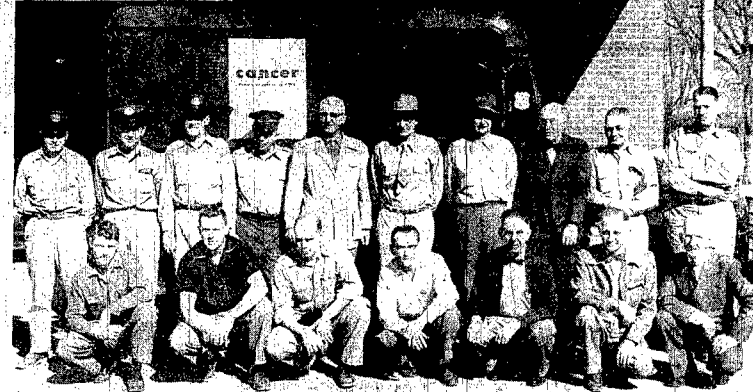


350 Years of Postal Service
