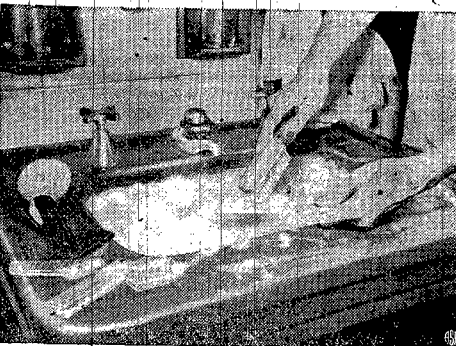

Grooming Tools Need Washing



In the interest of health, neatness, and beauty, it's wise to gather family brushes and combs for a scrubbing at least every week or so. An easy, step-saving way is to collect them in a bag or basket during your morning bed-making rounds. You'll probably end your clean-up tour in the bathroom to put out fresh towels and straighten up after the basin for a hot sudsy bath.
 Since soap and hot water have a disinfecting action, everything can be dunked together just like the family wash. Even though no one should use another's brush or comb, it's quite safe and much easier to wash these at the same time.
 Don't neglect complexion, mascara, lipstick, or clothes brushes. Once in a while passade the penknives to leave their pocket combs for a scrubbing and, of course, do all the combs from your own and other pocketbooks.
 Washing is double-quick if you work with both hands—letting brush and comb work soapsuds into each other. When everything is clean-awash, rinse in hot water and shake to remove the excess. Dry brushes with bristles down so that water drains from the tuft holes.

Carol Barelmann was accepted as a new member. Next meeting will be in the home of Nyla Mikkelson Apr. 15.

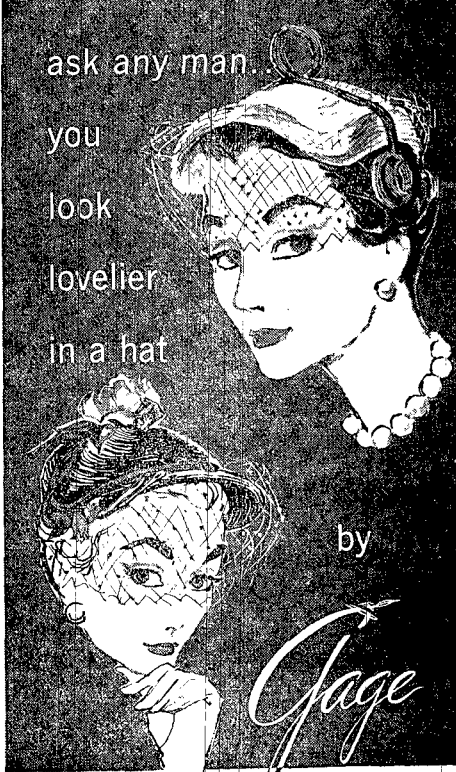
