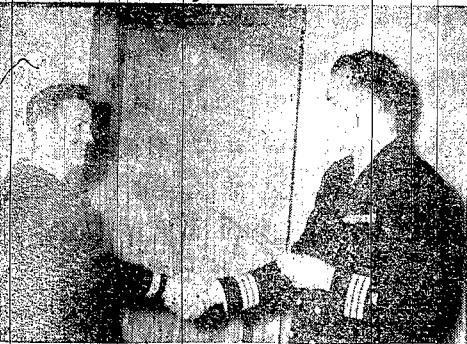

Food Sense — Not Nonsense



Be A Lamb—But Not Your Food

Would you be a lamb—just to play follow the leader? No, indeed? you say, yet you may permit your eating habits to be influenced by the talk-of-the-day.

Conversations over American dinner tables frequently come around to calories. Too often, good foods are rejected solely on the basis of their reputed calorie count learned through hearsay. Other times, the estimation of calories is mere guesswork. This confusion causes essential foods to be called "high energy or high calorie" foods which mistakenly are condemned as fattening.

Products which supply protein, minerals or vitamins are more than "energy" foods despite their calorie content. Only those foods which are primarily sources of calories, such as sugar and certain fats, should be thought of as "high energy" foods.

One does not consider milk as a "high energy" food even though a glass of milk furnishes 165 calories. About one-fourth of the solids of milk is protein and milk is an excellent source of calcium and riboflavin. Likewise, one should not think of bread as a "high energy" food just because a slice of enriched bread furnishes 63 calories. Enriched bread provides protein and in addition calcium, iron and the three B vitamins—riboflavin, niacin, and thiamine.

It is revealing that calorie-wise, varieties of bread are not so different. Enriched bread, rye, whole wheat and various specialty breads all contain nearly the same number of calories, ounce for ounce.

Selection of foods should be on as functional a basis as are many of the other choices made in modern living. This thought applies to those who are concerned with reducing the total number of calories in their daily diet. They should limit those foods which furnish nothing but calories more drastically than foods such as milk, enriched bread, eggs and meat which furnish a good cross section of the various needed nutrients.

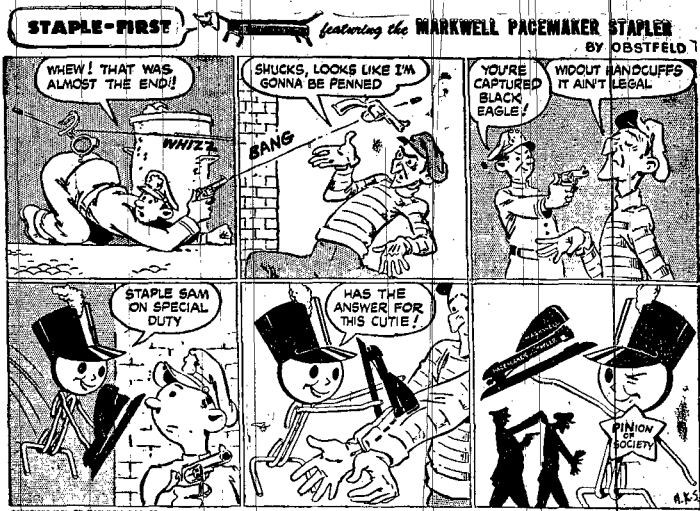

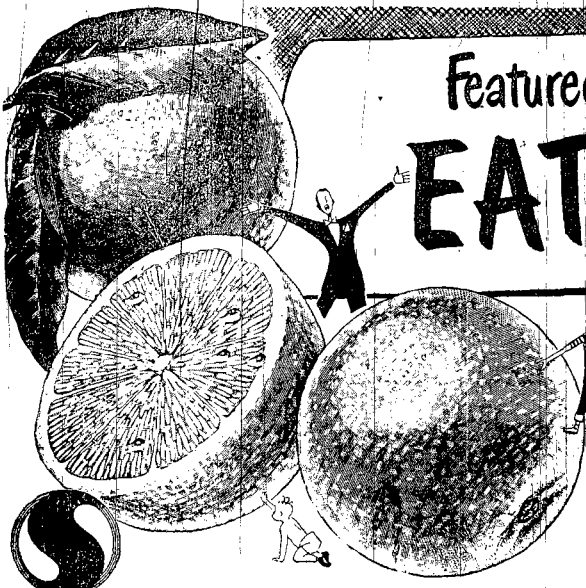

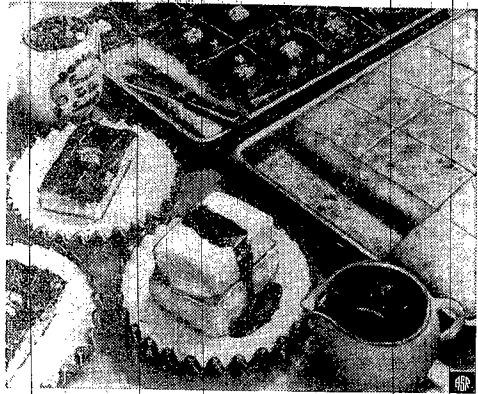

Wayne State's Wildcats, fresh from an 86-76 conquest of Peru, entertain Doane's Pirates Saturday night at the auditorium.

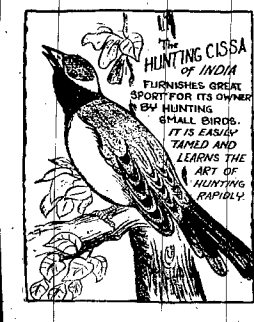

Oh, Brother . . . !

In a transparent effort to stalemate relocation of Highway 35, Sen. Hal Bridenbath has submitted a bill, LB 359, which would require "county board approval for any state highway relocation to more than half-mile from original route."

