Too Late To Classify

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Deer, Antelope Applications Are Now Available

Application forms for 1955 big game permits are now available. Deadline for both antelope and deer applications is July 9, a game commission release said.

Total number of antelope permits has been set at 2650. Four different areas will be open to deer hunting with rifle.

Persons who had deer permits in 1953 or 1954 are not eligible for 1955 deer permit. Holders of antelope permits in 1953 or 1954 are not eligible for 1955 antelope permits.

However, persons who held antelope permits in either of these years may apply for deer permit or deer permit holders in 1953 or 1954 may apply for antelope permit.

Total number of antelope permits has been set at 1000. A special bow and arrow season has been set for Burt, Thurston, Washington and Douglas counties, running Oct. 1-31. No limit has been set on these permits.

Open season on antelope is Sept. 10-12, while deer may be hunted in Areas I and II, Nov. 29 to Dec. 6 and in Areas III and IV Dec. 9 to Dec. 13.

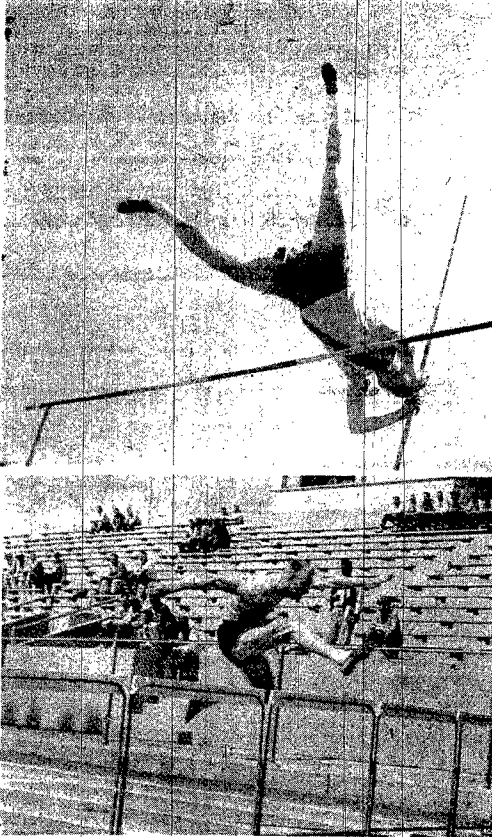
