, a bill which designates Highway 35 between Wayne and Wakefield and several other roads as parts of the state highway system, will be held by the Legislature's public works committee at 2 p. m. today in Lincoln. Committee approval would send the bill to the Legislature for debate. Passage by the Legislature would pave the way for relocation of the present road and improvement of the route with hard surfacing. Funds for the project were appropriated by the 1953 Legislature. An important meeting is scheduled Friday when the Advisory Highway commission meets with State Engineer J. N. Ress to discuss preparation of highway legislation to be presented to the Legislature. Ress said Tuesday he didn't know whether the advisory group would ask the Legislature for legislation more specifically defining its powers. Controversy arose in November when the commission overruled Ress' plan to relocate Highway 35 between Wayne and Wakefield. There has been some question as to how far the commission, set up as an advisory body, should go in determining highway policy. In one of his last official acts, former Gov. Robert Crosby said final authority on all highway department official matters should be the state engineer.

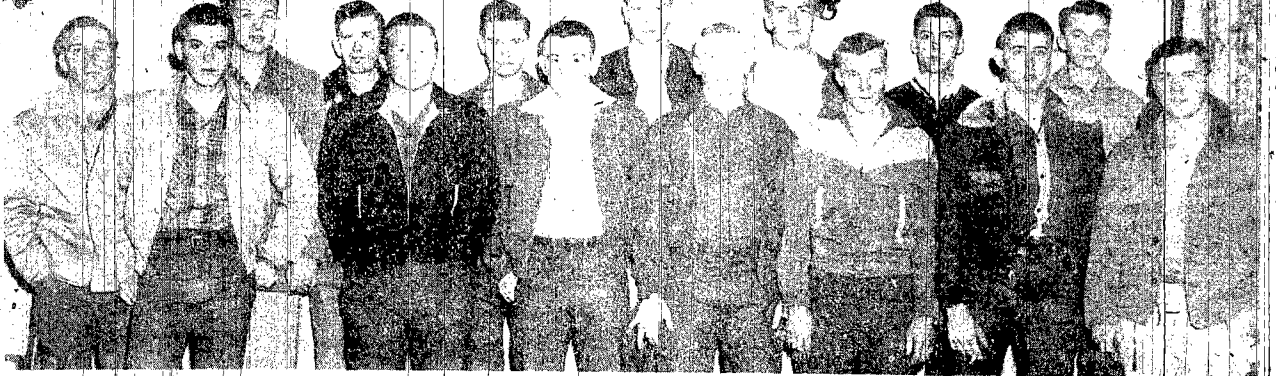

## No "Me Too" Project

A group of men representing eight Northeast Nebraska counties has organized in an effort to secure an experimental farm for this section of the state.

**THEIR REASONS ARE SOUND . . . THEIR PROJECT PLANS ARE GOOD . . . THEIR PROJECT NEAR.**

Northeast Nebraska has a major soil type different from any other in the state and ranks among the highest in the value of farm commodities produced.

Northeast Nebraska, though a rich agricultural area, could benefit itself, the state and the nation if it had the advantage of a research station. Most other sections of the state have experimental farms as an aid and guide to crops and methods.

Such research farms are not purchased by the state. Funds come from the area the farm would serve. Responsibility for the farm's operation falls on the University college of agriculture.

The men listed nine qualifications the farm should meet. These are:

1. It should be representative of the majority of the land in Northeast Nebraska. It should include rolling and hilly land as well as some reasonably level areas.
2. If possible, Moody and Marshall soils should be represented on the farm since these are the principal soils in the area. Some Crofton soil should be on the land if it is possible to get an area of this type in line with other necessary qualifications for the farm.
3. There should be some level land for plot use.
4. There should be enough rolling and hill land to allow research on conservation practices, including the collection of data on soil losses through erosion.
5. It should include some eroded land so that practices demonstrating effective methods of re-tiling such land can be established.
6. It should include at least 320 acres. This would allow for good crop rotations and use of livestock.

7. There should be a good set of buildings.
  8. If possible, the farm should be reasonably central to the area.
  9. Water supply should be adequate for all needs on the farm . . . for domestic use, livestock and general farm use.
- This is not another "me too" project. These men are genuinely interested in a farm to serve as a guide for the development of the agricultural production and learning new and better ways to farm . . . progressive thinking at its best.
- Counties represented in the group are Burt, Cedar, Cuming, Dakota, Dixon, Stanton, Thurston and Wayne.

