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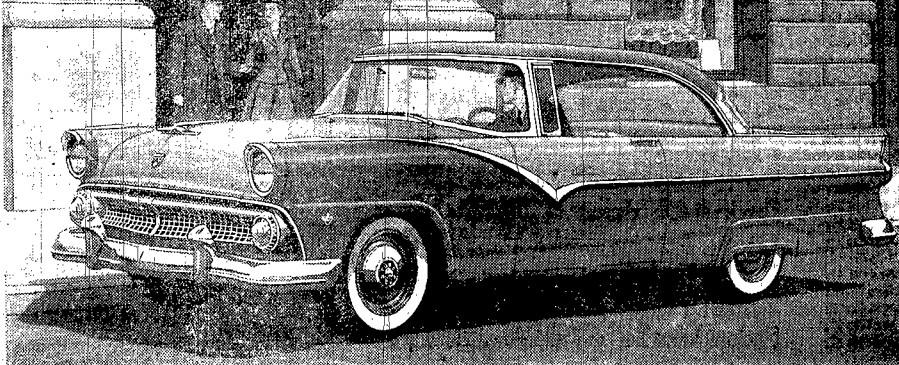

**Fake "Soil Conditioners"**  
 Various rock, mineral and other materials are being sold in Nebraska as soil conditioners, soil minerals and the like. Some of these materials are simply rock of various kinds, ground fine, analyzed, bagged and labeled with an impressive list of the chemical elements they contain.

Most of these pulverized rock or mineral materials have no value as soil conditioners. They have no effect on soil structure, consistency, moisture intake, moisture holding capacity or aeration. The only really effective and practical soil conditioner for general use on farms is organic matter, put into the soil in the form of manure, crop residues or legumes, grasses or other green manure crops.

**Brucellosis Report**  
 In cooperation with the office of the State Veterinarian and livestock producers in Nebraska, accelerated brucellosis program continued to make progress with 31 counties participating in the testing and vaccinating program.

Nebraska statutes require at least 75 percent of the owners of the breeding cattle in a precinct or county to sign petitions before an area can be established for compulsory area testing. Also hearings are held at a central point, usually at the county seat, following three weekly notices in the local paper. Hearings were held in ten counties during the month and testing is now underway in those areas. To date no action has been taken on this program in Wayne county.

Lawns damaged by white grubs last fall should be treated this spring. Early treatment is preferred, so applications should be made now. The most effective treatment appears to be either five percent dieldrin granules or five percent chlordane dust. Apply one pound of five percent dieldrin per 700 square feet of lawn or 10 pounds of five percent chlordane dust per 1000 square feet of lawn. It is necessary to wash either insecticide into the sod for control. Lawns free of subterranean insects will likely be free of moles, as moles feed on insects and earthworms in the soil.

**Slow Down and Live**  
 This is a national program. In this state Governor Anderson has named Captain Wirt, State Safety Patrol, to head up a state organization campaign to place emphasis on safe driving. Mayor Glen Houshield has been named coordinator for the eight-county area in northeast Nebraska. He has arranged for a district meeting to be held in the City hall Friday.

Lincoln The Legislature this week was facing the growing problems of school finance and reorganization. Although the spotlight often is on roads and other phases of government, ultimately schools more and more are becoming a magnet for notices in the local paper. Hearings were held in ten counties during the month and testing is now underway in those areas. To date no action has been taken on this program in Wayne county.

Opposition to restricting bond from areas which fear it will put everybody into a school and further dissolve rural community life. Also, it comes from farmers who understandably hesitate to pay higher taxes. Undoubtedly it also comes from the 1,700 districts which don't pay and levy for general school purposes.

**State Aid**  
 This latter was brought out at a hearing on LB 496, which would appropriate out of state funds for local school districts.

**Reorganization**  
 A possible step forward may have come when the Legislature Education committee by a 5 to 4 vote sent to the floor a stricter restricting bill.

At the hearing it was repeatedly said that a lot of Nebraska's troubles are because she has so many school districts. With about 6,000 districts Nebraska has more than any other state in the Union. This means a demand for too many teachers plus the keeping of far too many inefficient districts. The bill voted to the floor was LB 398. It would require that if a county reorganization committee in some areas will be dissolved within the next two years it will be dissolved and another committee elected.

**University Budget**  
 In some areas the question might ultimately be, "Can we afford not to pay more money for their budgets?" For example, the growing talk that Nebraska might get an atomic power plant. If it does, one factor bringing it here will be the extensive atomic experiments at the University of Nebraska the past few years.

Should Nebraska get such a plant it might be the most significant event in its entire history. Nebraska might grab a lead in the field of agriculture experi-

mentary that could be all-important in all its future history. Those who have studied the possibilities glow when they talk of what might come. Atomic ashes experiments to get millions of plants may bring wonders untold in higher producing crops. Experimentation with meat and food processing would also be possible.

**MILLIONS OF WORDS HAVE BEEN WRITTEN** about Pearl Harbor. But Admiral Kimmel's story sets the event in the perspective of history. If you are not inclined to read it during the busy spring season get it sometime this summer or fall.

But we have another one which is going to tickle the funny bone of nearly everyone. If you don't find yourself, or your neighbors in this book somewhere then you are different than most of the people in our land. It is good for many a chuckle we can guarantee.

**A NOVEL TO MOVE AND ENTERTAIN YOU IS** "The Freedom Song" by Neill Wilson. It is set in the South of ante-bellum days and conveys both the richness and poverty of that life, dealing with slave owners, run-away slaves and the Underground Railroad.

**THE LITERARY GUILD SELECTION FOR APRIL** has arrived and is out in circulation. "The Scots-woman" by Inglis Fletcher is a very good historical novel so put it on your list.

**THE TEEN-AGERS SHOULD LOOK FOR THE** new party book called "Party Parade" by Hogan. There are ideas for every season of the year describing many novel parties that young folks would enjoy.

**Pen Change**  
 The latest step in a long series of events at the State penitentiary was the resigning of Warden Herbert Hans after six years. He had been under fire repeatedly during his career but apparently resigned of his own volition. Appointed to his place was Joseph Bovey, 49, of Lincoln, who the past three months has been Statehouse custodian.

Bovey had had 10 years of experience in federal prison administration. But the aspect that worried some people was that the hand of Gov. Victor Anderson could be seen in the appointment.
