MARCH Nebraska Farm Outlook

FARM REVIEW AND FORECAST

"Our Roots Are In This Land"

FARM COSTS FOR 1955

Farm production expenses are more than three times as high as they were before 1940. Currently, they claim approximately 60 percent of every dollar's worth of goods produced by farmers.

The great increase in production expenses has been due to a marked increase in the use of cost items not produced on the farm as well as to rising prices for all items used in farm production.

Not all cost items have gone up in similar proportions, however. (See Figure 1). Farm wages are more than four times as high as they were in 1935-39, while fertilizer and motor supply items are only about 50 percent higher. Seeds, machinery, feed, and general farm supplies have approximately doubled in price in the same period of time.

The extent of overall increases in costs of production for any individual farmer depends, of course, on the nature of his costs. Those whose businesses have required large amounts of hired labor, for example, have experienced greater cost increases than those who use little hired labor and relatively large amounts of such items as fertilizer and machinery.

Planning Farm Expenses

In appraising the possibilities of improving net farm income through adjustments in farm expenditures one needs to consider the past and probable future trends of the various cost factors and realize: (1) that decisions on some expenditures may tend to set his cost pattern for several years in the future; (2) that increased expenditures for some items may actually result in increased net incomes; and (3) that some expenditures of the kind described under (2) yield much quicker or much greater returns than do others.

The present high level of employment and wage rates and the probability that farm wages will continue to be high for the next several years is sufficient reason for giving serious consideration to the purchase of labor saving

devices. Assuming that a decision of this kind is made, it cannot be reversed, as a rule, except at a financial sacrifice. Such decisions, once made, tend to affect the pattern of cash expenditures and farm operating expenses for several years to come. Consequently, it is important that considerable study and thought be given to the making of such decisions.

Little Change Expected

Costs of machinery, equipment, and chemicals, including commercial fertilizer are not expected to show much change in 1955. Well-planned use of such items helps cut down on the need for high priced labor; it also offers the possibility of increasing net farm incomes through increased production—the value of which exceeds the costs involved.

WITH NEW MACHINERY in ample supply, it seems likely that good used machinery can be obtained at a considerable saving as compared to new machinery. Repair

parts are expected to continue at approximately their present price level.

If the addition of more machinery is being contemplated, consideration should be given to whether or not full use can be made of such machines. If full use of the machine cannot be provided, how do the advantages of ownership compare to those of hiring the job done by a custom operator? Will doing the job mechanically release the operator's time to other productive uses so that income will increase more than enough to offset the increased cost?

FERTILIZER is expected to be more plentiful than in 1954, although the demand is also expected to increase. Prices of fertilizer are not expected to show much change. If capital or credit is limited, it is important to realize as much from each dollar invested as possible. In most instances, this will not coincide with the idea of obtaining the highest possible yields.

Expenditures for relatively small amounts of fertilizer per acre on more acres usually return more per dollar invested than do large amounts on fewer acres. Likewise, attention needs to be given to the fact that returns from the use of fertilizer vary from one soil type to another and from one crop to another.

FIELD CROP SEEDS, CORN, OATS, etc., will be somewhat cheaper in 1955. Red clover, improved varieties of alfalfa, and crested wheat grass, however, are expected to be higher. Supplies of brome grass seed are large and will be reflected in lower prices compared to 1954.

The total supply of all feed grains and concentrates was close to record levels in the fall of 1954 with about the same amount available per animal unit as in the preceding year. Oats, barley, and grain sorghums constitute a much larger share of the total supply than normally and should be relatively cheap compared to corn. It is expected that corn prices may rise to the support level before fall.

SUPPLIES OF PROTEIN FEEDS are larger than in the preceding year. The smaller supply of cottonseed meals is offset by larger supplies of soybean meal. The introduction of cattle supplements containing stibesterol will cheapen fat cattle gains where it is used wisely. Where good quality alfalfa hay is being fed as roughage, the directions for feeding such supplements, if followed, might mean that unnecessarily large amounts of protein would be fed. The relatively high cost of the extra protein may tend to offset to a large extent the improved gains which can be expected from feeding of a supplement containing stibesterol.

Feeding sufficient protein to balance the rations, however, is a "must" if costs are to be kept in line with the relatively low feeding ratios as they now exist.

Interest rates are expected to show little change. However, payments on indebtedness which is contracted when prices are high require a larger and larger proportion of the gross income as prices of farm products fall. With the prospect of continued falling prices, additional indebtedness should be contracted cautiously.

PROPERTY TAXES can be expected to increase in the next few years.

As the cost-price squeeze continues, to tighten, more and more attention needs to be given to the way in which your dollars are spent if net farm incomes are to be held at reasonably acceptable levels.

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
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
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
