

## City Council Asks Donations For Swimming Pool Fixtures

**Plan Test on New Lighting Project Soon**

Wayne's city council Tuesday night issued a call to individuals and organizations to aid in buying fixtures for the new municipal swimming pool.

Explaining the move, the council said funds from the pool bond issue and the park fund have been depleted through construction of the pool and bathhouse.

Councilmen cited the need for a slide, baskets, rental suits and other similar equipment to complete the project. They are also seeking some organization to volunteer to paint the pool interior.

Tests for a new street lighting project were also planned at Tuesday's meeting. Two blocks on each side of Main will be selected for the tests, which will have all home owners in those blocks light their porches every night.

Cost for electricity will be borne by the city. Councilmen Ed Bahk and T. J. Hughes were named to select test blocks. The project would start Apr. 15.

New street lighting for Main street to the college and Tenth on the south side of the campus will be discussed at an adjourned meeting Monday, Engineer J. M. Thorburn is expected to present specifications for the project so bids could be let at the Apr. 26 meeting.

## County Soybean Support Price Set at \$1.98

Wayne county's support price for 1955-crop soybeans has been set at \$1.98 per bushel, County ASC Chairman Carl O. Sundell announced this week.

This represents 70 percent of the Feb. 15, 1955 parity price for Wayne county. Sundell added some slight variation could occur through a change in parity at harvest time.

The new price is 18 cents per bushel under the 1954-crop figure, which was at 80 percent of parity. National average support price for 1955-crop soybeans is \$2.04 per bushel.

Loans and purchase agreements will be made available from harvest time through Jan. 31, 1956. Maturity dates for the loans will be May 31, 1956. Soybeans must grade No. 4 or better and contain not more than 14 percent moisture.

Sundell added that corn under price support thus far has behind the comparable period of a year ago. Through Mar. 15 a total of 245,000 bushels of 1954-crop corn had been put under support. This is a 66 percent drop from the 1953-crop figure of 740,000 bushels at the same date.

Sundell said main reason for the drop was failure of farmers to comply with their planting allotments last year. Another reason was the closeness of market prices to the support price at harvest time.

Burglars hit Wayne taverns three times during the past two weeks taking a total of almost \$175.

Robbed twice was Little Bill's bar. Last Thursday night thieves took \$100.75. They struck again Monday, taking \$42.50 more.

The week earlier the Nu Tavern was robbed of about \$30. In each instance the money was taken after the businesses were closed for the night.

Entry was gained through a window at the Nu Tavern, owner Norris Weible said.

At Little Bill's thieves apparently were able to unlock the doors.

## Survey Shows Wayne High Building Program Needed

A recommendation for a building program at Wayne City schools was made Thursday night before the school board by representatives of the University of Nebraska and the State Department of Education.

The recommendation followed building survey made by the men, Dr. Merig Stoneman, Avery Linn and Donald Bush. They suggested the program provide a new elementary school for kindergarten through sixth grade. This would free the current building for use only as a junior high and senior high unit.

Full use of current facilities is being made, the three reported. They praised remodeling done recently to keep abreast of modern day education needs. They particularly noted the shop, music and home economics facilities.

However, they cited a badly crowded conditions in the lower elementary grades and a too narrow junior high curriculum because of the lack of building space and facilities.

A limited physical education program was also noted by the association officers.

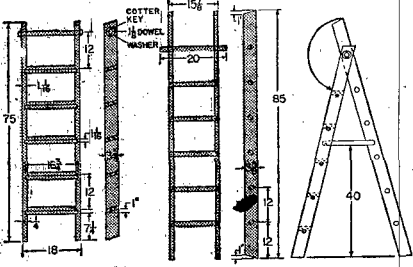
**HERE'S HOW . . .**

**MAKE A STEP-EXTENSION LADDER**



A combination step and extension ladder will find many uses. Details are shown in the drawings. Mark the positions of steps and rungs carefully. Fasten the steps with two No. 8 flathead wood screws in each end. Fasten the end of each rung with one No. 12 wood screw, 2 1/2 inches long. The pivot rung is drilled to take a 2-inch cotter key.

Use 1 1/2 by 4-inch lumber for rails and steps, and 1 1/2-inch dowel for rungs. Draw the step ladder together with 3/16-inch ladder bolts beneath each step, and brace angle braces beneath the bottom step. Your lumber dealer should be consulted as to the best woods for the job.

### Care of the Flag

At first glance this may seem to be a writing on flag-waving. It isn't. It is written to tell you HOW to display the flag.

Our authority is a booklet, "Flag Etiquette," published by the American Legion Auxiliary.

At the outset the booklet warns that a show of emotion or patriotism may be greeted with derision and frowns—and we agree that this is no doubt true. It is the great American tradition to be derisive and contemptuous of any show of emotion, yet these same hooters would be first in line to fight for the flag if it were in danger.

