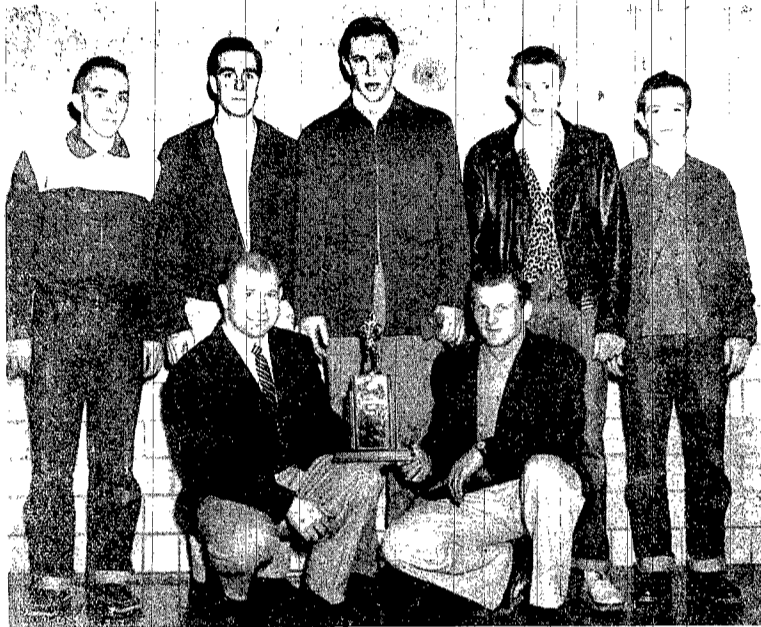

A. It is a synthetic hormone which has been made commercially for years and used in human and veterinary medicine.
- Q. Why feed stilbestrol to cattle?
A. When properly mixed at the right level in a well-balanced supplement, stilbestrol will produce amazing gains... and on less feed.
- Q. What are the results from stilbestrol feeding?
A. At the Purina Research Farm an average of test results with stilbestrol shows 17.2% faster growth and a saving in feed of 9.4% against check lots getting no stilbestrol.

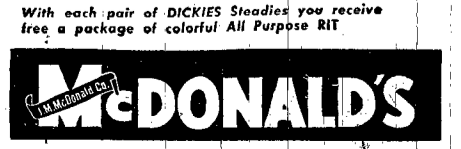