## Thoughtlessness . . . ?

Wayne's traffic problem, while seldom acute, suffers occasionally from the thoughtlessness of the very drivers who complain about the difficulty . . . namely all of us.

What we are driving at (no pun intended) is this: Alleys, primarily intended to provide service access, have become almost as popular thoroughfares as the streets. Parking is permitted in many of them and often it is easier and faster to travel north or south through alleys than on the streets, particularly during rush periods.

At the same periods of heavy traffic parking becomes more difficult and many of us crowd the parking lines along the alleys and leave our cars projecting into the alleyway . . . perhaps for only a few minutes, often for an hour.

Generally this isn't too serious, but often it causes minor difficulties and, on occasion, could be serious.

Look at it this way: A truck servicing businesses gets ready to pull away and finds the alley exit blocked by parked cars. What can he do . . . sit there and wait until the driver comes to move his car . . . go hunt for the driver and ask him to move . . . try to back down to the alley intersection and turn around? Any of these is time-consuming and irritating.

Or you start to drive your car through the alleys, and get on past the intersection only to find the exit blocked by parked cars. Backing a car isn't so difficult as a truck, but still irritating and time wasting.

Or last, and worst . . . fire breaks out and a fire truck is needed in the alley. It happens rarely, but what if it were your car or business? Think about that just for a minute. How would you feel if firemen were prevented from fighting a fire on your property because an improperly parked car blocked access to the fire?

## Finally In Sight

A card room for Wayne's "oldsters" is finally in sight. After dallying since late last summer, the city has finally cleared a large room in the fire hall basement and is making the room ready for use.

Completion of the project will probably take at least two more weeks but the oldsters can at least see some concrete evidence of the city council working for them.

The room at present has an inside stairway and should provide space for several tables. Indications are that an outside stairway will be provided in the future.

With additional lights and heat the room will be quite suitable at reasonable cost to the city. This small outlay by the city is only a just reward for this older element for their efforts in building Wayne to its present status.

We would like to compliment the council on proceeding with the project despite objections from some quarters.

## CAPITOL NEWS

Lincoln—The Legislature, this week found its work cut out for it in reconciling the pressing demands for more governmental services with the desire for holding the line on spending.

Outgoing Gov. Robert Crosby in his budget message put it straight to the legislators with this remark: "Two years ago I cut the budget requests of the agencies and bore the ill will of numerous groups which have a special interest in these agencies. The Legislature in most instances increased the amounts I had recommended, thus winning the plaudits of those special interest groups."

"It is not necessary that the governor play villain. The roles can be reversed," Crosby said. He was linking the concept of "restraint in state government spending" in his two-year message. Now he said he was recommending the amount of money the agencies need for a "reasonable performance" of their duties.

With this Crosby outlined a budget which conceivably could hit the \$215 million mark, the highest in state history by almost \$18 million. It would include around \$45 million property taxes, also a record high.

It is estimated it would take a total state property tax levy of around \$7.25 on each \$1,000 worth of assessed property. Property is now assessed at half its actual value. The present total including special levies is \$6.69.

**The Increases**  
Here are the big increases recommended from the state general fund, which is largely supported by property tax revenues:  
An increase of \$2.8 million for the University of Nebraska for a \$17.8 million total. The University wanted an \$18.8 million total. Crosby said this is necessary to keep the University on a level with those in nearby states.

\$2.4 million more for the State Board of Control for a total of \$13.4 million. Much of the increase is for a better mental health program, geared to give intensive treatment to patients in an effort to cure them as quickly as possible.

\$1.1 million for the State Safety patrol. Part of this is so the patrol can take back responsibilities of running the state truck weight scales and also conducting driver's license examinations. But much of the addition would go to hire 23 more men to go to work patrolling the highways. Crosby said that adding more patrolmen last June in seven months saved 99 lives that would have been lost if the death rate earlier in the year had continued.

\$600,000 for the state teachers training colleges, necessary to keep instructors who are being lured to other states by higher salaries.

The major saving grace was the State Assistance department when declining relief rolls and other factors have cut the need by \$1.7 million to \$13.3 million.

New Gov. Victor Anderson, Lincoln, gives his budget message in another two weeks. He said it won't differ much from Crosby's.

