





Despite all the ruskins about postal deficies and possible increases in postal rates the postal department continues a practice that wastes about \$20 million a year of the taxpayer's money.

That is the practice of using postmasterships as political plums instead of making appointments on merit and experience.

There are nearly 3,300 first class postofices in the United States and possessions. Most of these have assistants receiving about \$5,000 a year on the average and who do the work for the postmaster; In most instances the postmaster is a deadhead. E. A. Standley, a former postal employee from