Methods of saluting the flag vary. Persons not in uniform salute the flag by holding the right hand over the heart. A man holds his hat in the right hand while saluting. Persons in uniform render the prescribed military salute.

When the national anthem is played without the flag being displayed non-military persons stand facing the music. Military persons render the regular right hand salute. If the flag is also displayed regular salutes are given.

The flag should be displayed only between sunrise and sundown... always with the union (field of stars) up except as a distress signal.

No other flag should be placed above our flag or to the right of our flag if all are on the same level.

Flags should not be used as decorations, barricades or drapery, nor allowed to touch the ground or become badly soiled. When flags become so badly worn or soiled they need replacing, the old flag should be destroyed in private by burning or some other method in harmony with reverence and respect due it.

These and many more instructions are contained in the booklet... well worth reading... well worth knowing.

### 15 Years Ago

Mar. 28, 1940: Wayne city council was invited Monday by the State Board of Education, meeting at Lincoln, to have an engineer's figure prepared of the possible cost of sewage treatment for Wayne. Federal Surplus Commodities association has a representative in Norfolk this Thursday, Friday and Saturday making a survey to determine the feasibility of establishing the food stamp plan in seven northeast counties.

### 10 Years Ago

Mar. 29, 1945: Growing lack of hotel and restaurant eating accommodations in Wayne has reached an acute stage. After more than three years of war, wrestling with government restrictions, food points, food shortage and help scarcity, operators have often suffered frayed nerves and an overpowering desire to curtail or quit. The result is no Sunday serving and only lunches as a rule on week days.

## HERE AND THERE... With Your County Agent

By Harold Ingalls

Madrid, Spanish and Evergreen are new, improved varieties of sweetclover recommended by the University of Nebraska college of agriculture.

Quick germination and vigorous seedling growth make stands easily established with these varieties. These qualities help overcome first year weed competition, adverse climatic conditions at seeding time and infestations of sweetclover weevil and other insects.

Madrid is a yellow-flowered, biennial sweetclover that matures early and has proved excellent for all farming areas in Nebraska. First-year hay production has yielded over 50 percent more forage than Common Yellow clover and seed supplies are quite plentiful.

Spanish variety is a white-flowered biennial and produces over 70 percent more forage than Common White during the first year. However, seed supplies are quite scarce.

Late maturity and heavy forage production in both the first and second years are the outstanding characteristics of the white-flowered, biennial Evergreen variety. It can be expected to produce an average of about 50 percent more forage than Common White sweetclover during its two years. Seed supplies are also limited for the Evergreen variety.

New sweetclover plantings should not be made adjacent to old stands to help overcome damage from sweetclover weevil. Application of lime and phosphate where soil tests show the need helps the plants outgrow this pest.

Where sweetclover is grown with a small grain nurse crop, entomology specialists say it is doubtful whether the planting date can be delayed enough to overcome damage caused by the sweetclover weevil. This is because the desir-

able time for planting sweetclover is the optimum period for planting the small grain. Meat-Type Hogs

I recently heard one of our foremost swine authorities say that the old established breed associations have "their heads in the sand" when it comes to promoting meat-type hogs. He grants that there are meat types in every breed but the number percentage of extremely small, so-called hybrids and bacon types are doing much better on this score. Blame for the recent low prices was placed on hogsmen carrying their pigs to excessive weights. The weight gain over 225 lbs. is more costly and contributes most to the glut of low value lard and fatty cuts.

Poultry Progress While visiting with John Mohr last week he remarked that "hens used to lay more eggs than they were used to." This is a tribute to the poultry breeders and hatchermen who supply the majority of baby chicks today.

They have, through an intensive breeding and disease control program, fixed inherited traits of "livability and layability" far in advance of standards in other livestock enterprises. This has been made possible by the nature of the chicken business today. The control of breeding, fixed inheritance of baby chicks has been concentrated in the hands of a relatively few progressive concerns. Most of the hatcheries operating today participate in the National Poultry Improvement plan, a system which assures buyers of healthy chicks with the ability for efficient egg or meat production.

It has been predicted that eventually we will have reliable sources of other types of livestock with fairly well fixed traits of inheritance and performance. This field certainly offers a challenge to the livestock men of tomorrow.

Lincoln—It usually takes strife and controversy to make news. But this week in the Legislature there were signs that one of the big stories of the session would be the settling of an ancient controversy.

The indications were that school land leaseholders and educational organizations were cautiously approaching each other to find a way to heal the bitter breach between them.

Up to now leaseholders have insisted that either the lands should be sold or something done about cutting the rent. School groups have been unsympathetic toward anything that would decrease the revenues, which go to all the schools of the state.

But a new approach appears to be in the wind and it may be one both sides can agree upon. This would be the share-crop method of renting. Often used in private arrangements, it means that the renter gives a set share of his production each year to the landlord and keeps the rest. Its advantage over a fixed rent is that it takes into account both lean years and bumper crops, giving both parties a fair share no matter what the crop output.