**Recommendations**  
Outgoing Gov. Crosby had some other recommendations to offer the Legislature:  
A new governor's mansion should be built across from the Statehouse. This would take at least \$150,000, he said.  
The School for the Blind should be moved away from its antiquated

housing at Nebraska City to a town "with a good college. Although Kearney has been suggested, Crosby did not mention it in his speech. Something must be done about salaries of state officers so governors can hire good men.

The Board of Control should be given enough money for a staff of highly qualified assistants. Crosby said he thinks the Board of Control now is "engulfed in too many details."

The state should set up a program of aid for the permanently and totally disabled. Since federal aid is available, Nebraska is losing its share.

Money should be appropriated for the State Turnpike authority so it can make engineering studies on toll road possibilities. Although the authority plans to ask for \$1,000, Crosby made no recommendation.

**Inauguration**  
As Victor Anderson was inaugurated as twenty-seventh governor of Nebraska, the Lincoln hardware merchant outlined a program of "sound self-government" in his inaugural speech to the Legislature.

"Let us ask for tax dollars sparingly and invest them wisely. Let us see that our government is kept close to the people," said the new governor.

**New Bills**  
A bill calling for the sale of the state school lands was one of the early controversial bills introduced. Sen. Monroe Bixler, Harrison, was principal introducer. The measure is expected to find considerable opposition.

Bixler also introduced a measure calling for "indefinitely" extending the sixth cent of income tax. Revenues from this tax, due to expire May 9, go to the State Highway department and have been credited with making a record \$24 million highway building program possible.

A measure to set up a commission to supervise the state's

His resolution came on the heels of a report on the penitentiary by Sanford Bates, internationally known penal expert from Trenton, N. J. Bates, brought here by the Board of Control, which supervises the penitentiary, gave a report with mingled praise and criticism.

Bates said the penitentiary "hole" or jail should be rebuilt, the professional staff of the prison should be increased and guard salaries should be raised to get better men. "The rank and file of officers have a dire idea as to what the whole purpose of a corrective institution is," Bates reported.

## Cleaning Up Uncertainty . . .

Temporarily, at least, confusion over the location or relocation of Nebraska highways has been resolved. Final decisions as to where a road shall or shall not be built rests with the state engineer, and not with the Nebraska Highway Advisory Commission created two years ago by legislative action. It is a logical decision. Primarily the circumstances determining the location of a road involve engineering factors. The matter of costs in complying with the standards to be met and endless detail of this character involve the engineer and are somewhat out of the field of judgment of the layman. In the last analysis, highway development calls for sound technical training, the qualifications possessed by the engineer. It would appear from an examination of the language of the act creating the advisory commission that the Legislature had in mind that such questions involving location or relocation of highways fell within the jurisdiction of the engineer and that the newly established commission was intended to fulfill the purpose of an advisory group in the broad development of the state's road program. If there is any question of divided authority in the specific field of deciding where a road shall be built, then the Legislature in session would be well advised to spell out in some detail, the responsibilities and the authority of the highway commission it created. This would seem to be of some importance in light of the fact we are moving into an accelerated highway program with the possibility of additional funds for roads. Only confusion can develop if there is any doubt as to who is the final boss in determining relocation of the roads embraced in Nebraska's highway system. — LINCOLN STAR

## Quality Seed Source

Drill box surveys from all over the United States taken during the last 30 years have shown little improvement in the kind of seeds planted on most farms. The results of the survey show that approximately 70 percent is produced on the same farm where it was being sown and 10 percent comes from neighboring farms. Practically all of this was tested for purity and germination.

Most seeds submitted for test only when listed for public sale. The state seed laboratory at Lincoln reports that 68 percent of all seed samples tested last year contained some weed seed. Many have seven hundred weed seeds per pound.

Nebraska is one of nine states which requires labeling with respect to variety. It is in this field that we find the greatest number of misrepresentations. In most cases varietal identification can be made only through growing tests which are costly and time consuming. Official state seed certification not only provides the most dependable source of seed purity as to variety. The need for certification is rather obvious in view of the importance of planting the best variety and the difficulties involved when seed of different varieties are so much alike.

A directory listing the growers, varieties and amount for sale of all certified seed grown in the state are available in the county extension office.

**Learn Sheep Shearing**  
The annual shearing school for those interested in learning how to do the job will be held on the Agr college campus Feb. 21-22.

A number of young fellows have made good wages doing custom shearing for the last several years following attendance at this school. A. W. Derrick, in charge of the school, says fellows really interested in learning to do a good job are always in demand. For further information write W. W.
