Vaccine Inoculations Started Today at Wayne Winside

Clinics Give Initial Salk Serum Shots

Initial polio vaccine shots will be given to about 350 Wayne county first and second graders today, County Superintendent Gladys M. Porter announced earlier this week.

Inoculation clinics have been established at Wayne and Winside to administer the free shots to school children whose parents signed requests earlier this month.

Vaccinations will start at 9 a. m. Children are asked to report to the Wayne city auditorium from where they will be sent to the doctor of their choice for the shots.

St. Mary's students are scheduled at 9 a. m., Wayne High at 9:15 and Wayne Prep at 1 p. m. Rural students who designated Dr. Roy Matson will report at 10 a. m. Those requesting Dr. Walter Bentback are slated at 1 p. m.

Dr. D. O. Craig will administer shots at Winside. Students will report to the auditorium there. Winside will start at 9 a. m. with Carroll at 9:30 and Hoskins at 9:45. Rural students are scheduled at 1 p. m.

One Shot Only
Vaccine arrived in Wayne Saturday morning. This was only enough for the initial shots, however. It is expected second shots will be given two to four weeks later but the exact time will not be known until more vaccine arrives.

Local physicians said vaccine for private shots for other children probably will not arrive in Wayne until next month. It is hoped all children under 10 can receive initial shots by Aug. 1.

New Road Relocation Action Called Victory for Engineer

Bill Readied For Action by Legislature

Settlement of Northeast Nebraska's controversial Highway 35 relocation appeared a step nearer Wednesday following action by the Legislative Public Works committee.

Tuesday the committee tentatively voted to place relocation powers in the hands of the state highway department with the written advice of the State Highway commission and the consent of the governor.

The question of relocation power is being considered in connection with LB 187, an omnibus bill recodifying Nebraska's highway laws.

Some observers interpreted the wording of relocation power as affirming the present system and consequently a victory for the Highway department and State Engineer L. N. Kess.

The commission, an appellate body, and Kess have clashed over relocation of Highway 35 between Wayne and Wakefield.

The only major alteration of the present method of operation is the provision that the commission's advice must be in written form.

Another change made by the committee Tuesday was the stipulation that the commission must submit its advice within two weeks. This would eliminate the possibility of a "vest pocket" veto by the commission, constitutionally prohibited from having executive authority.

Work on LB 187 was completed Tuesday with the adoption of several amendments of procedural nature. However, the bill was not sent to the floor pending final preparation of amendments. The bill has been studied several months by the committee.