Such a method would replace the present system of charging six percent rental on the appraised value of the school land lease. The increases in appraisals and hence rent—in recent years has been one of the big reasons the leaseholders have demanded relief.

Don Kline of the Nebraska State Education association said he thought his group would approve of such a method, although he could not commit himself because the association hasn't specifically discussed the matter.

Western Nebraska senators in the Legislature have declined direct comment. But the picture seems to be that they have decided that the Legislature definitely is going to go along with LB 26, a bill to sell the school lands.

And chances are that they will do anything about three bills to change the appraisals. Public hearing on these bills—LB 277, 321, and 521—set for this week was cancelled. It will be held later.

There is some talk that LB 277 and 521 will be dropped and the effort concentrated on LB 321, which would cut the rental from 6 percent to 4 percent.

The share-crop proposal is probably being made to salvage something out of the leaseholders' effort.

The big news may be that both sides can agree on it.

Technical Problems Setting up a share-crop system won't be done with a mere snap of the fingers. It probably would require hiring a private land management firm since 1,650,000 acres are involved. This would mean the Legislature would have to appropriate more tax funds to the State Board of Educational Lands and Funds. Under the constitution some

Another problem would be deciding how to share-crop grazing land. It's easy to divide up corn or wheat but cattle is another matter.

It probably would require establishing a per unit per acre basis of rent. In such a formula would have to be provisions for changes in the cattle market and for dry years when the grass is short.

Tax Reform The Legislature has the green light on general file (first major debate test) to LB 148, the "key-stone" bill in a tax reform program in this session. Assessors under present law are supposed to use only one factor in assessing property—the current market value. LB 148 would allow them to use earning capacity, desirability, location, reproduction cost and comparison with other properties in determining the value.

Although the railroads and some large industries have been fighting this bill hard, on a decisive test vote an attempt to kill the measure lost six to 30. This smashing victory for the bill promised well for other measures attempting to "doct" the ailing property tax system in Nebraska.

Debate on this important measure took parts of four days. Sen. Otto Liebers, Lincoln, chairman of the special committee which wrote these tax reform bills after two years of study, had to answer question after question on the measure.

This bill will make legal what assessors have been doing illegally. Under the present market value law it was just impossible to get fair equalization," Sen. Liebers said.

So 53 counties have had scientific reappraisals in which "basic value" formulas similar to LB 148 have been used. Liebers estimated the 80 percent of the property in the state has been assessed this way already.

Liebers said that while market value sounds fine in theory it falls down because of local inflation, or the fact that some property seldom or never is bought and sold.

Tumpike Bill A bill to abolish the State Turnpike authority received a favorable vote from the Legislature Public Works committee and was sent to the Legislature itself for consideration.

Proponents say the authority is too all-powerful under present law and that Nebraska shouldn't have a turnpike because it will divide farms and trade territories.

Opponents of the measure, LB 271, and friends of the turnpike idea contend a toll road across the country is inevitable and that Nebraska should work to get it.

New Welfare Program A favorable vote by the Public Health committee was given LB

108, which would establish a new type of welfare program in Nebraska. It would be assistance for the totally disabled.

It is called the "fourth category" because it would be in addition to the present programs of old age assistance, aid to the blind and aid to dependent children. At least 40 states have adopted this program, which brings considerable federal aid with it. But senators anxious to hold down the budget winced at the \$3.2 million it would cost Nebraska taxpayers.

The necessity for such a program was clearly demonstrated. But senators were becoming resigned to a soaring budget close to the \$220 million mark. In recent weeks the Legislature passed two bills which tacked at least \$21 million on the estimated \$196 budget. One was the sixth cent of gasoline tax (\$18 million) and the other was renewing the half-mill tax levy for the state teachers' retirement fund (\$3 million).

## Fund Drives Face Revolt

Cleveland, Ohio — Organized charities were warned Thursday that Americans are beginning to revolt against a multiplicity of appeals.

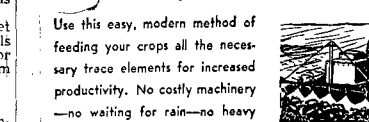
There is less danger to philanthropy in the racketeers who drain off millions of dollars each year than there is in the confusion caused by legitimate appeals, said Randall M. Ruhman, president of the National Conference of Solicitors.

Several speakers were critical of health organizations that refuse to work with Community Chests or united fund appeals because they feel they can "go it alone" with "scare" campaigns.

They said the amount of money such appeals take out of a community is often out of proportion. Three hundred experts on philanthropic needs, industrial leaders, representatives of Better Business bureaus and other "watchdog" organizations, held their second annual conference. It was disclosed that philanthropic gifts in the U.S. reached a record \$5,466,000,000 in 1953, but fell off last year to \$5,401,000,000.

These figures were given in a speech by F. Emerson Andrews, director of philanthropic research for the Russell Sage foundations. Andrews said philanthropic gifts last year were 35 percent greater than in 1949.
