Wayne is now in a Sioux City hospital. He is paralyzed from the waist down. He will probably be hospitalized six months.

Tips for Growing Sorghums 1. Get The Best Seed Available Don't take a chance with the seed you plant.

2. Treat Your Seed. Never plant sorghum seed without proper seed treatment. It will control smut and protect the seed until the plant becomes established.

3. Don't Plant Too Thick—Last year many of the grain sorghum fields had twice too many plants. In the eastern portion of Nebraska, five to six pounds of seed per acre is recommended.

4. Don't Plant Too Early—Sorghum is a warm season crop. Nothing is gained by planting before the last of May or June.

5. Prepare A Good Seedbed—Sorghums respond best to a well prepared seedbed, as do other crops.

Temporary Pasture Sudan is a fast-growing, high-producing annual grass that makes its major production during July.

Outstanding in Nebraska is the variety Piper because of its satisfactory yield and low prussic acid content. When used as a recommended variety for this state, it produces well and is intermediate in prussic acid content.

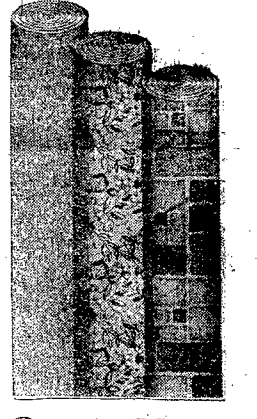

Lincoln The Legislature drove hard this week, trying to ploy through as many tough bills as possible before the Memorial Day recess.

Major decisions were made on two of the perennial problems—road and schools. It took two days of debate to get through the 63-section LB 187, a complete recodification of the laws under which the State Highway Department operates.

Controlled Access Another section of LB 187 dealt with the right of the department to control access to some of its new modern roads.

Controlled Access The department contends it needs this power or dozens of hot dog stands, filling stations and motels spring up around with separate driveway onto the highway, endangering traffic safety.

School Reorganization School forces, which have had spectacular success in this session, suffered a slight setback in debate over a school reorganization bill, LB 398.

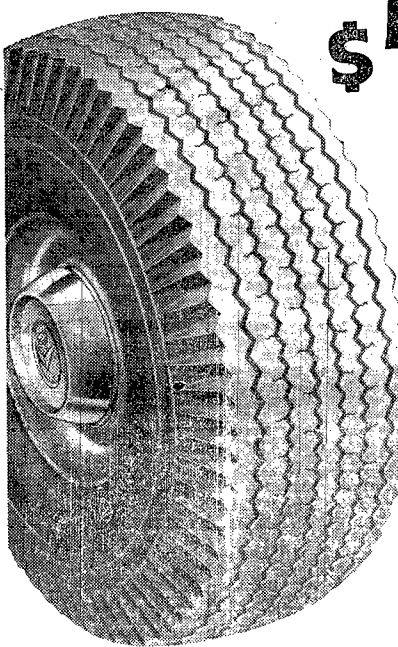