This bill would split authority for relocating roads and could lead to endless squabbles, countless delays and crazy-quilt road systems.

No matter who the legislature decides shall have authority on the state level, major relocations would have to be approved by local authorities who generally will be more concerned with serving themselves than with the good of the traveling public.

Let's take a look at some possible situations: State authorities have decided to move a state highway more than half a mile, from its present location. In its present location the road lies on a county line, therefore must be approved by two counties.

ONE COUNTY APPROVES the relocation, the other refuses—what happens then? Another possibility, and one likely to happen more often is this:

State authority sees fit to move a highway a mile or more. The present road cuts directly across a county line. . . one county approves, the other refuses. Does the road get built on the approved relocation in one county and remain in the old location in the other county?

This problem could easily arise should the state decide to construct a toll road. Actually county boards could override state authority, throwing roads right back into political control, leaving us in a spot where we could wind up with roads to nowhere and no roads to anywhere.

It may be true that poverty is no disgrace, but never has it been used as a testimonial of ability.

It's true saving is a fine habit—but don't save all your good deeds for the future.

With Your County Agent

Cornhusker Caravan

Folks attending the Cornhusker caravan in Wayne Febr. 16 will have an opportunity to visit with livestock, dairy and poultry specialists about their management problems.

The panels, designed by the agricultural extension specialists at the University of Nebraska, feature the most significant developments in the livestock industry. One of these panels asks the question: What is a meat type hog? It shows the important differences between the meat type hog and the more wasteful hog. In comparing two hogs of the same weight, the meat type hog had one-half inch less fat back, a carcass length that was more than two inches longer, one more rib and a loin eye area that was nearly one square inch larger.

Another new panel features more profitable poultry through the production of high quality eggs and improvement of marketing facilities. Most eggs have the desired quality when laid, extension poultrymen point out. The problem is preserving the quality of the eggs from the time they are taken from the nest until they reach the consumer.

Dairymen will learn why some cows are more profitable than others, while visiting the dairy section. With the cost-price squeeze on dairymen any more interested than ever in the essential factors of a profitable dairy enterprise. Extension dairymen are expecting many questions on disease control with emphasis on the eradication of brucellosis and mastitis, on how to improve the breeding program to obtain cows with an inheritance for high production, on the latest

information on feeding care and of quality milk and on the improvement of marketing facilities.

Money Troubles

An event of special interest to members of farm organizations, ladies of church-social and club groups and those working with youth including scouts and 4-H clubs is the Great Plains recreation workshop. The numerous activities of the workshop include practice and new suggestions in the field of crafts, folk and square dancing, games for all occasions, ceremonies and party planning with special emphasis on discussions. Salaries Troubled

Sen. John Beaver, Boomer, chairman of the Legislative council, said he thinks the hottest topics in early debate will be bills on raising salaries of state officials. Beaver said that in singling out this issue, he didn't mean to infer he thought it was most important.

But the Boomer senator said he didn't think this session would be as controversial as the 1953 session. He said there seemed less chance of factions developing because there seems to be a willingness to sit down and talk things out.

Predicts Controversy

However, Sen. Karl Vogel, Omaha, disagreed in his interview. He said that he thought this session would be more contentious than last time.

Asked what issue might bring trouble, Vogel said, "That's like getting your hand cut on a buzz saw and then trying to figure out which tooth did the actual damage."

Reconsiderations

The Legislature acted twice recently as though it couldn't make up its mind. These came on reconsiderations of earlier action taken on a gasoline tax allocation bill and on the confirmation of Ernest Johnson, Chadron, for reappointment to the State Normal board.

Actually, this wasn't as fickle as it sounds. On the gasoline tax bill the Legislature failed by one vote to pass a measure "unfreezing" funds now held in a court suit so the counties could get their share of the tax. Reason for the defeat was that senators from the thinly populated counties didn't like the formula of allocation in the bill.

But friends of the bill pointed out that Ernest Hubka, Beatrice, out of his bed where he was ill with influenza and brought him to Lincoln. A motion was made to reconsider and with Hubka's vote there were the 29 necessary to pass the bill into law immediately.

On the Johnson confirmation, this was the sequence of events. The question had brought severe

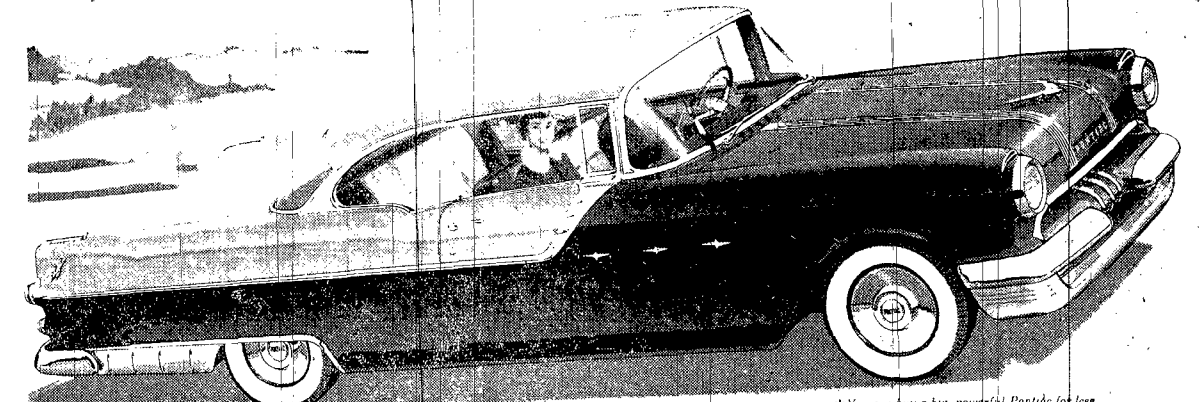
